JURY DECLARES AGED J. E. LUSE OF SOUND MIND

Wealthy Eastland County Man Regains Wealth and Freedom.

The second chapter of the legal battle being waged in the courts at Eastland for control of the estate of J. E. Luse, wealthy Eastland county pioneer citizen, was written yesterday when Judge Tom L. Cunningham of the county court at law, after hearing motion filed by J. W. Luse of Omaha, Nebraska, brother of J. E. Luse, to set aside a judgment of lunacy previously rendered against J. E. Luse, granted the motion and a jury, empaneled to hear the case, returned a verdict stating that J. E. Luse was not insane. It was late in the afternoon when the taking of testimony in the case was completed and a night session of court was held.

Much Feeling Shown. The trial had many interesting features, much feeling being manifested by some of the witnesses. Mrs. M. L. Luse, wife of J. E. Luse, and her attorney, J. D. Barker, both took the stand and testified regarding the acts and conducts of J. E. Luse and stated that in their opinion he was of unsound mind. J. A. Wisdom, who lives on one of Mr. Luse's farms, and others, told of business transactions they had with Mr. Luse and said that in their opinion he was of sound mind, although he was very feeble.

PRESIDENT HAS ADDRESS READY

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27.—The draft of the inaugural address of President Coolidge has been completed and is now being passed down by him to conform to his ideals of brevity in state papers. Included in the brief are: General views of his administration on foreign affairs, outlining future foreign policy. Pronouncing his administration in favor of further tax reduction after the end of the fiscal year, June 30, and indicating his intention of calling an extra session of congress, probably September, to consider tax relief.

Reiterates in general terms the conservative political philosophy upon which he stood during the last campaign.

TRAIN BANDITS HOLD UP INDIANA PASSENGERS

GARY, Ind., Feb. 27.—Illinois authorities searched for two train bandits who last evening held up a Chicago bound New York Central train and escaped near here with cash and jewelry valued at \$10,000. Just as the train was leaving Chesterton, Ind., fourteen miles from Gary, the two men opened a scabbled revolver and a sawed off shotgun and began their operations. A dozen passengers were lined up and stripped of their money and jewels. The bandits jumped from the train as it slowed up in passing through here.

CARBON BLACK BILL PUT SQUARELY UP TO HOUSE

AUSTIN, Feb. 27.—The carbon black bill to permit burning of natural gas at wellheads for manufacture of carbon black will go before the house for disposal by the body as a whole. The committee considering sent it to the house without recommendation.

ROWDY ROOSTERS, GIDY GESE AND QUALITY FOWLS WILL VIE AT RANGER'S CHICKEN SHOW

San Antonio has her battle of flowers, Cuero her turkey trot and Ranger proposes to have a chicken carnival. A poultry show attracts poultry fanciers, but does not lure cattle raisers, dog breeders or mule farmers. Ranger wants to bring in all Eastland county and many from adjacent counties to enjoy her chicken display, and Ranger poultry raisers, meeting last night to plan a poultry show to be held in Ranger Oct. 12 to 17, this year, decided to make it a chicken carnival.

An old-fashioned cocking main will be one of the features of the carnival. Probably several pits will be constructed where the game birds will contest for honors. There are said to be upwards of a score of game cock breeders in and about Ranger and some of the birds have acquired more than local fame for their fighting qualities. One of these breeders has to keep his pens separated by double barriers of burlap to prevent his cocks attacking the shadows on the screen. It is proposed also to have goose races along Main street. It is probable there will be trial heats, semi-finals and then the championship final event. Those who have seen goose races say they are both humorous and exciting. Mark Twain made the jumping frog famous; Ranger would exalt the goose race.

