Mandate for Confinement of Austin's Alleged Ku Kluxers Can't Go Three Blocks in Day; Duplicate Dellvered.

AUSTIN, April 29-The mandate in the Travis county Ku Klux Klan contempt cases, mailed at 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon by the clerk of the court of criminal appeals, directing the sheriff of Travis county to place Police Commissioner J D. Copeland and F. G. Reynolds in jail in pursuit of the order of District Judge Hamilton, had not been received at the sheriff's office at noon today. Although the court's offices are only three blocks from those of the sheriff, twenty-one hours time has already elapsed in transmitting

the mandate to the sheriff. It was not in the morning mail deliveries, the sheriff said, and there will not be another until 4 o'clock this afternoon. Not until the mandate has been received can the sheriff execute

At 12:30 o'clock this afternoon, Clerk Singre of the court of criminal appeals delivered in person to Sheriff Miller a certified duplicate of the mandate. The court instituted such delivery after the second mail failed to bring the mandate. It is expected it will be served on the men this afternoon.






