The other officer managed to escape, but General Dodd was dragged inside the Red prisoners' stockade. The other officer's name was not available.

A report from the island prison off the South Korean coast said a note had been passed from the stockade, but its contents were not disclosed. This report said that Dodd had not been harmed. It was several hours old,

If You Speed, Sooner Or Later Law Of Averages Will Get You

Of the 37.100 persons who were killed in traffic accidents in this country last year, 27,900 were destroyed by the actions of drivers. Of these 27,900, speeding drivers killed 13.730. Drivers who were using the wrong side of the road killed 5,100, those who did not or would not yield the right of way bumped off 2,570, and plain reckless driving accounted for 2,900.

These driver faults and others were present in the injury of 1,450,000 people.

The man or woman at the wheel, therefore, is the kingpin of traffic socidents, and by the same token the kingpin of traffic safety. As drivers conduct themselves, so is the nation's safety record affected one way or the other.

The modern automebile is a marvelous machine, as far from the one-lungers of the gay Nineties as the atomic bomb is ahead of Greek fire. It is structurally and mechanically sound and dependable. Mechanical failures figure seldom in accidents.

But as good as are our motor cars, they

are only as safe as their drivers make them. Our traffic laws are good only inso-

them. Our traffic laws are good only insofar as they are observed. They are observed only insofar as they are enforced.

Speeders claimed 49.2 per cent of the human lives snuffed out last year in accidents attributed to driver faults. Since many of the crashes attributed to speeding resulted in multiple deaths, perhaps not more than 5.000 drivers were involved in this type of lethal malpractice.

Yet millions of drivers in this country exceed the speed limit at one time or another, and a great many of them do it habitually. Those who escaped killing someone can call themselves lucky. Few of them have stopped to ask themselves, "What if I should kill someone?"

To stay on the safe side of your conscience, observe the speed limits. They are set as much for your own protection as for anyone else's. You may beat the law of averages most of the time, but sooner or later reckless driving may take your own life or that of some loved one.

Treason: Wall Streeter Regards Republican Win Bad For Stocks

SAN FRANCISCO, -The big argument among the financial analysts in conven-tion at the Fairmount Hotel here is the election. But it's not who's best for the country—Eisenhower, Taft or whom have you. Rather, it's what party's best for the stock market.

The argument started in New York a week before the big brains behind the big money set forth for California. Ralph E. Samuel, partner in the New York Stock Exchange firm of Ralph E. Samuel & Co., committed Wall Street treason. He expressed openly the notion that a Republican president would be bad for stock

Argued Samuel: "For 20 years the Democratic Party has been the spending party, the party of the unbalanced budget, the party of deficit financing." The withdrawal of the "two strongest Democratic candidates," President Truman and Governor Adlai Stevenson of Illinois, greatly favors a Republican victory in November. Therefore, he continued:

"The deficit financing party may b on the way out and the budget balancing party may be on the way in. This, of course, may be sound and splendid 'happenstance' for, the U.S.A., but it could mean and very likely will mean a painful, difficult readjustment, not only for many types of business but for the stock market

But Harry D. Comer, of the New York Stock Exchange firm of Paine, Webber, Jackson & Curtis, has no patience with that view. In a major convention address on the stock market, he declared a Republican victory would generate investor confidence. For Comer, inflation never has been a "sound basis" for prosperity in America or anywhere else. Sustained bull markets occur under conditions of stable or slightly declining price levels.

Comer went on to say that the stock market is on solid ground. Investors did not go crary over the high earnings of 1950. They anticipated the present decline. And with a Republican administration, taxes are likely to be reduced shout the years. That means not only higher corporation earnings, but more consumer income and more investor intain business. More investor income would sustain stock prices. And regardless of party, Comer contended, defense expenditures will remain high.

In the words of Arthur Wiesenberger. senior partner of Arthur Wiesenberger & Co., who supports Comer's view, a Republican victory would make it possible for a "market with a Rolls Royce potential" to snap out of its Model T per-

The facts in this argument are that anybody's right. You prove what you will. Democrats have been victorious Presidentially nine times since 1872. In those years, the stock market advanced seven times between April and October, declined only twice, in 1884 when Cleveland won, and in 1940 when Roosevelt was elected for the third term. On the other hand, in eleven Republican years the stock market went down five times between April and October, up only six times. Stock marketwise that makes the Democrats look good. But wait!

