SAVE 19 MILES

Mingus Dam Starts Movement to Pave Shorter Road to Fort Worth; Resort Probable.

New interest has been awakened in the big dam being built at Mingus, about 20 miles northeast of Ranger by a movement set on foot by Min-gus citizens and others sponsored by County Commissioner R. M. Loflin of Palo Pinto county, to build a road which will cut off 19 miles of the Reagan County Grand Jury Redistance between Strawn and Fort

The proposed pike will, if built, run from Strawn via Mingus, Gor-

dy road in muddy weather intervenes with two narrow, one-car bridges.

In urging state and county authorities to give favorable consideration to this proposed new pike, Mingus is calling attention to the lake and dam, work on which is now being pushed with all possible speed to avert another disaster from floods. There will undoubtedly be a summer resort at Mingus, according to William Harry Spratt, when this lake is completed. The railway company has bought up all the lands in the valley, a large acreage, but left the town untouched, according to Mr. Spratt. The dam will be 28 feet high, 860 feet in length, 12 feet thick at the base anad will create a V-shaped lake with a width of 900 feet, a length of 6,900 feet, an average depth of eight feet, and a storage capacity of 696-acre feet of impounded water, according to figures set down in the legal notice filed when it was first proposed. WACO, Oct. 24 .- "If the American Road company has robbed the state, then the people of Texas are entitled to know what kind of a contract the attorney general has made

with the robbers." James E. Ferguson, husband of the governor, arriving here this afternoon, hurled this defiance in answer to a statement of Attorney General Moody declining to make public a copy of the contract by which \$436,000 paid the American Road company for surfacing Texas roads had been brought back from Kansas City and placed in a bank in Dallas.

"I again call attention to the fact that Mr. Moody has not told the people about the terms under which the \$436,000 was deposited in a Dallas bank. 





'One-Profit Manufacture Means Much to Purchasers, Studebaker Officials say.

"If the buyer of every automobile had to make just one car he would understand thoroughly how much the term 'one-profit manufacture' intro-duced to the industry during the summer, means to each purchaser," declare Studebaker officials

The profits paid each separate manufacturer for the parts which he

Now if this buyer were to sell his product adding his profit to the entire cost to him, he would realize what a proportion of his selling price was represented by no actual value in the car, having gone to pay these profits





ONLY ARCTIC CABOOSE IS ERIE R. R. EXHIBIT