Of course these events will be side events for the poultry show, which is expected to bring pens of birds having distinguished ancestry from all poultry raisers within a radius of 100 miles and many from more distant points. B. S. Dudley is general chairman for the occasion with R. H. Bush, county agent, advisory general chairman. C. C. Patterson is secretary and treasurer. Chairmen have been named for various committees, each to select his assistants. They are: Regular show, W. P. Bryant, who has named A. Davonport as one of his committee. Utility birds, J. W. Sanders, who has selected W. C. Gorman and Tim Woods to assist him. Educational program, Mrs. R. J. Taylor. Novelty program and entertainment, O. R. Brady. Advertising committee, O. S. Driskill. Building, grounds and concessions, M. D. Maloon. Another meeting of the poultrymen has been called for next Thursday night at 7:30 o'clock, to be held in the Chamber of Commerce auditorium on the second floor of the Guaranty bank building. All persons interested in making the chicken carnival a success are invited to attend.

Ranger Launches Public Safety Move

Fire Chief Inaugurates First Step To Regulate Motorists

Ranger police and fire officials are not only determined to at once inaugurate and enforce downtown parking restrictions, but have already taken the first important step in that direction and as rapidly as conditions admit the entire plan, as recently agreed upon by city officials and civic bodies, will be in full operation, according to Fire Chief G. A. Murphy and Chief of Police O. V. Davenport.

Certain hindrance of fire department operations in case of a serious conflagration in the business district, as well as thoughtless or selfish "hogging" of parking space, frequent infringement of common rules of the road, traffic jams and other dangerous conditions brought on by the presence, growth and use of motor vehicles operation in Ranger are going to be stopped, insofar as city ordinances and rigid enforcement of them can make reasonable safety measures possible, the Ranger police and fire officials declare.

Curbs on street intersections of Ranger's business district are today warning all motorists not to park in the restricted area with a brand new coat of white paint with black letter "no park here" inscribed on them. Restricted areas in the business district are all curb intersections and a distance of 20 feet from fire plugs. Violations of the parking ordinance will be punishable with a heavy fine, according to Fire Chief G. A. Murphy, under whose direction the paint is being put on.

Other Restrictions Soon. Painting of the curbs at street intersections and near fire plugs is but a preliminary step towards having uniform parking spaces on the streets in the district. Several months ago the Ranger Lions club endorsed a movement whereby the streets in the business district would be marked off into parking spaces at a 45 degree angle

Safe Robber Meets Death In Explosion

KANSAS CITY, Feb. 27.—The charred body of a yeggman in front of a safe which it is thought he was trying to open was found here today following a terrific explosion. The man was burned beyond recognition. An overcharge of nitro glycerin caused the explosion. About \$2,000 was missing from the safe and the damage to the building was estimated at \$8,000.

Sun Yat Sen Sinking

PEKIN, Feb. 27.—All hope for recovery of Dr. Sun Yat Sen, president of the government of southern China, has been abandoned. The president, who has been confined to his bed with cancer, is steadily weakening and though only slightly conscious is suffering intensely.

TWO SERIOUSLY INJURED IN AIRPLANE ACCIDENT

HOUSTON, Feb. 27.—Royal Copeland, assistant general manager of the Houston Aerial Transport company, was probably fatally injured and V. V. Haynes, general manager of the company, seriously injured when their plane crashed to earth from a height of 100 feet late yesterday. Copeland sustained a fractured skull and other injuries. Haynes suffered a broken leg. According to Haynes the motor of the plane went dead soon after leaving the landing field.

SCHUMANN-HEINK TO SING AT DENTON

DENTON, Feb. 27.—Madame Schumann-Heink, contralto of world fame and for many years a favorite on the American concert stage, will be presented to Denton county music lovers Saturday night in the auditorium of the College of Industrial Arts. The singer's appearance is not a number in the regular artists course which brings many noted musicians annually to the campus of the state college for women.

Dallas News Editor Encourages Women

DENTON, Feb. 27.—J. E. King, managing editor of the Dallas News, addressed students in journalism at the College of Industrial Arts recently on "The Modern Newspaper and the Place of Woman in It." His talk was one of a series of similar addresses arranged periodically by the journalism club at the college.

BOSTON, Feb. 27.—Charles Ponzi, former international coupon millionaire, was found guilty today in Suffolk superior court on four indictments charging larceny of \$9,500 from investors in 1920. He will seek a new trial.

