ALSO RAVAGED; TWO INJURFD INESC Wilson Hotel, Robinson Bath and Row of Frame

Structures Burned; Eastward Spread Stopped by Texas Garage.

At 3:10 o'clock the fire had been brought under control, after sweeping from the Robinson bath house to the corner of Marston and Cherry streets. The two-story house on Cherry, just back of the Marston corner, was saved, as were the Savoy rooms and the concrete building on Walnut street. The two latter buildings were badly damaged. With these exceptions, the entire west half of a block of frame and beaver-board houses was consumed.

Fire at 2:30 today, after destroying several buildings on Marston and Walnut streets, was sweeping its way toward Cherry street. The flames at 1:30 were discovered in the rear and on the southern wall of an old garage on Marston street. From that point it spread into the Robinson bath house building, to maintain a subordinate parliament forty-nine members of the house who son hctel, which faces Walnut street but is against the old garage at the rear.

He was asleep in COWARDLY, SAYS JUDGE the upper story and did not awaken until the flames were all arcund him. He is burned on the face and feet and has a broken ankle caused from dropping from the second story of the building. Evans is a baker employed by the City bakery.

Miss Clara Fowler, 20 years old, was in the upper story of the Robinson house building and hurt her back and arm when she fell while climbing down from the third floor.

Several others were bruised in the struggle to recapture a hose which had jerked loose from fire fighters' hands.

The following buildings are a total loss at 3:30: The Wilson hotel, Robinson bath house and barber shop, the American cafe and the abandoned garage on Marston street, and the row of wooden houses on Marston street. Most of the contents of the buildings also were consumed. The Wilson hotel was of frame construction and burned rapidly. Several negro shacks in the alley had also burned. At 2:30 it looked certain that the Savoy rooms, which is on the corner of Walnut and Marston, would go.

The loss will run into many thousands of dollars. It is said little if any insurance was carried.
