WASHINGTON May 25,-The national cost of living bill probably will be reduced \$1,000,000,000 yearly as him on several occasions, beginning a result of the 10 per cent reduction in the fall of 1920, that he planned in freight rates ordered by the interstate commerce commission, governstate commerce commission, government statisticians said today. This means a saving of \$1 a year for every person in the country. The reduction cuts the national freight bill between \$300,000,000 and \$400,000,000 and \$400,000,000 a year, according to the official figures. The government experts who have been working on the result estimate that an increase or decrease in freight rates is more than trebled by the time it is passed on to the consumers.
