





counties of this old land by farmers iness and stay with us." who raise fruits and particularly strawberries. Such tales are not of-ten heard in England. English farm-ers, as a rule, take more delight in try home, or else to travel and hunt telling tales of woe than of well-be-with him. ing.

Giving details of this agricultural prosperity, the report says: "In one case a man cut up a field of 15 acres in acre plots and offered it to the laborers of the parish. He had ar-ranged the payments to extend over ten years, but nine of the fifteen pur-chasers paid for it on the spot. Within four years all the rest paid up. One of them during the last three years has sold 1,000 pounds worth of strawberries from his one acre plot

"It is not to strawberries alone that such men turn their attention They make good profits out of plums, apples, cherries, gooseberries and currants.

"At the time of the great agricul-tural depression Gladstone suggested that farmers should grow fruit instead of corn. His suggestion was received with scorn and derision by the old-fashioned farmers. One man, however, thought the experiment worth trying. He has retired with a large fortune. Hundreds of others are now following in his footsteps."







### METERS TO BE USED IN WEIGHING TRUCK LOADS

FORT WORTH, July 15 .- Two load meters, to be used in weighing truck loads being hauled over Tarrant county roads and enforcing the state highway law, were received by the Tarrant county commissioners court Thursday. The machines cost \$200 each.

They will be carried around in a motorcycle sidecar or an automobile and when a passing truck load appears to be in violation of the law the meters will be brought into play They are in the form of hydraulic jacks which register the weight applied to the supporting beam. One is placed under each side of the rear axle and the rear is weighed and then one is placed under each side of the front axle while the front is weighed. The total registered weight represents the total weight of the truck and load. On fifty trials the meters made a maximum error of fifty-six pounds.
