Suicides Among Youth's Causes Harbin Alarm

By VICTOR DE FRANCK (United Press Special Correspondent) HARBIN.—The suicides of two boys of 12 and 16 has focused attention here on one of the city's chief social problems—the extraordinacy prevalence of suicides among the refugee population.

refugee population. Their morale apparently perma-nently impaired by the horrors of the Russian revolution and the privations of their fugitive careers since they escaped the slightest pretext is enough to turn them to the final escape of the poison bottle, the river or the pistol. The owner of the field, fearing trouble with the police, carted the body to a neighbor's field. The latter shifted it in turn to another's pron-erty. Finally a week after the boy had disappeared his body was found in a country road with the face and arms knawed off by dogs. Less Spectacular

arms knawed off by dogs. Less Spectacular The death of the 12-year-old boy, while less spectacular, was even mory mysterious. He was always cheerful and though the only son of a widow-ed mother, had no known reason for morbidity. He purchased a tube of sleeping tablets and swallowed all them at once. them at once.

I'arbin suicides vary as much in method as in reason. Poison, drown-ing and the pistol are the most fre-quented forms but there was one man who lay upon a hot kitchen stove un-til he had sustained fatal burns and another who droughed burns in another who drenched himself in gasoline and set himself on fire. Hun-ger and poverty are the commonest reasons but police records include many cases in which some trifling

Wider Highways Are Needed, Will Be Aid To Autoists

More than \$3,650,000,000 a year is the loss in the United States from inadequate traffic facilities and control, according to the report made in Washington by a committee of the National Conference on Street and Highway Cafety, promoted by Secre-tary Hoover of the department of Commerce.

As a relief from this condition, wider highways are being urged by all the organizations identified with highway traffic, transportation and construction. The adoption of wider highways is pronounced in some states, many reads known as "super-highways" being projected with at least four one-way traffic lanes and sometimes six or eight, with the heav trucks separated from the light-er automobiles and with better proer automobiles and with better pro-vision for highway safety. In New York City a double-decked street is being projected south along the Hudson River docks from Riverside Drive and in Chicago another double-decked Street, known as the Wacker Drive, is ulready under construction, the lower level, paved with granite blocks, being for heavy truck traf-fic and the upper level, paved with asphalt, being set aside for automo-bile traffic. Like the new asphalt boulevards that traverse Grant Park on the Lake Front in Chicago, Wack-er Drive is intended to relieve down-town traffic congestion by transport-ing the through traffic around the "loop" and across the city.
