Costs Closely Studied. They also make an investigation to find if it is more economical to own the home or to rent one. For this same family the girls work out clothing and food budgets which are practical and are based on the given income. In these budgets they also make allowances for education, recreation and travel and incidental expenses which may come up during

the year. AUSTIN, Feb. 26.—Girls in the University of Texas are working actual problems of the home-builder in their course in economics of the household, which is taught by Miss Mary Edna Gearing, professor of home economics.

Each girl is supposed to stay one term in the practice house as a requirement for the bachelor of

as a requirement for the bachelor of science degree in home economics. Each girl has certain duties to perform. One week she may be the cook, the next week the waitress, the third week the maid, and the fourth week the hostess. Miss Eleise Berry, instructor in home economics, lives at the practice, house and supervises the work of the girls.


