

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

FARMERS AS BUSINESS MEN FIND WEALTH IN COOPERATIVE DAIRYING



THE MODERN WAY

REGINA, SASK.—Saskatchewan Cooperative Creameries, Ltd., in which the only stockholders are the dairy farmers themselves, did a business last year of \$3,000,000, according to its annual report and has paid 8 per cent on its capital stock for the last three years.

The organization has vent, five creameries, five cold stor ge plants and three poultry abattoirs. During the last twelve month, a \$300,000 plant was built in Regina as a central station and is regarded as one of the best equipped dairy plants in Canada.

Thirteen of the creameries were constructed by the Dominion Government. They were taken over later by the provincial government and four others were built. When the Saskatchewan Cooperative Creameries was organized in 1917, the creameries were turned over to the farmers who have since operated them under their single contents. Dairying in recent years has become one of the most important farm activities in the rich agricultural region along the Canadian National Railways from Winnipeg to Prince Albert, Saska haven. This country is one of diversified farming where livestock, dairying, bee culture and poultry raising add to profits from field crops. It is at \$20 and \$30 an acre and vast areas remain that have not yet been brought under cultivation. Financial aid by the government has been largely responsible for building up the dairy industry in Western Canada. When farmers of a district wish to establish a creamery, they subscribe the necessary capital, 25 per cent of which must be paid up. Then the government supplies the cash at 6½ per cent of the creamer over their single content. When the loan is repaid the farmers own the creamer.
