SOUTH BEND, March 1.-Fire starting from the explosion of an oil stove in the Shamrock cafe, near the railroad tracks, early this morning, swept two blocks of the city, destroying business houses, hotels, rooming houses and residences and driving 200 to 300 persons from their rooms. into the blizzard in their night clothes. The loss is estimated at between \$75,000 and \$100,000.

Both sides of the main street leading from the depot were swept clean of buildings as far as the McCleskey hotel, where a lot made vacant by a fire some time ago, checked the flames, which had resisted all efforts of the volunteer fire department.

Although plenty of water was available, no headway could be made by the fire fighters, owing to the high wind and the severe cold. No one is reported to have

been seriously injured and all were given temporary shelter in shacks and buildings over the town. All of the buildings in the burned area were frame, with the exception of the South Bend bank building which was constructed of concrete and stucco.

SLEEPING CLOTHES VOLSTE

The thirty buildings destroyed included those occupied by the Worth hotel, Texas Meat market, South Bend garage, Weaver Dry Goods company, South Bend bank, Harding Drug company, Mormon hotel, O. K. cafe, Timmons house, Muton Drug company, Just Right tailors and Adam Drug company.

Most of the persons rendered homeless were guests of hotels and rooming houses or the families of the owners of the business houses, who had quarters over or in the rear of the establishments.

The conflagration this morning was the third big fire here within the last six weeks.



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

Dear Sir-Answering yours of the 6th, addressed to the county attorney of Okmulgee county, requesting hat you be permitted to appear before the grand jury and testify fully as to all facts which may shed any light upon matters being considered by that body, personally, I have no bjection whatever to your appearing before the grand jury, provided the grand jury should decide to have you efore it as a witness. The only authority that I have been able to find on the matter is Section 5721, Revised Statutes of 1910, which section authorizes the county attorney to subpoena and bring before the grand ury witnesses for the defendant. I am in doubt at this time whether the county attorney has any right to bring before the grand jury any person who s himself being investigated. However, I will look into the matter more

fully and advise you later. As I suggested. I have no objections to this If I should find that I have the legal right to permit you to appear before the grand jury, I will notify you withn the next few days. Yours very ruly.
