**UNION AGENT TELLS OF BRIBE TO END WALKOUT**

CHICAGO, March 2.—Felix Browarsky, a South Side real estate operator, testifying in Judge John R. Caberly's court, where Simon O'Donnell, former president of the Chicago Building Trades council and three other labor officials are on trial, asserted he had acted as a go-between and paid \$8,500 to two of the defendants to settle three strikes. He testified \$7,500 went to O'Donnell and \$1,000 to Albert Green, business agent of the painters' union.

**BURNS CAUSE DEATH OF SMALL BAIRD BOY**

BAIRD, Texas, March 2.—Four-year-old Franklin Alexander, youngest child of Mr. and Mrs. R. L. Alexander, was burned to death at 9:30 Wednesday morning in the bathroom of his home where he was playing when his clothing caught fire from an open gas heater. The screams of the child were heard by his nurse who ran to the bathroom and found him in flames.

Her frantic cries brought W. W. Kirby to the scene, who smothered the flames and extinguished an incipient fire that was licking up the base boards in the bath room. By that time the boy was dead. Interment was made Wednesday afternoon in Ross cemetery.

A pathetic incident of the happening is the fact that Mrs. Alexander is desperately ill and the physician deemed it dangerous to inform her of her baby's horrible death, but finally did, and it was necessary to administer opiates to quiet her.

**FATHER WHO DROWNED SON INDICTED BY JURY**

NEW YORK, March 2.—An indictment charging first degree murder was returned yesterday by the Bronx grand jury against Walter H. Liddle, the 19-year-old father, who confessed to drowning his 7-months-old son in a bathtub on Sunday in order to revenge himself on his wife, who would not live with him.

Assistant District Attorney Oliver said he would ask for a commission to inquire into Liddle's sanity. If he is found sane his trial will begin next week.

MANILA, P. I., March 2.—Five persons were killed and many injured by a severe earthquake that shook the city of Cebu and vicinity yesterday. The property damage was heavy.

**MODERN GIRL IS GOOD AS MOTHER AT SAME AGE?**

CHICAGO, March 2.—Mother was a flapper, too, except that that modern appellation hadn't been imported from England in her day, and the campus customs of twenty-five years ago didn't have the benefit of 1922 publicity methods.

That is the reason Miss Eleanor Adams, president of Oxford college for women, Oxford, Ohio, defends the galosh-flopping, bobbed-haired wearer of knee-length skirts of today. "The socially grotesque features of today are no worse than those of other times," said Miss Adams, one of the delegates to the conference of Deans of Women.

Remember, she said, the "Merry Widow" hat, "balloon" sleeves, the wire "rat" of the once famous pompadour, and the "Boston dip" waist. "I am very optimistic about the modern girl," she continued. "She will be a much more intelligent mother than her own mother was."

"The modern girl has developed initiative. Her surplus energy expands itself in radical opinions, extreme dress and restlessness. She is puzzled a little about what to do with what she learns in college, but we are striving to train her, not so much for leadership as for service."

**DENTIST MOURNED AS DEAD FOUND ALIVE**

SWARTHMORE, March 2.—Dr. Harold E. Roy, a New York dentist, and former Swarthmore college athlete, mourned as dead for nearly a year, is alive and well in Los Angeles. Since he was reported to have been drowned in a canoe accident in the Hudson river last March, Dr. Roy apparently had been wandering about the country, a victim of amnesia, which robbed him of power of memory.

He recently regained his memory in Kansas City, located his wife in Los Angeles and hastened there to join her.

**Suitor Sues Wife When She Refuses to Quit Husband**

DENVER, March 2.—If you give your "sweetie" a bathrobe, a pair of slippers and a pair of warm blankets, expecting to win her heart by such offerings, and she changes her mind, because she is already married and prefers to live with her husband, can you make her repay you for the courtship offerings?

This question is being threshed out in Judge John W. Sheafor's division of the district court. Upon how the jury determines the question of recovering \$1,320, which he alleges he spent on Mrs. Dorothy Briggs of Salida, Colo., in the hope of winning her for his bride.


