

OLDEN FIELD IS SCENE OF HEAVY PLAY

Three Wells and Two Completions in Nine Days; Discovery Well Still Strong.

The Olden field, six miles southwest of Ranger, is coming in for good play these days. Three wells have been run there within the last week and two completions made within the last nine days.

The wells started are: Roberts Oil company No. 6 on the Dawson lease; Teatsorth on the Scott and Magnolia No. 8 on the Scott. The Magnolia has just made a new location on the Sam Harris lease. The completions were made by Magnolia on the Sam Harris and Teatsorth on the Scott. And this is about the average rate at which wells are being begun and finished at Olden, according to those who keep tab on the matter.

These wells come in at around 1,450 feet, show initial production at from 30 to 200 barrels and settle down to steady production, not much less than initial production, it is stated, few falling below 40 barrels a day and all of them being lasting wells.

As an illustration of this, the discovery well (Adams & Pittman) came in about a year ago with about 50 barrels initial production and it has settled down to a 30-barrel well and it said to be producing that right along, netting around \$50,000 a year.

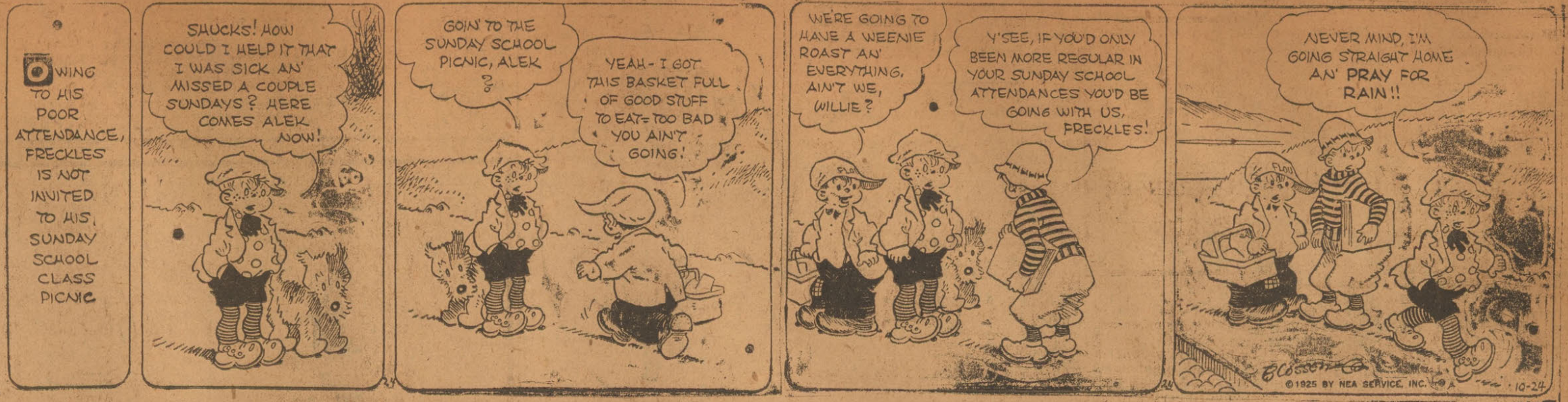

Stephens County New Courthouse, To Be Built At Cost of \$400,000, Will Be One of the Finest In West Texas

Special Correspondence. BRECKENRIDGE, Oct. 24.—The decision of the Ninetieth district court of Stephens county in upholding the validity of the Stephens county courthouse bond election was sustained in an opinion handed down by the Eleventh court of civil appeals at Eastland last week, and, as the appeal court's decision is final in matters of this character, ends the question of the legality of the bonds, according to County Judge Hill.

Following is a short description of Stephens county's proposed new courthouse, which is to cost approximately \$400,000 and for the construction of which a contract has been let:

The new building is to be a combination courthouse and jail and it will be four stories high above the grade and will include a basement sufficient to accommodate heating plants, toilet rooms for colored folks and a small cell for the use of the sheriff's department.

The entire first floor will be used for county offices, including the county courtroom.

District Court Rooms. The entire second floor of the building will be used principally for district courts. Two courtrooms are provided, together with libraries, and offices for the various officials. The courtrooms on this floor will extend up through the third story of the building and are to be given a very artistic treatment. Offices for the

grand jury, farm demonstrator, county surveyor, and consultation rooms for juries, as well as jury dormitories are provided in each of the district courtrooms at the third floor level. One of the convenient features is the arrangement of the jury assembly, consultation and dormitory rooms. At the rear of the judge's bench is provided a consultation room for the jury. There is a stairway leading from this room to the third floor, where jury dormitories and consultation rooms are provided. This arrangement absolutely prevents the jury coming in contact with the public in any manner while they are subject to the instruction of the court.

