WASHINGTON, June 23 .- The exportation of cotton from Egypt during January, 1921, greatly declined in comparison with the exports of the corresponding month of 1920, Consul Lester Maynard at Alexandria, has notified Secretary of

Commerce Hoover.

The great decline in exports was not due to a shortage of cotton, as the supply available was greater than in the previous years, but was due to the world depression in the cotton markets. In spite of the great decline in the purchases of Egyptian cotton by the United States from approximately 47,000,000 pounds in January, 1920, to 4,500,000 pounds the relative position of the United States in this trade changed but States in this trade changed but slightly.
