Taxi Driver Only Witness of Midnight Encounter on **Residential Street.** 

GALVESTON, July 31 .- Samuel W. Block, age 54, vice president and gen-eral manager of the Galveston Dry Goods company, is dead and Tom J. Blackstone, county superintendent of instruction, is being held by police, as a result of a shooting affray here late last night. Blackstone was arrested shortly after midnight on a description furnished by F. W. Schmidt, taxi driver, the only eye-witness to the shooting.

According to Schmidt, he was called to a house in the residential section about 11:30 o'clock last night, and a man came out and got in the car, telling him to wait, as another passenger was coming. While waiting for the passenger, a man walking along the street approached the car. As he got opposite the automobile, the passenger sprang out and struck at the pedestrian. The men clinched and two shots were fired. Then both men began running and the man identified as Block fell.

Police were notified and within a short time Blackstone was taken into custody. CHICAGO, July 31.-A tank 60 feet wide and 100 feet high, containing thousands of cubic feet of gas, blew up today at Twenty-fifth and Throop street, a section inhabited mostly by laborers, injuring more than a score of persons, setting fire to a dozen houses and causing many persons within an area of several blocks to be overcome by the fumes. The flames were brought under control by the fire department. The cause of the explosion is unknown. The top of the tank blew off

and witnesses say simultaneously a tremendeus sheet of flames shot upward. Within a few seconds houses were burning and scores of persons were fleeing. A shop on the Chicago river caught fire and for some time several large lumber yards were threatened.

Within 30 minutes after the explosion, 25 injured persons had been taken to hospitals and dozens of others were said to be receiving attention in private homes. The tank was owned by the Peoples Gas, Light & Coke company, which announced that it contained 4,200,000 cubic feet of gas.

## LOST AVIATOR LANDS IN MIDST **CARIBOU HERD**

#### Yukon Airman Is Rescued by Search Party After Trek Across Mountains.

#### By Associated Press.

DAWSON, Y. T., July 31.-Full of the thrills of a "best seller" is the story of the experience of Clarence O. Prest, aviator, while attempting a flight across Yukon, Territory and Alaska,

Prest flew with his moving pic ure camera above a great herd of caribou and was forced to land in their midst. He slaughtered one to keep from starving. The herd is part of the great body of caribou which annually trek across the region near Dawson and Eagle.

Prest took a roundabout way from San Bernardino, Cal., to the far north, and his own story of his experience is told in the following dispatch from Eagle:

#### Caribou Surround Plane.

"Thirty minutes out of Eagle, my engine bucked. I looked for a landing place and picked out what looked novie camera so as to get them. More of them were coming, so I began to see about taking off.

'Turning I noticed five or six hundred caribou all around the plane and camera, and rushed back expecting to find the latter ruined, but no damage was done. I got ready to take off, but the plane went upon its nose in the soft going and broke the
