

# INDERWORLD SEIZES NEW **DOPE SUPPLY**

#### New York Police Look for Renewed Crime Wave to Follow Robbery.

By United Press. NEW YORK, April 22 .- With distribution of \$100,000 worth of opium in the New York underworld, following a holdup of a wholesale druggist's truck, police prepared to battle against another week-end reign of lawlessness, which they believe will follow. Recent activities of the city narcotic squad has about exhausted the illegal supply of habit-forming drugs, police say, and this new robbery was believed to be planned to replace the underworld stock. Charles Piazza, driver of the truck for McKesson & Robins, wholesale druggists, said he was forced to stop the car and enter a limousine while five men made away with the truck, he told the police. On the truck was ten cases of opium valued at \$100,000, according to prices paid for it by addicts.




