
Mr. Windrow's decision settles an argument that has raged at intervals for more than a year. It has been for more than a year. It has been the state highway department's contention that the highway should go out Oak street and around the Prairie camp, as it would be necessary to cross the railroad twice in order to traverse the business district. The department objects to grade crossings whenever it is possible to eliminate them. The Ranger good roads workers, on the other hand, had wanted the road to cross the tracks, and continue south out Rusk street, in order that tourists would not neglect to look the city over.

Mr. Windrow's ruling is a compromise. He agreed to a grade crossing at Main street but vetoed the Rusk street plan, and fixed the routing through Ranger as follows: Strawn road and Hunt street; one block south on Hunt to East Main; on East Main and Railroad avenue to the Main street crossing; turn to left at the crossing and south on Commerce.
