# MID-KANSAS TULLOS 8 MAKING 5,000

Victim of Tuesday Tragedy Will Be Buried at Springfield, Mo.

Billie Shanks, stranded vaudeville actress, consigned to the potters' field by her father following her tragic death at the Oasis hotel early Tuesday morning, will not be buried in a pauper's grave. An aunt, Mrs Frances Pallett of Springfield Mo. was located this morning and authorized the Milford Undertaking company to ship the body there for burial, \$100 being provided for the funeral and shipping expense.

An effort was at first made to have the father of the dead woman, Albert Davis of Bergman, Ark., send for the body, but the parent replied that he had no money and advised that his daughter be buried here as a "pauper." It is expected that the body, which has been viewed by hundred in the Mills of the Mill dreds in the Milford chapel since the tragedy, will be sent to Springfield some time today.

Although the verdict returned at the inquest Tuesday left the responsi-bility of the actress' death undetermined, Justice McFatter is now of the opinion that it was suicide. The same opinion is shared by County Attorney Ove Overson, according to his statement last night.

Two Men Partially Identified as Occupants of Murder Car: Several Women Also Under Murder Car; Several Women Also Under Arrest; Leaders Refused Release.

By Associated Press. CHICAGO, May 11.—Declaring that he agreed with the statement made by the police that "Chicago is in a state of warfare," Judge Scanlon today refused to issue writs of habeas corpus for the release of Corelius Shea and John Lafferty, labor leaders held in connection with the murder of two policemen yesterday morning in the series of labor bombings. The judge informed the police that the two men could be held until Saturday at least.

The cases of Shea and Lafferty were called the first thing this morning and Judge Scanlon took only a few minutes to dispose of them. Almost a dozen other similar cases were up before other judges.

Shea is an ex-convict from Sing-Sing and is head of one element in the teamsters' union. Lafferty is a lieutenant of Big Tim Murphy, known as Chicago's labor czar.

At the same time today Judge Davis refused to release on habeas corpus writs Big Tim Murphy and President Mader of the building trades unions.

Three hundred men are packed in the city jail today, in custody in the labor war killing. Two suspects have been partially identified as the slavers of two officers. Police today will continue to question the men under arrest and all documents sezzed in yesterday's raid were being inspected carefully in an effort to find a clew that will lead to definite information concerning a possible conspiracy of organized labor for the bombing of buildings being erected under the Landis wage award and the killing of the policemen.
