J. C. Sims, who was burned in the explosion on the Boyd lease several months ago, is reported as getting along nicely.

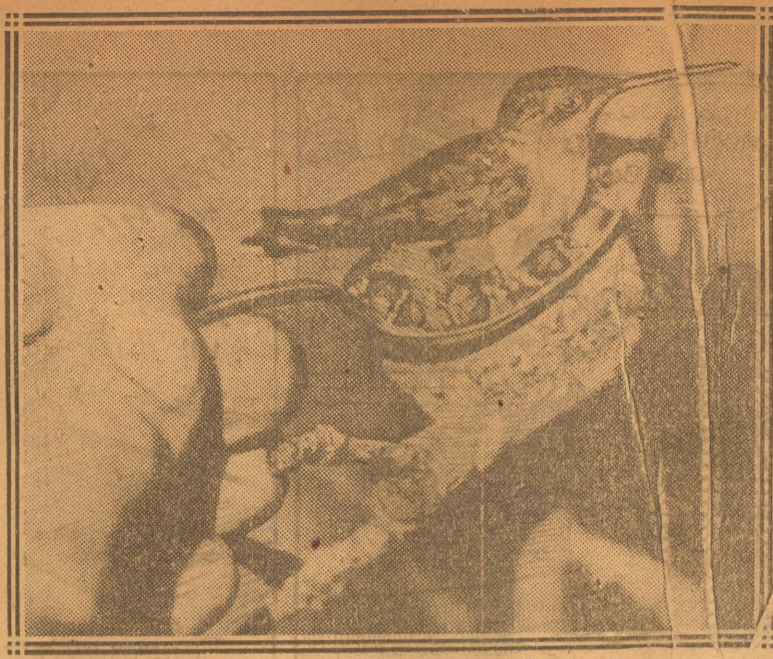
Robin Pope of Fort Worth was a visitor in Ranger yesterday.

NAME WANTED FOR GOAT MEAT COLLEGE STATION, Texas, April 11.—Addition of a suitable designation for goat meat is to be added to the nomenclature of livestock products by a committee of Texans.

Dr. B. Youngblood, director of the Texas agricultural experiment station, A. & M. college, has accepted the appointment on a committee to decide the most appropriate name to designate the meat of the goat. The Sheep and Goat Raisers' association of Texas is conducting a contest in which a prize of high class Angora buck is being offered by B. M. Halbert, breeder of Angoras at Sonora, Texas, to the person suggesting a name for goat meat which will be accepted by the committee as the most appropriate.

MEN TRICKED 'EM!

ALTUS, Ark., April 11.—A complete ticket of women candidates for city offices here was defeated in the municipal election after a vigorous campaign and after a rousing meeting, in which the success of the feminine movement was predicted.

BELL MAY GET CROW'S SEAT IN SENATE



Reports, persistent in Pittsburgh, declare that Senator Crow of Pennsylvania, soon will retire and that John A. Bell, 67-year-old multi-millionaire, will succeed him. Reports that Bell's possible succession to the senate involved payment by him of \$650,000 have been emphatically denied by both Bell and Governor Sprout.

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ANOTHER GAS PLANT UNDER CONSTRUCTION NORTH OF DESDEMONA

DESDEMONA, April 11.—Three miles north of Desdemona on the Jakehamon railroad the Oakland Gasoline Production company, with headquarters at Tulsa, Okla., is erecting a two-unit gasoline plant. The Fico Gasoline Production company is joint promoter of this plant, which will be an absorption plant similar to the one owned and operated by the Fico company southeast of Desdemona. A switch is being built to the Oakland plant and several carloads of machinery will be unloaded there, and over fifty men will be used in the construction of the plant.

The gasoline plants in the Desdemona field make up a large part of the oil activity here and there are a large number of them in this field which afford employment for quite a large force. Others will likely be built in the near future. The Magnolia company owns the majority of these plants now operating.