Girl Weds Ex-Convict

MIDWAY, Texas, Feb. 27.—Search for Miss Eunice Parton, 13, believed to have been kidnaped by an ex-convict ended abruptly here today when it was learned the girl had married Pat Riley, former convict, in Fort Worth yesterday. Riley was discharged from the state penitentiary a week ago. The couple will seek parental approval.

Robason and Hammett Will Co-operate

Police Commissioner Dr. Cal. Terrell today announced that he had extended an invitation to County Motorcycle Officers Robason and Hammett to include Ranger in their work which was promptly accepted by the officers. "We have had a number of complaints about traffic violations, such as the 'no left-hand turn,' speeding and reckless driving on Main street," said Dr. Terrell, "and the officers will pay especial attention to these violations when in Ranger."

Two-Bit Crap Limit Raised Ten Dollars

Thursday afternoon while Constable M. N. Seaborn of Eastland was searching in "Niggerstown" for a negro for whom he had a warrant of arrest, he accidentally walked in on a "crap" game where two negroes were shooting for a quarter a shot. They were brought before Justice of the Peace Sam Day, where they pleaded guilty to gambling and were given the minimum fine of \$10 and costs, which totaled \$31.95 each.

Young Watson Faces Serious Charges Over Midnight Auto Crash

Additional bruises, mental rather than physical, however, are to be added to the broken arm and other serious bodily injuries suffered by Joe Watson, who, accompanied by Miss Maude Mahan and a young woman called "Billie," was driving the Ford touring car which crashed into Aubrey Jameson's Studebaker roadster on the Bankhead highway between Ranger and Eastland about midnight Tuesday.

County Officer Bob Hammett today expects to take young Watson into custody on charges of driving an automobile while intoxicated, and will prefer the additional charge of driving an automobile without proper license, because the license plates on the wrecked Ford car, investigation disclosed, are not registered either to Watson or the car he was driving. Where Watson got the license plates, and how, Officer Hammett intends to find out, he said; but in the meantime the youthful accident victim will have plenty of other troubles, the officer indicated.

Highway Investigators Uncover Misconduct

AUSTIN, Feb. 27.—Evidence of certain state highway officials accepting "under classification" paving, in one instance of advancing \$17,000 more to contractor before highway was accepted than permitted by law, and various other acts justifying severe criticism were brought to the attention of highway investigators at a meeting of the highway investigation committee all day yesterday.

World War Veteran Hanged in Alabama

MONTGOMERY, Ala., Feb. 27.—Clarence Bailey, world war veteran, convicted of the murder of James Gullepper, a fellow convict at Kilby prison, was hanged here today. Thrice reprieved by Governor Brandon, Bailey went to the gallows after a sanity commission decided he was legally responsible for the murder.

Income Tax Official Here to Aid Citizens

D. G. Hunt, deputy income tax collector of Dallas arrived in Ranger today and is maintaining an office at the Ranger State bank where he is ready to furnish information to all regarding income tax returns. Mr. Hunt will be at the bank during banking hours only, and will remain in Ranger Friday and Saturday.

Wichita Mayor Will Have Hearing Saturday

WICHITA FALLS, Feb. 27.—Counsel for ex-Mayor Frank Collier, indicted for the killing of Elzie Robertson, his 17-year-old son-in-law, prepared habeas corpus proceedings today in an attempt to obtain Collier's release from jail.

Fort Worth Man Named Bogota Commerce Attache

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27.—Appointment of William Boaz of Fort Worth as American commercial attaché at Bogota, Colombia, was announced today by the bureau of foreign and domestic commerce.

Robinson Insurance Bill Before Senate

AUSTIN, Feb. 27.—The Wirtz bill to repeal compulsory investment clause of the Robertson insurance law was scheduled to come before the senate today as a special order of business.

Prohibition Director Highwaymen's Victim

KANSAS CITY, Feb. 27.—L. F. Dehart, federal prohibition director for Missouri, was one of the victims of a holdup Thursday when bandits raided the jewelry store of L. E. Weurth, in the downtown district, and escaped with several thousand dollars worth of jewelry and some cash.

