T. & P. High Officials Blocked While En Route; Building Occupied Today.

A passenger train left Baird at 3 o'clock this afternoon, will reach here about 4:30 or 5 oclock and proceed to Mingus, thirty miles east, the local railroad offices advise. After reaching Mingus it will turn and proceed west to Sweetwater, running without definite schedule. No word has been received here as to when regular train service can be resumed, but Superintendent Knightlinger stated this morning it will be at least twenty-four hours.

"The greatest blow to the Texas & Pacific in the history of the road," the cloudburst, which last night washed out more than nine miles of track, bridges and other railroad equipment between Weatherford and Dallas, has resulted in the postponement of the ceremonies scheduled to attend the opening of the new Texas & Pacific passenger station here tonight.

The offices of the road here will be moved into the new station tonight and the ticket offices there will be officially opened at 12:01 a. m., S. B. Tunnell, local freight and passenger have been postponed until a later date to allow officials of the road to b present, it was announced by H.
