### Palmer Won't Have CHANDI, INDIAN Crowd Alarmed by Rattle on His Roof

The east wall of the Commercial hotel ruins on Main street, which for some time has threatened to fall, was attacked this morning by a crew of negroes employed by W. B. Palmer, owner of the Liberty theatre, to remove the menace to his theatre. While the lathe and plaster sidewall of the ruins is not heavy enough to wreck the theatre building, it was feared that the sound of the falling wall on the roof would start a panie in the theatre and result in injury to the patrons.

While the city authorities are taking up the matter of wrecking the fire-gutted building, through the city attorneys, the wall has been rocking in the high wind and threatening to fall at any moment. Yesterday men were sent to the top of the theatre building and attempted to tie the walls with wire, until a wrecking crew could start leveling the wall to the first story. It is understood that only the east wall of the ruins will be wrecked by the picture show owner and that the wrecking of the front part of the building, which is also reported in a dangerous condition, will have to

await action by the city. At the last meeting of the city commission, the reports of a local contractor was read, recommending that the front of the building be leveled to the second story and that the rear portion be wrecked to the first story. The building has been condemned on several occasions by state and city inspectors.

Efforts to have the owner of the ground wreck the building having failed, the city secretary was instructed by the commission to have the city attorneys take the proper legal steps to carry out the recommendations. The matter was immediately referred to Levy & Evans, who





The well was started four years ago, but not completed until 1920. Its production, which is coming from a depth of 1,175-1,268 feet, consist of 92 per cent pure asphalt, and ½ per cent to 1 per cent water, with the reaining percentage consisting of ubricating oils. The production rises to within sixty feet of the top of the hole and is extracted by bailing, the fluid being to heavy to pump.
