WITNESS OVERCOMES FEAR AND RETURNS

TWO NOTORIOUS BANDITS HELD IN ARKANSAS

Wounded by Bank President, Thought Fatally Shot, While Defending Bank's Funds.

LITTLE ROCK, June 12.—Boyd Jewell and John Burchfield, two of Arkansas' most daring and resourceful highwaymen, were nursing gunshot wounds in the county jail at Bentonville today, while possemen were combing the bottom lands for three unidentified companions in the Sulphur Springs bank robbery yesterday.

L. M. Stout, president of the bank, is believed dying in a Joplin, Mo., hospital from wounds received in a gun battle with the bandits.

Jewell and Burchfield, the latter a fugitive from the Arkansas state penitentiary, were captured as they walked along the highway from Bentonville towards the Oklahoma line.

Stout, who was shot through the abdomen, was attempting to prevent the escape of the bandits after they had robbed the bank. Bullets from his gun wounded Jewell and Burchfield. The bandit car was wrecked just outside the city and the five men sought safety in flight on foot, three of them escaping into the timber.

Proceedings of Eleventh Civil Appellate Court

J. A. Scott, for more than 17 years clerk of the Second court of civil appeals at Fort Worth, was present to assist Roy Nunnally, clerk of the Eastland court, in his duties.

The first case to be heard by the new court was that of Charles Terrell vs. the Baltic Gasoline company from Eastland county. Shortly after court opened a beautiful bouquet of flowers was presented the court by Eastland ladies.

COAL MINERS AT TWO PLACES CAUSE TROUBLE

Troops Necessary at Henryetta, Okla., and New Waterford, Cape Breton.

HENRYETTA, Okla., June 12.—While a petition was being circulated here today asking Governor Trapp of Oklahoma to recall the troops sent here to maintain order, union miners were considering asking their brother miners to call a strike at the collieries of the Crow Coal company in Kansas. The Crow company mines in Oklahoma are being operated on the open-shop plan, while the same company in Kansas is operated on a union scale.

The trial of five men charged with beating a non-union man last Wednesday night, which started the trouble here, has been set for June 16.

HALIFAX, Nova Scotia, June 12. Following yesterday's battle, in which one man was killed and 40 injured, including seven police, the little coal mining town of New Waterford, Cape Breton, was in the grip of mob rule today.

Early this morning, strike-breakers broke into the three stores of the British Empire Steel corporation and stole virtually everything they contained, afterwards applying the torch to the buildings. The townspeople spent a sleepless night, fearing street rioting might be renewed.

Several hundred troops are en route to New Waterford from Halifax. It is believed the lawlessness will not be ended until the troops arrive, but local authorities are reported trying to cope with the situation as best they can.

HALIFAX, N. S., June 12.—With the arrival of 50 members of the provincial police from Halifax, order has been at least temporarily restored in New Waterford, Cape Breton, scene of the fatal riot of striking coal miners.

The power station, which had been in the hands of strikers since Thursday's fatal crash, is reported to have been abandoned only after the strikers had wrecked its apparatus.

North Sydney reported the washhouse at the mines there had been fired today, the third fire to be reported at the Besco Colliery properties.

Band Concert In Rotary Park Tonight

The municipal band concert of Ranger's Texas Ranger band will be held tonight at 8 o'clock at Rotary park (Hodges Oak park), West Main street, Ranger. The concert tonight will be the first in several weeks, unforeseen incidents preventing others.

The tentative plan of the band now calls for weekly concerts to be held at Rotary park until other arrangements are made. It is probable that the band will alternate between Rotary park and Lions park.

Winters Woman Killed By Husband Who Also Takes His Own Life

BAIRD, Texas, June 12.—William Roten, 43, a restaurant cook, shot and killed his wife, Gladys Roten, 34, here last night about 11 o'clock and then shot himself in the head twice. Mrs. Roten was shot three times. Both died instantly.

Roten and his wife formerly lived at Clarksville, Texas. Roten had worked here before as a cook. The couple were separated about six months ago and Mrs. Roten returned last week alone and went to work as a waitress in a restaurant. Roten followed her here yesterday and followed her to her hotel.

Roten's body will be shipped to Clarksville and Mrs. Roten shipped to Winters, Texas, for burial.

HUMBLE COMPANY BUYS WORLD WELL, IS REPORT

FORT WORTH, June 12.—Purchase of the "World well" wildcat in northern Crockett county, and 2,300 acres around it, by the Humble Oil & Refining company for a consideration of \$1,400,000, one-third cash, was reported from the field Thursday. The sale was made by Chester R. Bunker of Fort Worth, who with associates and with readers of a publication printed by Bunker, own the property.

