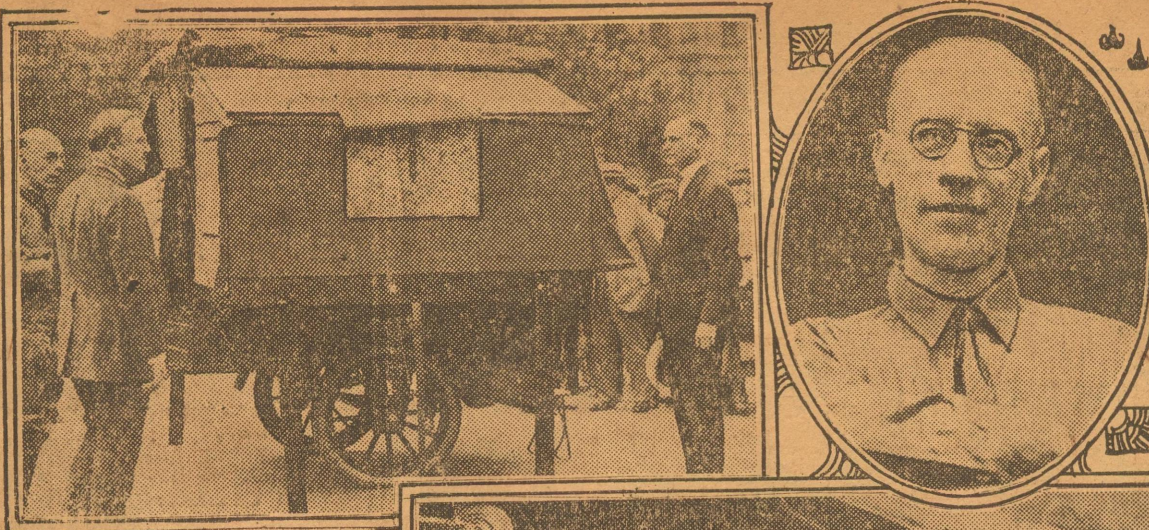

EASTLAND POST LANDS BODY BLOW ON NEGRO LOVING LEGIONNAIRES

EASTLAND, Aug. 2.—S. O. Pottorff has been elected post commander of the Dulin-Daniels post, American Legion at this place, and C. C. Ridgeway, adjutant.

Denunciation of the Sol-Sai-Mar post of the American Legion for action in banqueting, publicly endorsing Jack Johnson, negro pugilist who has recently been released from Leavenworth federal prison where he was confined for a violation of the Mann act, is expressed in the following resolution adopted by the Eastland post:

"Whereas, we have knowledge of the fact through the public press and otherwise, that one Jack Johnson, federal prison at Leavenworth, Kans. after serving a sentence for violation of the Mann act, and who was prior to that time a fugitive from justice, is again preparing to enter the ring as a professional boxer, and

"Whereas, we have knowledge of the fact that the Chicago post of the American Legion has formally and publicly endorsed and placed their moral support behind the said Johnson and especially as pertains to a possible bout between he and Jack Dempsey, now therefore be it

"Resolved, that this post in a special meeting assembled, while not extolling or praising the merits, fidelity or integrity of Dempsey, go on record as being unalterably opposed to such action as was taken by the Chicago post, and believing same a disgrace and contrary to the high ideals and patriotic spirit of the American Legion, we do hereby solemnly protest against the action of the Chicago post as mentioned above and be it further resolved a copy of this resolution be sent to national headquarters of the American Legion, state headquarters, the Chicago post and to the press. S. O. Pottorff, commander; C. C. Ridgeway, post adjutant."

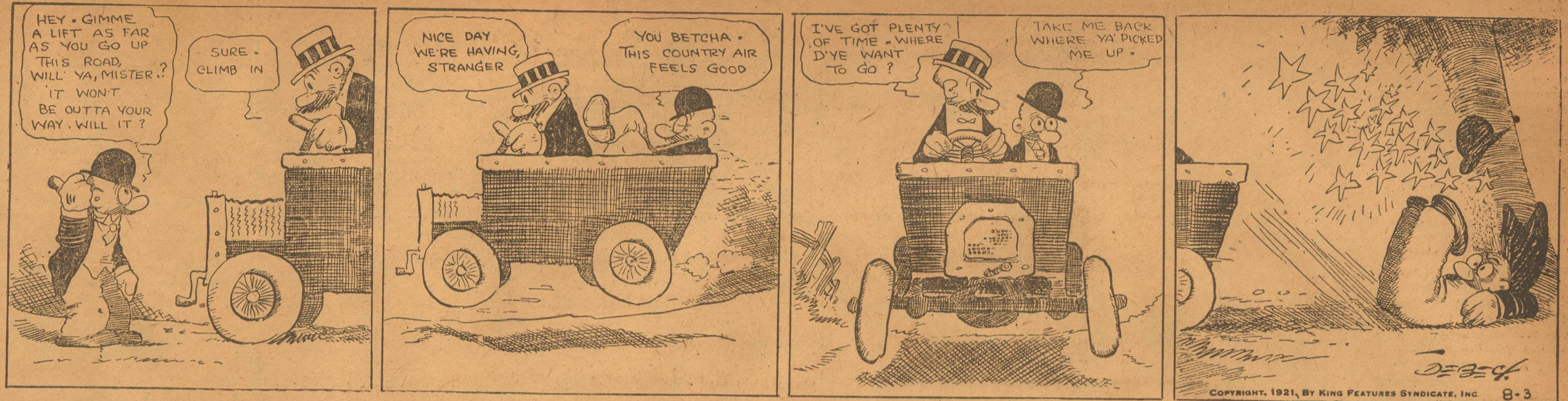
