KIRVEN, Texas, May 6.—Stacking them on like sticks of cordwood, a mob of more than 500 burned "Snap" Curry, 26; Mose Jones, 44, and John Cornish, 19, all negroes, in the square here shortly before daylight this morning. The burning climaxed a night and day manhunt for the attackers and murderers of Miss Eula Ousley, 17-year-old school girl, found dead and mutilated by wounds, Thursday night.

Curry, the first man burned, had confessed assaulting and aiding in the murder of the girl. As he was strapped to the seat of a plow under which a fire had been started, he said: "Burn Mose Jones and John Cornish, too They are as guilty as I am." As the flames reached up and set his clothing on fire, he began to sing, "Lord, I'm Coming Home." His clothes had been saturated with crude oil and kerosene and in a flash he was covered with flames. The last strains of the song were heard about four minutes after the match had been applied.

Mose Jones was then roped and thrown on the seat and more wood applied. He lived about six minutes. Then John Cornish was lassoed and dragged to the fire, and again more





THREE KILLED, FOUR WOUNDED IN GUN BATTLE

CANTON, Ohio, May 6.—Three men were killed and four wounded, two probably fatally, in a gun fight late Friday between a posse and four gunmen, which was staged about five miles north of here. The battle, which lasted more than an hour, followed the kidnapping by the gunmen of Mo-torcycle Policeman John Wise. Several hundred shots were fired.

The dead: Ralph W. Hoffe, 28 contractor, member posse; Eddie Stevenson, alias Joe Plapo, fugitive, and an unidentified member of the gunman crowd.

Most seriously injured: Harry Harper, Cleveland, one of the gunmen, shotgun wounds in head; condition critical. George Brainer, gunman, shot through head, not expected to live; Patrolman Jesse Vogley was shot through the right leg and Robert Boston, a posseman, was shot in the left foot.

The gunmen kidnapped Wise when he attempted to arreset them for speeding in an automobile just inside the city limits. As the officer stopped them, the bandits forced him at the point of revolvers to get into their car and then turned their machine and headed north. Witnesses notified the police, who started in pursuit. They soon were joined by several scores of citizens. When the bandits found they were being overtaken, they abandoned their car and took Wise to a farm where they bound and gagged him. As the first automobile with police appeared the gunmen opened fire. The officers returned the fire and one of the gunmen drop-

The other three fugitives then abandoned Wise and fled into a small woods half a mile away where they were surrounded by the posse and the fight proceeded, until all of the gunmen had been wounded and captured.

Another tract was bought by Mr Johnson of seventy-four acres, offsetting the busher on the southwest. The purchase price paid for the lease is the highest on record in this field, being \$650 per acre. A cash payment of -50,000 was made and the balance will be paid in oil.