Official confirmation of the sale was unobtainable due to the absence of W. S. Farish, president, and the principal officers of the company from the state.

The transaction, it is understood, calls for a considerable drilling program by the Humble to develop the property. The deferred part of the consideration, it is understood, is to be paid for out of the proceeds of a part of the oil when, as and if produced.

The test is located just within the northern boundary of Crockett county, 16 miles southeast of the Big Lake field.

TWO WOMEN CHARGED WITH VIOLATION OF DRY LAW

WASHINGTON, June 12.—Two young women, members of the United States nurse corps, are today being tried by a general court-martial at the navy yard here on a charge of importing intoxicating liquor into the United States.

So far as available records show, this is the first time in history that a general court-martial has been held with a woman as defendant.

DEATH STALKS MERRY MAKERS CRUISING SEA

Cigarette Tossed Carelessly Into Gasoline Tank Causes Explosion and Fire.

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., June 12. One woman is dead, two persons are reported missing and 20 others are in hospitals here today as the result of an explosion followed by a fire which caused the pleasure yacht Crystal to sink shortly before midnight five miles off Chelsea.

Thirty-six young men and women were enjoying a moonlight sail and dance. Panic broke out on the boat following a terrific blast that came after one of the guests had inadvertently tossed a lighted cigarette into the hatch in which gasoline was stored.

POWERS INFORM CHINA ORDER IS DESIRED

Protest Against Rioting and Civil War and Urge That Action Be Taken.

PEKIN, June 12.—With a general strike on at Hankow, following eight deaths there in a riot, and with civil war still raging at Canton, the foreign powers today sent a note of warning to China.

The note solemnly informs the Chinese foreign office of China's heavy responsibility for the maintenance of order in Peking, Canton, Shanghai and throughout the country. The note says the powers "have a lively desire for such a solution at the earliest possible moment, since the situation is distressing and full of danger."

SAN FRANCISCO, June 12.—Cantonese troops at 3 p. m. today had succeeded in crossing the river into Canton and were driving the Yunnanese troops before them, a Chinese newspaper informed the United Press it had learned from Canton.

The Chinese are rising in protest and reaching out for new power against the domination of all Christian nations, including America, which has established footholds in Chinese territory. It is an unprecedented situation and is being met with unprecedented actions.

Two Persons Killed Two Severely Hurt In Auto Wreck

TEXARKANA, Ark., June 12.—Two persons were killed and two others seriously injured in an automobile accident, 12 miles south of here, early this morning, when a car driven by R. Hughes skidded in soft gravel and overturned.

Mrs. Maggie Hughes, his wife, and Olive, a 2-year-old daughter, were instantly killed and his son, Vernon, 10, and his mother, Mrs. Hoppia Hughes, 70, are in a hospital seriously injured. Hughes was only slightly bruised.

Van Orman Claims First or Second Place In Cup Race

BRUSSELS, June 12.—W. T. Van Orman, Akron, Ohio, balloonist, arrived here today after his bizarre adventure of landing his balloon, the Goodyear III, unscathed and dry, on the German steamer Vaterland. Van Orman claimed first or second place in the Gordon Bennett cup race for the American balloon, pointing out that he had covered 800 kilometers before falling into the water.

It is now reported the Belgian bag, Prince Leopold, hitherto regarded winner of the race, may be disqualified since it is reported her pilot fell into the sea off the Spanish coast and had to be rescued.

Little Girl Swallows Grass Blade, Causing Pneumonia and Death

The body of little Mildred White, aged 2 years, who died last night at a Ranger hospital of pneumonia, was taken to Abilene for burial today. The body will be interred on the family lot in the Abilene cemetery.

Baby Mildred swallowed a blade of grass several weeks ago and sucked it in through her windpipe into her lungs. Pneumonia set in which resulted in her death.

The body was accompanied by her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Henry White of Ranger, and Mr. Joe Dennis. The trip was made in an automobile.

Canada Fears She May Lose Something She Might Desire

OTTAWA, Ont., June 12.—Canada will protest against the United States-MacMillan expedition to the north pole using Axel Heiberg land as a base while exploring the Arctic unless the reply to a communication sent to Washington by the dominion government is satisfactory.

While not specifically naming the MacMillan expedition, Charles Stewart, minister of the interior, announced today that the Canadian government felt that foreign explorers should get a permit from the dominion before making use of land that Canada claims between the dominion and the north pole.

