500,000 Gallons Destroyed at Spindletop; Lightning Starts Fire.

PORT ARTHUR, July 23 .- More than 600,000 barrels of oil stored in two underground tanks belonging to the Sun company, were destroyed in the Spindletop oil fields today when the tanks were set on fire by lightning. Steel tanks of the Magnolia were threatened with destruction at noon when boiling oil poured out from the underground reservoirs and swept over nearby tank farms. Loss to the Sun company is said to

be more than \$500,000.
