So far as such an assertion is true (as it is in the case of our national government, which had to fight great war) no blame can be attached to the creators of taxes.

But it is a notorious fact that those who legislate for the people too often ignore sound business principles and the public weal. Too much politics, too much catering to special interests and too much initiating of unnecessary public projects account for a vast deal of the present oppressive

The influence of heavy taxes on the course of business is so adverse that an anti-high-tax movement may be among the possibilities. A national taxpayers' union would have enough power to make congress, legislatures, boards of supervisors and city fathers more careful as to the imposts they inflict upon the people.

## **COOLIDGE TO ADDRESS** PRESBYTERIAN ASSEMBLY

DES MOINES, Iowa, May 20 .-Vice President Calvin Coolidge arrived here at 6:50 p. m. today to address a mass meeting sponsored by the board of education of the Presbyterian general assembly tomorrow evening at the coliseum.

The invitation to speak was sent the vice president by Edward T. Hill, general secretary of the Presbyterian board of education, who requested him to talk on Christian education. So far, Coolidge has no other speaking engagements for his 36-hour stay

Commissioners this afternoon expressed pleasure at the communication from the Southern Presbyterian assembly at Charleston, W. Va., which appears to weigh for closer relations and perhaps ultimately the union between the two branches. Efforts at reconciliation between the northern and southern Presbyterians have been a recurring feature of each year's general assemblies since the split of the church caused by the civil war. There has been a gradual, almost imperceptible drawing together, especially during the recent years, each year's effort at reapproachment falling just short of ac-complishment The slight differ-ence in the name of the two branches often leads to confusion. The northern church is known as the Presbyterian Church of the United States of America while the southern is called the Presbyterian Church in the United States. The northern branch has been gradually extending its activities and there are a considerable number of congregations south of the Mason-Dixon line.