Truant Hoosier Solons Return

INDIANAPOLIS, Feb. 27.—The truant Hoosier state democratic senators came home today. Cold and shivering they piled out of the bus which brought them back from their voluntary exile in Dayton, Ohio. Senator Chambers of Newcastle, spokesman for the bolting solons, announced that a satisfactory agreement had been reached on the Penrod "gerrymandering" bill and "other disputed points."

Chamber Told Must Keep Within Budget

President Horace Butler of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce, this morning at a meeting of a committee appointed some days ago to make a drive for funds to complete the budget for the ensuing year, announced that the chamber was operating on the budget basis and that when the amount designated to be used by the organization this year was spent no more would be used and that the Chamber of Commerce would have to cut expenses and get along somehow.

Admiral Jones Says Philippine Islands Not Invulnerable

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27.—The Philippine islands were declared to be exceedingly vulnerable by Rear Admiral Hilary P. Jones, chief of the navy board, testifying before the house aircraft investigating committee.

Admiral Jones confirmed the statement made by Brigadier General William Mitchell of the air service to the aircraft committee several weeks ago that the Philippines, Hawaii and other American Pacific possessions could be taken by Japan in two weeks. He declared that the opinion of the navy board after three months' survey of conditions was that battleships were still the dominant force in sea power.

The distance between the United States and foreign countries is too great to make the menace of an air attack upon us really serious," declared Jones.

New Textbook Law Promised

AUSTIN, Feb. 27.—Adoption of uniform textbooks in Texas will be materially changed if the Laird textbook bill is finally enacted. The senate amendment adopted yesterday provided that high schools may select for a period of five years any text they choose from a series of six, that may be approved by the state textbook commission.

Wells Bond Is Fixed At \$1000

R. H. Wells of Ranger, who is being held on a charge of murder, filed in Justice of the Peace Sam Day's court in Eastland, growing out of the killing of Policeman Jimmy Daniels of Ranger in Ranger early Sunday morning, Feb. 1, has given bond in the sum of \$1,000, signed by his father, J. W. Wells; S. W. Ingram, Albert Hill and Ennis Jackson, to appear for examining trial in the Eighty-eighth district court at 2 o'clock Wednesday afternoon, March 4, and has been released.

Wells In Outside Jail

Wells, who was being held by the officers, sued out a writ of habeas corpus, in an effort to regain his liberty, which was to have been heard by Judge Elzo Been of the Eighty-eighth district court Wednesday, but the officers were unable to have Wells here because of the fact that he was being kept in a jail in another town, not made public, so the hearing was postponed until Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock.

Yesterday afternoon at the scheduled time, Wells, accompanied by his attorneys, Chastain, Judkins & Dodson, appeared before Judge Been for a hearing.

County Attorney W. J. Barnes made a motion that the habeas corpus proceedings be dismissed on the ground that Wells had not had an examining trial and had not waived an examining trial. Wells' attorneys agreed that the motion was well taken and Judge Been dismissed the habeas corpus proceedings. It was then agreed by the county attorney and counsel for Wells that Wells should give bond in the sum of \$1,000 for his appearance at an examining trial.

Comfort Bank Loot Nets Yeggs \$10,000

SAN ANTONIO, Feb. 27.—Ten thousand dollars was looted from the Comfort State bank at Comfort before dawn Thursday.

Four men, believed to be from San Antonio, invaded Comfort in a motor car with elaborate apparatus for robbing the safe in the bank. They were fully equipped with acetylene tanks, tar paper and water, and burned their way through the back of one of the most modern burglar-proof safes.

Graham Suffers Fire Loss Totaling \$75,000

GRAHAM, Feb. 27.—The Young County Lumber company yard was destroyed by fire Thursday, together with a hotel, grocery store, garage and several barns.

The blaze was fanned by a stiff southwest wind. Losses are estimated at \$75,000, partly covered by insurance.

Bank Failure and Threatened Lynching Follow Kansas City Bootleg Expose

KANSAS CITY, Feb. 27.—Joseph R. Gaant was at the home of his father today following persistent rumors that outraged depositors in the closed Centropolis bank would invade the sanitarium, his retreat after the discovery of an alleged shortage of \$625,000 in the bank funds.

