

Three Mile Limit Will Be Big Aid To Rum Runners

GENEVA.—The League of Nations has come to the rescue of the American rum runners by proposing an international convention fixing the limit of territorial waters for the entire world at three miles.

In order, however, not to let the rum runners have too easy a time the proposed convention provides that while the three mile zone marks the extreme limit over which contiguous state can exercise sovereignty, it may never be extended beyond that for the exercise of administrative rights on the ground either of customs or vital necessity.

The draft project for this international convention has just been submitted to the League to all of the nations of the world. Should a reasonable number of them find it acceptable, an international convention will then be summoned for the purpose of definitely adopting and launching the convention.

In that event it will then become a part of the system of codified, international law which the League is steadily building up.

Wickersham
The draft convention as it now stands is the work of a commission of international jurists appointed by the League on which George W. Wickersham, former attorney general of the United States, secured as far as possible the inclusion of the American viewpoint.

However, the necessity that has developed in the United States of extending as far as possible the limit of territorial waters in order to give the government a little better chance of running down rum runners did not meet with any great degree of sympathy on the part of the commission. As dignified international jurists, the members of the commission did not express any special objection to having the rum runners run down, but what was more difficult for them was to suggest any change from what has generally been accepted for centuries as the limit of territorial waters.

American Thesis
The commission found exceedingly interesting the new American thesis, which has been upheld by certain American courts, that the limit should not be fixed in miles but rather on the speed of vessels, namely the distance that a ship can cover in one hour. This idea, however, as a trifle too advanced for the commission.

However the final decision to rest by the established three-mile limit was only taken after consultation with all of the leading maritime nations of the world, very few of whom asked or suggested any change.

Brazil pointed out for instance that during the war Chile and Uruguay fixed neutrality zones of five miles. Spain and Portugal stated that their customs zone is now six miles but even this is only half of the twelve miles zone which the United States customs regulations have fixed.

Italy applies a zone of five kilometers for the supervision of navigation and a zone of ten kilometers within which the captain of a vessel must have a passport for entering territorial waters. On the African coast a twelve mile customs zone is enforced the same as in American for the rum runners.

The United States, along with all of the rest of the nations of the world, has been asked to send in to the League convention, before an international conference is finally summoned for launching it.

Tower of London Cracking Under Tides of Thames

LONDON.—Tides of the Thames are cracking the Tower of London.

The rise and fall of heavy tides on the Thames, world-famous as a river, but really little more than a tidal estuary, has caused large crevices in the Beauchamp Tower, the Salt Tower and several archways of the old prison.

The cracks open and close periodically during the day, corresponding with the rise and fall of the tides of the Thames. Although the gaps in the ancient walls are well defined, none of the affected parts show signs of crumbling or falling.

Much of the city along the Thames is floating on a marshy land, consisting principally of a heavy black mud. Recently the Waterloo Bridge, crossing the Thames from the central part of the city sagged in the middle. Some experts declare this sagging was due to the constant washing of the river tides.

Two bastions of the old walls of the Tower are said to be Roman, and their origin has been actually traced back to the reign of King Alfred during the Ninth Century. The White Tower was begun in 1078. The main court is approximately in the center and is surrounded by walls and towers forming the inner and outer wards.

The towers of the inner wards were formerly used for prisoners' lodgings, but a complete royal palace was afterwards built in one corner. Of this palace, from which Queen Anne Boleyn went to her death on an adjoining green, scarcely a vestige remains.

The Tower of London is famous for its beheadings of the Tudor days and memorials to many victims of "royal writs of death" are now in various parts of the ancient monument to political prisoners of former days.

Many Englishmen declare that the "cracks" in the Tower's walls were started by American tourists who chipped the walls for mementos to take home.

GERMANY'S AND RUSSIA'S FRIENDSHIP IS CAUSING JEALOUSY AMONG POWERS

Continuously increasing relations between Germany and Russia are developing and are causing disquietude in western Europe. There is no possibility that Germany can make a military ally of Russia for many years to come, but the persistently peaceful penetration of Russian industry by German trade specialists is laying the basis for an eventual alliance, unless German activities meet with resistance from other European powers.

It is probable that this situation very shortly will cause the British Government to take its efforts for an understanding with Russia based on financial considerations. Here is the major advantage Great Britain has over Germany. The German financiers have no money to loan Russia or to invest in Russian industries. Germany will remain a poor country for a long time because of the operation of the Dawes Plan. Nearly all of Germany's surplus funds, which normally might find an outlet in Russian and other foreign investments, are absorbed for indemnity payments to the victors, in the world war.

Great Britain
Great Britain, on the other hand, has adequate funds for foreign trade exploitation. But, the British Government and British capitalists are not yet convinced that money loaned to Russia will ever be repaid. German traders venturing into Russia have a different opinion, but their operations are only on a small scale. They cannot do much to re-establish Russian industry. Nevertheless, the political effect of their persistent friendliness toward the Russians is of the utmost value to Germany, in possibilities of the future and this situation undoubtedly will soon stimulate British financiers under government suggestion to begin taking chances with Russian investments.

Money Invested
To the present, those international capitalists who have put money into Russian enterprises since the Soviet authorities began to invite foreign assistance, have had no cause for complaint. Obligations have been met and there has been no official effort at Moscow to evade the responsibilities being incurred. British financiers who have been closely following events in Russia, predicted four to five years ago that Russian recovery would be coincident with the increasing confidence of foreign investors that their money would be safe if loaned to Russian borrowers. This is beginning to prove correct.