Jail on Top Floor. The entire fourth floor will be used for the jail, and in addition to providing accommodations for felon prisoners, both male and female, is equipped with juvenile wards, wards for insane, and wards for colored male and female prisoners. There is also provided living quarters for the jailer. A commodious kitchen and pantry are provided on this floor for serving the prisoners.

The sheriff's office is located on the main floor and connects with an electric passenger elevator. This elevator extends from the basement to the jail floor, and is under the control of the sheriff and his deputies at all times.

The building proper will be 152 feet long, 81 feet wide, designed in pure Corinthian classic.

The exterior of the building will be faced with variegated Indiana limestone trimmed with terra cotta to match. Exterior steps and sills will be of gray granite.

The interior will be finished throughout in hardwood, Marble mainseat; terrazzo and tile floors will be used in the principal corridors and toilet rooms.

The appointments and finish throughout this building will be first-class in every respect and in keeping with the best courthouses in the state.

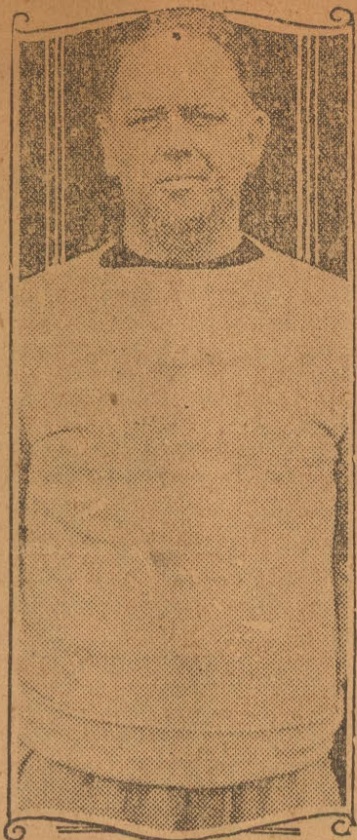
CHEVROLET HAS MACHINERY FOR ALL ITS NEEDS

Marvels of Automotive Production Methods Shown by Photographs.

The marvels of modern automotive precision and production methods are depicted in a series of 42 enlarged photographs now being shown to the public at the salesrooms of all American and Canadian Chevrolet dealers.

would be shown a visitor at the factories. One of the most spectacular pictures shows a huge drop forge hammer weighing 140,000 pounds. Hammers of this type are used to make the Chevrolet crankshaft. The falling weight is a three-ton block of steel which is lifted by steam. It is so responsive to the touch of the skilled operators that they are able to place a watch on the bottom die block and strike it with the hammer so delicately that the crystal remains unbroken. Each hammer will forge 880 crankshafts during a 10-hour day. Other striking features of the exhibit are pictures of a monster machine which uses 300,000 amperes of electricity to weld the Chevrolet one-piece banjo-type rear axle housing; a machine which drills 32 holes simultaneously in the bottom of the Chevrolet cylinder block; a rotary

FIGHT ON INHERITANCE TAX GAINING HEADWAY

WASHINGTON, Oct. 24.—Enforcement of the Delano report providing that the federal government abandon the inheritance tax field in six years was personally given today by Chairman Green of the house ways and means committee. This action gave marked impetus to the program, which would have congress write in the new tax bill next session a repeal of the inheritance tax within six years and the immediate reduction of the maximum surtax from 40 to 15 per cent. In approval of the report, Green abandoned his own proposals, which were in conflict with those of Mellon.

Davisson To Appeal From Appellate Court Which Reversed Case

G. A. Davisson, plaintiff in the injunction case of Davisson vs. Eastland county in which Davisson had been granted an injunction by the Ninety-first district court of Eastland county restraining Eastland county from expending any part of the money now in its hands or any that might come into its hands from the sale of certain road bonds issued by the county, and which was reversed and the injunction dissolved by the Eleventh court of civil appeals at Eastland in a decision handed down by that tribunal last week, will appeal the case according to John D. McRae, of the law firm of Connor & McRae of Eastland, attorneys for Davisson.

"The court of civil appeals did not pass on the merits of the injunction case, but reversed it because of omitted testimony," Mr. McRae said. "We have 15 days in which to perfect our appeal, provided a new hearing, which will be asked for, if refused, and will certainly appeal," Mr. McRae said.

"The case of Eastland county vs. G. A. Davisson, which was transferred from Eastland county to Stephens county, and the trial of which was continued on Sept. 7 to Nov. 2, on account of the illness of Mr. Davisson, will doubtless be passed upon by the courts before a hearing can be had on our motion for a new hearing before the court of civil appeals and the injunction is based on the outcome of the Breckenridge case," Mr. McRae said.