Gaant who is at liberty on \$50,000 bond in connection with embezzlement charges was named yesterday in a statement of one of three patrolmen arrested for whisky handling.

Chief of Police Shreve was working today on a theory that Gaant purchased vast quantities of liquor from wholesale dealers then was doubled-crossed by men he believed his friends and part of the liquor stolen before he could market it.

The three patrolmen got in on the tail-end of the liquor store, Shreve believes. The cache of liquor which police have been watching for two weeks, valued at more than \$200,000, has completely disappeared. Statements obtained by police from four men shortly after the bank failed were that covered trucks went in and out of the garage where the liquor was known to be stored.

The discovery of the ring grew out of the mutilated bodies of Lovejoy, patrolman, and Peters, in the jungle bottoms. Lovejoy and Peters were killed because they stole whisky from bootleggers.

**CONGRESS MAY SUBMIT TO THE PEOPLE MANNER OF ADOPTING CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**

WASHINGTON—The first change likely to be made in the present system of government—now called obsolete and worn out by many members of congress—is a revision of the method by which constitutional amendments are adopted.  
Out of some 50 constitutional amendments now pending in congress, both republican and democratic leaders have seized upon this one which will make it harder to revise the constitution.  
Answering the general cry which is being set up on all sides to bring government methods up to date, the republicans have placed the Wadsworth resolution upon their program of legislation they intend to adopt before March 4, when congress adjourns.  
Similarly, Representative Finis Garrett, leader of the democrats in the house of representatives, proposed a resolution recently which would attain the same end as the Wadsworth resolution.  
Both are designed to give the people of the various states the right to vote direct on the amendments to the United States constitution. Now, after congress passes a resolution proposing the amendment, it is necessary for three-fourths of the states legislatures to ratify the amendment before it is proclaimed adopted. Under the new proposal, the states could adopt a rule whereby the amendment would be submitted to a referendum and this referendum would take the place of any ratification by the legislatures.  
It has long been contended that changing the United States constitution under the present system is a political affair, in which the people themselves actually have no voice. While the amendments are adopted by their representatives in congress and the legislatures, it may be that both have been discredited by the people. Also it is pointed out by Senator Thomas J. Walsh, one of the leading constitutional lawyers of the senate and one of the leaders in the movement for reform, that the subject of the amendment may not have been an issue in the campaign in which the legislatures were elected. Hence the people have no actual control over what will be considered constitutional.  
The agitation for this reform started back at the time the eighteenth amendment to the constitution, providing for national prohibition, went into effect. It was contended then and has since been repeated that the amendment could never have been adopted in a national referendum.  
It is considered likely that the

Wadsworth or Garrett resolutions or, vice the action of its legislature, one similar to them will be finally adopted before adjournment is taken.

Specifically, here are the changes either would bring:  
1—That any state may provide for a popular vote to affirm or re-  
2—Permit a state which has already acted upon an amendment proposal, to reconsider its action any time up to the moment when three-fourths of the states have actually completed ratification.

