Meisterheim stated that he had definite information that the gallows was almost cheated last December, when a spark of life was restored to Nick Bianca, who was hanged. Bianca a few seconds later died "a second time," ac-



Whites and Blacks in Texas Both Show Increase in Last Decade.

By BASCOM N. TIMMONS Times Washington Correspondent, WASHINGTON, June 24.—Descendants of Pocohontas and Powhatan are multiplying in no uncertain numbers, contrary to the opinions of course leading alternation. have the nation believe that the American Indian is rapidly approaching the point of racial extermination. At least, in Texas, the original residents of this country are finding life a pretty good thing after all and in 1920 the Indian population of the Love Star state was 2.110 as of the Lone Star state was 2,110 as

against 702 ten years previous.

This same ration of increased population holds good for most of the races in Texas. The whites, for instance, were 3,204,848 strong in 1910, while in 1920 there were 3,918,136 white records in the Level 3,918,136 white people in the Lone Star state

The negro population also increased. Colored people in 1910 in Texas were 690,000 strong, while in 1920 the negroes had multiplied until there were 741,723 of 'em.

Chinese and Japanese, though in much smaller numbers, showed an increase. The Japs were numbered 449 in 1920 and 340 in 1910. Casual visiters to the state are prone to remark that "there seems to be more than that to me' and the same is true in the case of Chinese. In 1920 there were 776 Chinese in Texas and in 1910 there were 595.

The nation had previously thought

that there were only five other races on the map, but the bureau of census officials found 34 persons in Texas in 1920 for whom there was no classification, and in 1910 the census of the control of the sus found 8 whom they were unable

Total Whites. Total Whites.

The total white population of the nation is 94,822,431, the total negro population is 10,463,013. Of the negro population 8,912,259 are in the sixteen southern states of Delaware, Maryland, West Virginia, Kentucky, Arkansas, Oklahoma, Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, Plovida Tennessee Alahama, Missis-Florida, Tennessee, Alabama, Mississippi, Louisiana and Texas, 1,472,163 in the North and 78,591 in the West. The total numerical increase in the negro population during the decad was 635,250. Of this increase, 472, 418, or about three-fourths, was reported in the South, despite the fact that about 85 per cent of the total egro population is still found in the

Without exception, the northern nd western states which border on the South reported great increases in the negro population than the average for the country, and in several of these states the rate of increase was very large—for example, in Illinois, 67.1 per cent; in Ohio, 67.1 per cent; in Ohio, 67.1 per cent; and in Pennsylvania, 46.7 per a larger negro population than either Maryland or Kentucky. 



the referee became dizzy from counting, and failed to hear the bell. This was on the fifth liason between Willard and the floor. The gong sounded feebly on the issippi to succeed John Sharp Wilseventh count, but Referee Pecord continued chopping the air over Willard. When he had finished he informed Dempsey that there had been seventher. a knockout and the champion left the

ring, only to have his manager come running after him with the information that there had been a mistake. That first round was awful. But it prepared everybody for the worst and no one was surprised when Willard lost in the third round. Ruth hit homer in exhibition game at Columbus.

Dempsey opened the fight by accepting some taps on the face. Then he hauled off and busted Willard in the stomach so hard that a dazed expression overspread the champion's countenance. Dempsey then landed several blows to the jaw and Willard dropped to the floor for six counts, to fall again with a blow that greeted his nose.

As he got up a second time he turned his head away but the giant killer struck him twice and he fell on

his hands and knees. Arising once more, Willard was cornered by Dempsey who pounded him to the mat with rights and lefts

to the face. Again he got up and once more he was knocked down.

Somehow the giant groped his way through the second round, suffering nothing more humiliating than a fall partly through the ropes. Dempsey tore into him again when the third round opened. Willard was groggy and weak, with one eye out of shape and everything gone wrong. His seconds threw the towel into the ring and ed it a day.







Within the next three years, he said, approximately 50,000 will have received treatment for the disease.

Of 133,716 ex-service men have been sent as patients to the hospitals since the war risk act was rassed, 35,150 were tuberculous, Dr. Smith said. Half of these had been under treatment since March, 1919, in hospitals owned or controlled by

the public health service.