AMBASSADOR TO MEXICO SAYS WILL NOT RESIGN

WASHINGTON, June 12.—United States ambassador to Mexico, James R. Sheffield, who is the white house guest today, denied reports from Mexico City that he intends to resign his post there. He said he would return to his post after conferring with President Coolidge and Secretary of State Kellogg and after attending the Yale commencement exercises where he is to receive an honorary degree.

WHITE READY TO TESTIFY IN SHEPHERD CASE

Tells State Attorney Was Forced to Sign Affidavit Denying Charges; Trial Begins

CHICAGO, June 12.—Robert A. White, regarded as a vital state witness in the Shepherd germ murder trial, walked into the state's attorney's office today. He had his family with him.

CRIMINAL COURT ROOM, CHICAGO, June 12.—White reiterated to Attorney Savage the charge he was forced to flee in fear of his life. W. W. O'Brien, one of the defense attorneys, and Arthur Byrne, also in the employ of the defense, forced him to sign an affidavit repudiating an important phase of his charges against Shepherd, he said. This phase alleges Shepherd came to a germ school to take up the study of bacteriology.

"Later my life and the lives of my family were threatened and so we fled from Chicago," White told Savage, "but I promised to testify in the trial and here I am."

DEFENSE TRIES TWO-POINT EFFORT TO BALK STATE

CRIMINAL COURT ROOM, CHICAGO, June 12.—Alexander Reichmann, co-guardian of Billy McClintock, became wealthy when he was appointed attorney of the McClintock fortune, attorneys for Shepherd claimed.

It was subtle attempt on the part of the defense attorneys to show that the Shepherds had not profited on the fortune, but that Reichmann had.

The defense seeks to show that Billy McClintock came to his death as result of catching typhoid from eating oysters. Doctors were placed on the stand this afternoon preparatory to a long technical battle regarding typhoid germs.

HARRY OLSON GIVES VERY BRIEF TESTIMONY

Judge Harry Olson, municipal chief justice of Chicago, was the first witness on the stand Thursday at the opening of the trial of William D. Shepherd, charged with the murder of his ward, Billy McClintock, millionaire orphan. Judge Olson was on the stand for about ten minutes and was questioned by State's Attorney Robert E. Crowe regarding his acquaintance with Mrs. McClintock.

Judge Olson was placed on the stand only after a sharp legal tilt between counsel for the defense and State's Attorney Crowe. Attorneys for the defense contended that witnesses must be placed on the stand to prove there was a crime before witnesses to establish a motive were called. The objection of the defense was overruled by Judge Lynch.

Warren S. Stone, Engineer-Banker, Dies In Cleveland

CLEVELAND, Ohio, June 12.—Warren S. Stone, president of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers and president of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers' Co-operative National bank, and interred in a number of other labor banks, died here today after a long illness.

Law Student Held For Killing Suitor For Wife's Favor

SHREVEPORT, June 12.—George W. Gill, 23, a law student at Loyola university at New Orleans, is in custody here following his confession last night to killing Robert Reed, 22, student and football star of Centenary college, of Shreveport.

Gill killed Reed in a fist fight at a water resort near here and the trouble is said to have been occasioned by Reed's attention to Mrs. Gill. Reed was a former suitor of Mrs. Gill.

Gill is being held on a charge of first degree murder.

MOTION BEING PREPARED FOR TEXTBOOK CASE REHEARING

AUSTIN, June 12.—Preparation of the motion for rehearing to be filed in the supreme court in the textbook cases was begun today on the arrival of W. G. Love, of Houston, special counsel for the state board of education. Love declined to discuss what action the board would take if the court overrules the rehearing motion and adheres to its decision sustaining the validity of the contracts.

TRAILING THE BUCKETEERS.

The United Illinois and City of Chicago Commerce Banking and Stock Exchange firms under the name of the Advertiser and Investors Protective association, have practically put "bucket shops" and fraudulent stock schemes out of business in that part of the country. The bureau is compiling a card index record of brokers and dealers in securities in Chicago, including bucketeers, promoters, and stock salesmen, with a brief report where possible. These are classified according to their known record. There are now approximately 500 cards in the index, more than 50 per cent of which relate to so-called brokers or dealers and stock salesmen of doubtful repute.

All complaints have been filed with the assistant state's attorney, and during the past three years more than \$1,000,000 has been returned to the victims of these promotional schemes, mostly in small amounts. Newspapers are contributing valuable aid by wide publicity.

In many cases bucket shop operators afraid to use the mails, are compelled to make long and expensive personal trips to interview prospective purchasers or deliver stock purchased. The association follows every clue and utilizes every legitimate means to put an end to those swindles.