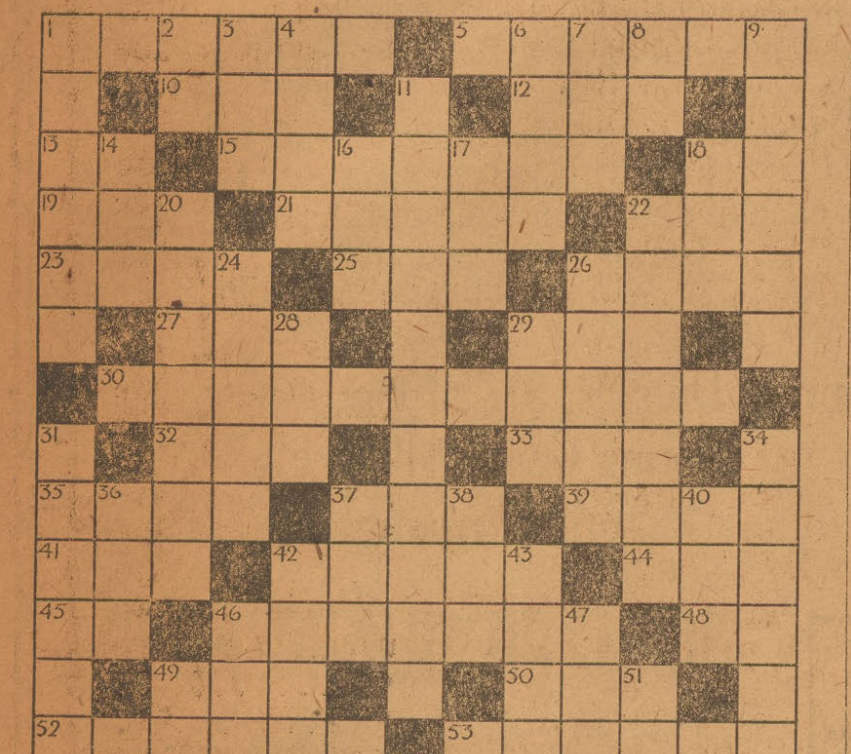

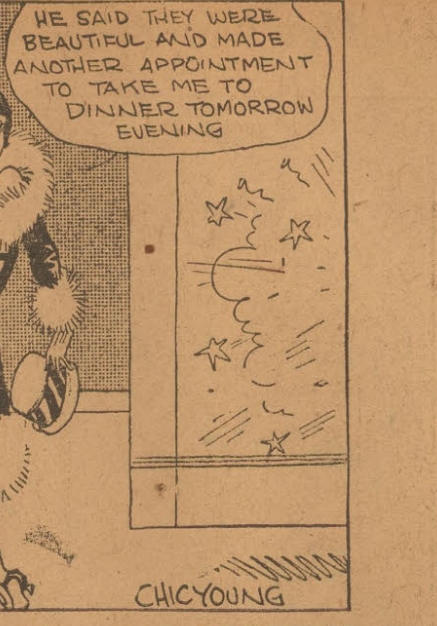

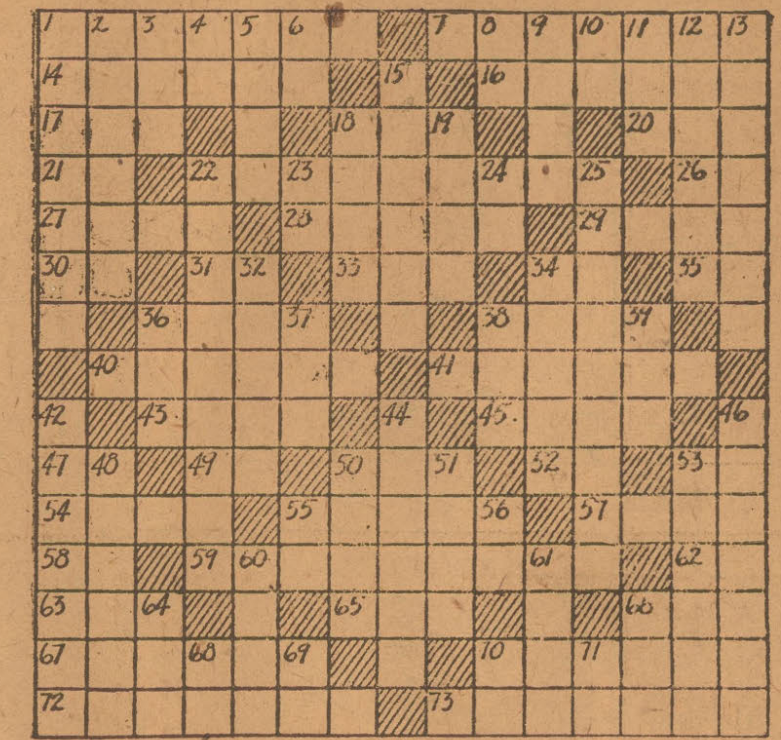

**Norwegian Capital Reverts To Original Name, Now Is Oslo**

LONDON.—Postmen and telegraph operators and bank clerks are just becoming accustomed to a destination or an origin called Oslo. And crossword puzzle fans are just becoming stumped by it. So, the change of name of the Norwegian capital, from Christiania, which it had borne for three centuries, to Oslo, its original name, may now be considered as an accomplished fact. For many years a faction in Norway has been insisting upon reverting to the original name. In 1923 the Christiania city council cast a tie vote on the question. Then a compromise was proposed. In 1924, Christiania was to celebrate the three hundredth anniversary of its existence. The name-changers suggested that it be allowed to observe that tercentenary as Christiania and then, in 1925, revert to the name Oslo. And Christiania saw the old year out and Oslo welcomed the new. In 1924 it was almost destroyed by fire and King Christian IV had it rebuilt and named after himself. But the love of the old name survived for three hundred years in Norwegian hearts—and finally won.