Every unbiased report now coming from Russia points to a continuous improvement in the efficiency of the administration and in the gradual recovery of the country from the devastation of foreign and civil strife. The government itself is undergoing a gradual evolution and the country is slowly becoming the most promising undeveloped field in the world for financial investment. It will only be a comparatively short time before a Russian international loan is floated somewhere in Europe, if not in New York. The British are now alertly studying the possibilities of such a coup with the advantages it would give to their trades.

Moscow
But, the Moscow Internationale, which is not yet fully separated from the Moscow government, in the eyes of foreigners, has done a bad turn to Russian industry by creating the impression that it was trying to help bring about a revolution in Great Britain during the recent general

strike. Interference by the Moscow Internationale with the domestic affairs of foreign countries is the suspected, where not actually proven, in the western European capitals. Especially are the British authorities suspicious of this movement. They desire to obtain the most explicit pledges from Russia that the Moscow government denudes the activities of the Internationale, phrased in such form as in effect to mark an actual break between the Internationale, leaders and the Moscow soviet.

It is difficult for the Russian government to take such a step. The government is not averse to denying that it has any formal association with the Internationale, but these denials are not phrased in such a way nor are they followed up by such action as has convinced the House of Commons. If this were done, it is probable that the last major obstacle to the re-establishment of Anglo-Russian relations be removed. A loan to Russia is ready for the making in London and both economic and political reasons justify it. But, there is still the question of international propaganda to be settled before the British are willing to go ahead.

"At 25 we have discovered how little we know; "Therefore, the ideal age is 25, because one has then become disillusioned, and cynical, and still has some useful enthusiasm left—tempered with experience."

WORKING GIRLS OF LONDON ARE GETTING PRETTY


LONDON—London's working girls are yearly growing beautiful.

According to Sir Thomas Legge, Senior Medical Inspector of Factories, the last 20 years have shown a marked improvement in the beauty of the English working girl. He attributes the improvement to an open air life, more exercise and higher wages.

"In the last factory visited," he said, "I noted that 72 per cent of the girls were good-looking—of the Rossotti, Eurn-Jones or Greek type—28 per cent were average looking and none at all were bad looking."

"The change in health is remarkable. Twenty years ago, records show 30 to 35 per cent of the working girls were anaemic. Today the figure is five per cent."

Grand Jury Wants Co-operation Of Enforcement

The ninety-first district court grand jury, convened at the opening of the present term of that court in June, and which has taken one or more recesses since convening, finally adjourned Tuesday afternoon at which time a report, signed by R. E. Sikes of Eastland as foreman, was made to Judge Davenport.

Following is the report: To the Honorable George L. Davenport, judge of the ninety-first district court:

We, the grand jury, for the month of June, and July, term of your court, beg to make this our final report.

We have been in session seven days and have examined 132 witnesses, and returned 23 true bills of indictment, 22 felonies and one misdemeanor. We have thoroughly examined every matter that has been called to our attention and voted bills in every case in which evidence warranted such action.

We have inspected the county jail and find same in good condition.

We find that many of the matters which have come before us should have been handled by the county attorney and other law enforcement officers, and recommend that a closer co-operation between the county attorney's department and the sheriff's department and various city officers be had.

We also find that there is a great deal of drinking whiskey and beer in this country, but we were unable to secure sufficient evidence to vote true bills. We recommend that our enforcing officers give this violation closer attention.

We wish to express our appreciation to Hon. George L. Davenport, County Attorney W. J. Barnes and the sheriff's department for the services and courtesies rendered us during this term.

Having completed our deliberations we ask this honorable court to discharge us from further service.

Toleration For Europeans Coolidge's Plea

By United Press. PAUL SMITHS, New York, July 28.—President Calvin Coolidge today, through his spokesman, called upon the American people to disregard the occasional petty hatreds of the European nations thrown toward our tourists, and in retaliation, show them regard and tolerance.

His spokesman pointed out that the war-stricken nations are now undergoing a severe depression, economically and commercially, and they are inclined to criticize Presidents of this nation.

Mr. Coolidge's spokesman himself criticized "sumptuous" tourists, who, not finding European conditions satisfactory, make themselves disagreeable to the natives of those nations by openly showing irritating condemnations and dislike.

There are two types of tourists, the spokesman said; those who stay in Europe and complain when they believe themselves mistreated and those who attempted to adjust their beliefs to prevalent conditions and that failing, turn quietly to their own country.

Movie Film Being Made This Year Would Make "Mother Earth" Ten Belts Each 24,000 Miles Long

MOVIE FILM BEING 18 2 col. Nearly ten times around the world—that is the approximate footage of the film being used this year in the manufacture of films.

That means a whole lot of miles of film. But the movie fans needn't worry; the film isn't going to be used for any such foolish purpose. It's going to be used in the making of movies, and better ones than ever, according to the producers and theatre owners who have arranged for Greater Movie Season, to celebrate the fact that 1926 is the thirtieth birthday of this most popular form of entertainment.

Ten Times Around the Earth. The scheduled production of "raw stock," as the trade calls the unexposed film, is 1,250,000,000 feet, which works out into 236,742 and a quarter miles. Roughly speaking, the earth is 24,000 miles in circumference, and so the film would girdle it nine times and go pretty well around on the tenth lap.

Part of the film is used for "negatives," upon which the action of the photoplay is originally impressed, but by far the larger part of it goes into the production of "positive prints"—those which are run through the projection machines at the theaters. The average number of prints made from the negative of a photodrama is about seventy-five, although in the cases of several super-features, for which there was a demand for "simultaneous showings"