A POOR MAN'S GIFT.

Dr. Charles Steinmetz was born in Breslau, April 9, 1865. On June 3, 1889, he landed in New York city from the steamer—in debt for his passage and unable to speak our language.

Twelve years later he was elected president of the American Institute of Electrical Engineers. President Eliot of Harvard proclaimed him the foremost electrical engineer in the world. On Oct. 26, 1923, he died.

Did ever a few brief years witness more miracles? When his life began, there was not a single electric light and power company. When it ended, there were 6,000 in America, serving more than 11,000,000 homes.

Physically frail himself, he helped to make electricity the great lifter of burdens; by his courage and vision he was an inspiration to the whole electrical industry.

Such a man deserves to be remembered on his birthday, not on the day of his death. For in the largest sense he does not die. Humanity is permanently richer because of what he gave.

The fact is, however, that most of us are talking about something we know very little about. The only way to acquire simple understanding is to read some of the best books on both sides. She announced following the court decision that she would leave for Kansas City immediately and that she and her mother would depart soon on an extended tour.

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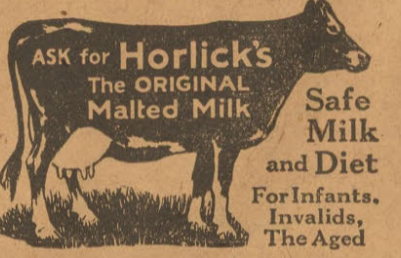

Evangelist Preaches on Traveling Along the Straight and Narrow Way

At the Baptist revival last evening Rev. Mr. Pond spoke to a capacity house. Crowds and interest is increasing in the day services. At the evening hour there were five additions to the church for baptism.

Mr. Pond preached his railroad sermon on the subject "Wide-Gauged Train on the Narrow-Gauge Track," his text being Matt. 7:13, 14: "Enter ye in at the straight gate, for wide is the gate and broad is the way that leadeth to destruction, and many there be which go in thereat."

Because straight is the gate and narrow is the way which leadeth unto life, and few there be that find it." The pastor gave many illustrations from his own life as a railroad man, prior to his entering the ministry, which were very forceful. He said that the wide-gauge train is represented by the worldly people and the narrow-gauge is the way that is in Jesus Christ; that this is a day when people are living on a broad gauge; advocating a new religion; saying that the twentieth century people won't stand for the strict, "blue stocking" religion; but there are many things we can throw to the wind; but the one thing we must not do away with is God's precious truths laid down in the Good Book; that some people are denying all the fundamentals in the Bible; and that the devil himself would not do more than that.

Mr. Pond said that we have many Christian people who are broad in the social world, saying that things we used to call sin are not sin now, and they bring their worldliness into the church; that it is the broad-gauger who things he can play cards, dance and indulge in other similar amusements without doing wrong; that the reason we are not making more progress in the churches is because we have too many broad-gaugers.

One experience every railroad man has is pulling a train where you have to pick up cars, said the speaker, and just so with the preacher, he also has orders from Jesus to pick up on the way. Some cars run hot on you—sometimes when we begin to preach against the evils of the day and some old brother or sister runs a hot box because of having been out of duty and has a spiritual indigestion.

"Then the railroad man pulls a jag of empties, which is a hard train to make progress with; just so when you try to go somewhere for God and the winds of the devil are against you. I feel sorry for a pastor who has behind him a jag of empties; empties in responsibility; empties in enthusiasm and compassion for a lost world. When you pull empties over a railroad they are dead-heading. Some people want to be coupled into and be dragged into heaven, and when you get them in

there will be no one there to meet them. We should pray the Lord to load up our empties for Jesus and go to heaven bringing in the fruit of the work we have done for Jesus Christ.

"Another hard pull is a string of sleepers. There are some people when they join the church want to say to the pastor, 'Where is my berth; where can I go to sleep; I am ready to go to bed?' Today everyone ought to be awake at every station and be telling the people to come to Jesus; to get off the broad way and get on the narrow way. Jesus said 'I am the way.' When a man gets off the straight and narrow way there is only one who can put you on the track and you have to send a wire to heaven and submit yourselves to God and let Him have His way and he will lift you out of the ditch and put you on the track and you will come in by the power that God will give you."

There will be no morning service on Saturday, but the young people's meeting will be held each evening at 7:30 and preaching at 8 p. m.

Texas Republicans Planning Their First Primary Election

Special Correspondence.