The suit against Davisson, which is to be tried at Breckenridge on Nov. 2, is one of the numerous suits filed by Eastland county against the contractors on the Eastland county highway system and has been tried several times.

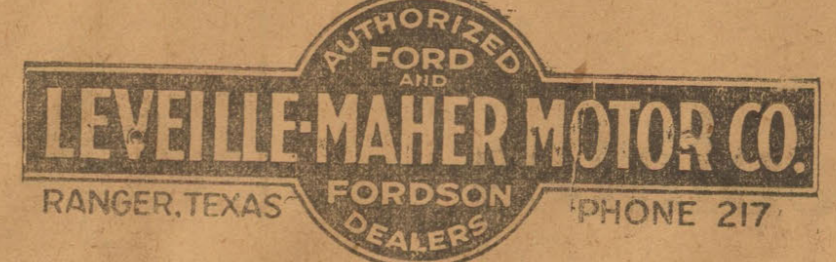

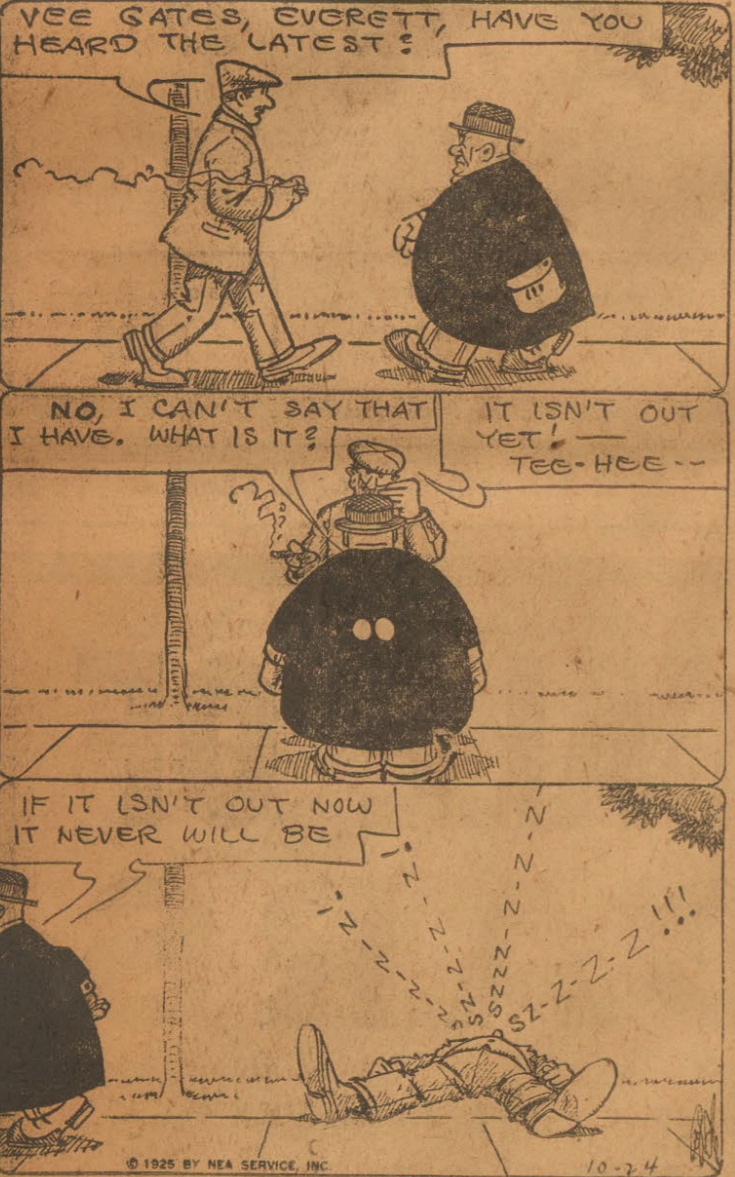

IF THE BUYER HAD TO DO IT—HE WOULD KNOW

"One-Profit Manufacture" Means Much to Purchasers, Studebaker Officials say.

"If the buyer of every automobile had to make just one car he would understand thoroughly how much the term 'one-profit manufacture' introduced to the industry during the summer, means to each purchaser," declare Studebaker officials.
In other words, if he had to buy the engine from one maker, the body from another, and from different makers had to purchase axles, transmissions, springs and other important component parts, then fit them together to make the car run, these things would be apparent to him at once.

The necessity for revising his original plans to accommodate the size, shape and power of the engine; to make the body fit and present a neat appearance; to arrange all component parts so they function with each other.
The profits paid each separate manufacturer for the parts which he produced would add up to a respectable total in the entire cost.

Now if this buyer were to sell his product adding his profit to the entire cost to him, he would realize what a proportion of his selling price was represented by no actual value in the car, having gone to pay these profits.