Republicans can answer that what counts isn't what happens before election, but aftrwards. And Republican victories have been followed by market advances eight times, by drops only three timesin 1876, when Hayes finally got the call over Tilden, in 1888 when Harrison won, in 1920 when Harding brought back "normalcy." Those, incidentally, were all bad business years. There was a depression in 1876, a recession in '88 as well as a blizzard, and the postwar commodity collapse took place in 1920. Democratic victories have resulted in six post-election declin and only three increases,

So much for election statistics. As for me, my chips are on Stalin. Tell me what he'll do about war and peace, and I'd feel sure about stock prices. If war, I'd be bearish because of tighter controls. If peace, I'd be bearish, because of a decline in defense expenditures. But, on the other hand, war would be inflationary, therefore bullish on stocks. And peace would mean lower taxes and greater confidence about the long-term future.





Justice Will Probe **Testimony On Bases**

WASHINGTON OF — Clashing testimony alleging and denying wide-scale graft and malpractice at huge U. S. airbases in French Morocco was marked today for Justice Department investigation.

Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson (D-Tex) announced his Senate Preparedness Subcommittee will hand a transcript of the testimony to the Justice Depart ment "for appropriate action."

Johnson's group is exploring charges that corruption and mismangement have added tons of millions to the cost of the bases, started as a rush project during a war scare in early days of the Korean fighting.

The five bases, estimated to cost between 300 and 412 million dollars, ultimately will be banded over to the French government.

They were built by Atlas Con-structors, a combine of five contracting firms.

Chicago this week members are re ported trading tips on two profitable fields some are exploiting: take-home food service and the coffee break in business offices and

factories.

A big pick up in each is reported.
Declining sales and profits have spurred promotion of both services. Sales by the nation's esting places last year were off by about one billion dollars from the peak year of 1948, when they topped 12 billion dollars. Now sales are picking up again, members report.

Take-home service is combatting.

Take-home service is combatting the three chief troubles: 1. TV, which keeps many families home; 2. rising restaurant costs, which prices many families out of eat-ing places; and 3. more babies, which means either hiring a babysitter if you eat out, or taking jun

prime market for take-home restaurant service, according to Fen
K. Doscher, a paper cup firm vicepresident, who is pretty incrested
in the idea, naturally, because his
company is a supplier of containers for the food being taken home.

work, he says, the family is a set-up for sale of hard-to-prepare dish-es around which the wife can as-semble a quick and easy meal. The National Restaurant Associ-

ation is setting up a committee to study what foods are best for the service. Most restaurant men say it's best to concentrate on entrees, salads and desserts, They say bevrages, and vegetables can be sup-slied easily at home and the paron balks at the paying restaurant rices for them.

It's a high margin of profit business for the restaurant because the tax-home food can be prepared during the slack time between lunch and dinner, and carries with it no costs for linen, laundering, dishwashing, or for dishes and sliver.

At the other end of the line, entering to the thousands who like to break the morning's work routine with coffee and cakes is fast growing into a big thing around the nation, according to W. F. Williamson, executive vice president of the National Coffee Association.

Belgian Congo Due To See Its **First Circus** BRUSSELS, Belglum (# - Al-

phonse de Jonghe and his three brothers are going to give the Belgian Congo its first circus. It Beigan Congo its first circus, it is costing the brothers \$240,000 and they hope that the natives, paying a minimum of 40 cents admission, will make it a profitable venture.

The circus convoy of 15 heavy trucks and several station wagons will move across the Congo jungle

to make its various stops. Two ships and a place were used in transporting the slaborate equip-ment and white personnel—30 men and women—to the Congo. The De Jonghes encountered

native actors.

De Jonge could bring no lions into the Congo. A ban had been in effect because of rabid fever. But the ban has been lifted, and De Jonghe plans to train some young lions on the spot and intro-duce them into the show.
