# Numerous Checks Forged on Driller

Between \$400 and \$500 worth of forged checks, bearing the name of the Sullivan Drilling company have been passed in various oil field towns in the last few weeks, R. E. Sullivan announced this morning, and he issues a warning to all persons to watch for the spurious documents. One of the checks was cashed in Ranger, another in Mineral Wells, and others in Breckenridge and Graham. In amounts they range between \$10 and \$100.

The forged checks are very crude, Mr. Sullivan says, being drawn on ordinary counter checks in poor handwriting. They are generally signed "R. B. Sullivan, by Keller," or some such almost illegible name.

All checks issued by the company, it is announced, are on regular company checks, with the name Sullivan Drilling company, printed on them, and signed by R. E. Sullivan or L. E. Harmon.