SAN ANTONIO, June 12.—Plans for the first statewide primary election in the party's history will be discussed at a meeting of the republican state executive committee of Texas to be held in San Antonio, Monday, June 15, 1925. Besides the committee, party officials, members of the headquarters committee and many other leading republicans are expected to be present. The meeting was called by Eugene Nolte of

Seguin, state chairman. R. B. Creager, of Brownsville, national committeeman; Mrs. J. C. Griswold, of San Antonio, national committeewoman; Orville Bullington of Wichita Falls, state vice chairman, and Dr. F. L. Thomson of San Antonio, state treasurer, are among the executives who will attend.

Having polled nearly 300,000 votes for its gubernatorial candidate in 1924, the republican party, under Texas law, now becomes a major party and must nominate its senatorial, congressional, state and county candidates in a primary, held the same day as the democratic primary. It must also, at these primaries, elect its county and precinct chairmen.

Conferences and "schools of organization" are being held in all parts of the state, in preparation for the big task of shifting from the convention to the primary system. Leonard Withington, director of organization, said.

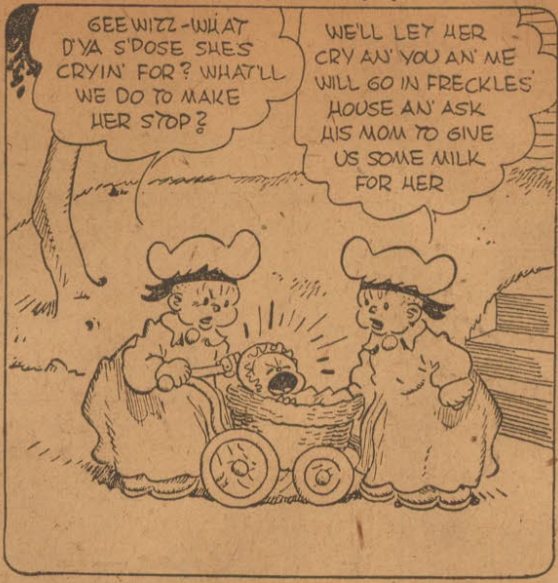

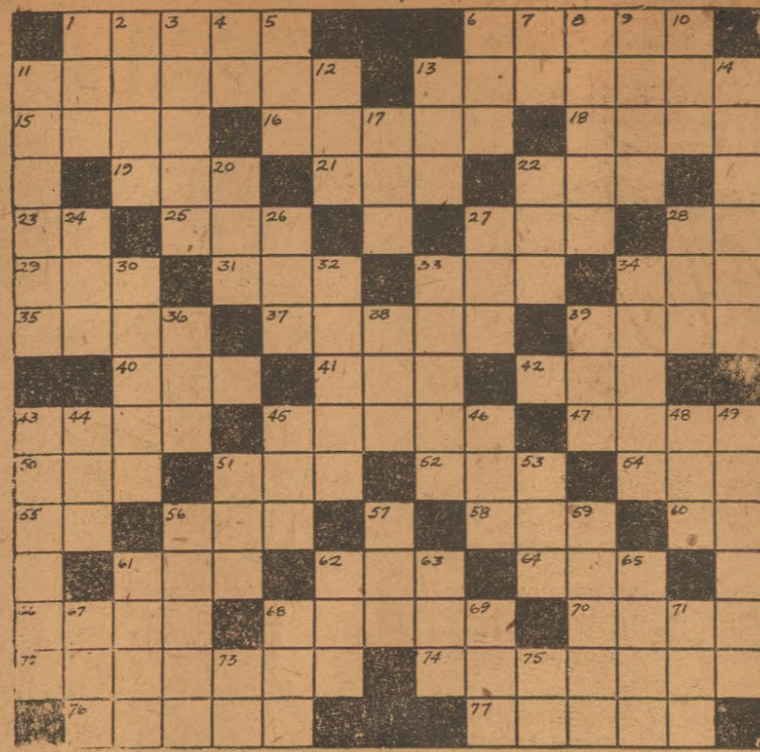

STATE GETS DECISION IN CONTEST FOR OIL LANDS

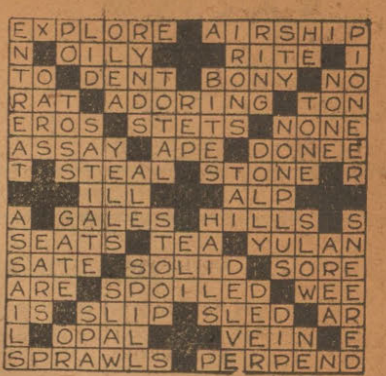
