

RAILWAY RATES AND WAGES.

Railway wages are to be reduced fearse kracks and we dident have eny in order to enable the railways to remain solvent. It happens, however, that railway wages and railway rates were raised at about the same time, and that the railway employes, as consumers, have to pay more for their living when rates are high than when they are low. The excuse for a decrease in wages is that it now costs less to live than it did a year ago, and the same argument applies to rates. President Harding showed a commendable appreciation of the popular sentiment on this point when he walked over to the offices of the Interstate Commerce commission yesterday to suggest, in a discreet way, that rates be revised downward. He was informed that the inequalities caused by the horizontal increase last year were being smoothed out, to the advantage of many shippers. A horizontal decrease is not on the cards at present.