### ELECTRICAL ENGINEERING MAY TAKE MANY YOUNG MEN FROM MIDDLE WEST

In responding to the honors done him at his recent birthday celebration, Thomas A. Edison is reported to have said that we are only on the threshold of the electrical era. When the future possibilities are conceived in the light of what today as a threshold affords, imagination seems inadequate. Few indeed must be they who are without some desire to come back 100 years hence and revel in the comforts and advantages which today's threshold-accomplishments bestir imagination to expect. In announcing its recently inaugurated course in public utilities, Dean Ralph E. Heilman of the school of commerce of Northwestern university said:

"Public utilities in the United States are expanding so fast and are rendering such a vast service to our progressive population that they are fast drawing into their ranks some of the brightest of our young men and women. With this special course within the reach of the rural and urban people of the great middle west it is fair to assume that many will now turn their attention to this attractive field of activity. For in this field are almost innumerable opportunities for advancement, promotion and larger responsibilities."

and more uses of electricity in the home and upwards of 12,000,000 homes wired for electric service. Electricity is depended upon in nearly two million stores and office buildings and on more than 450,000 farms. And reference to today as a threshold must also include the electrical accomplishments in the field of transportation, communication, street lighting, traffic control, power and the myriad specialized applications in fields as diverse as surgery, plant growing and recovering sunk-on treasure.

American manufacturers of electrical appliances and supplies during 1924 used 9.5 per cent more copper than they did during the previous year. In practically every other industry of the country the consumption of copper for last year was lower than that of two years ago.

# REALISTIC HOME LIVING TAUGHT COLLEGE GIRLS

### All Phases of Management, Including Buying, Are Tried Out.

Special Correspondence.

AUSTIN, Feb. 26.—Girls in the University of Texas are working actual problems of the home-builder in their course in economics of the household, which is taught by Miss Mary Edna Gearing, professor of home economics.

Four girls work as a committee on the problems of an actual family with a stated income. There are 24 girls taking this course, which is

open only to seniors. The first problem which the girls take up is the purchasing and furnishing of a home. They are required to visit furniture stores and second-hand stores to secure actual prices on furnishing this proposed home. During this investigation they must ascertain the difference between paying actual cash or buying the furniture on the installment plan.

**Costs Closely Studied.**

The girls also make an investigation to find if it is more economic to own the home or to rent one. For this same family the girls work out clothing and food budgets which are practical and are based on the given income. In these budgets they also make allowances for education, recreation and travel and incident expenses which may come up during the year.

**Manager Problem** which is very interesting is an investigation to see if the woman's time spent around the home is worth as much to the income she gets as the time she spends to work and employed a servant to do the household duties. Each girl sends out 5 questionnaires to housewives whom she knows personally and who will cooperate with her.

**House vs. Office Work.**

These questionnaires contain information about the time a woman spends on dishwashing and actual housework. From such a time schedule the girls expect to determine whether or not the time spent on housework will compensate her for her time spent in office work. The results take an entirely different turn if there are children in the home, it is stated, for that gives another angle to the problem.

After completing this course on the economics of the household, the girls go to the practice house where they put into actual practice the principles that they have learned and attempt to put housekeeping on an economic basis. Each girl is supposed to stay one term in the practice house as a requirement for the bachelor of science degree in home economics.

Each girl has a certain specialty to perform. One week she may be the cook, the next week the waitress, the third week the maid, and the fourth week the hostess. Miss Elsie Berry, instructor in home economics, lives at the practice house and supervises the work of the girls.

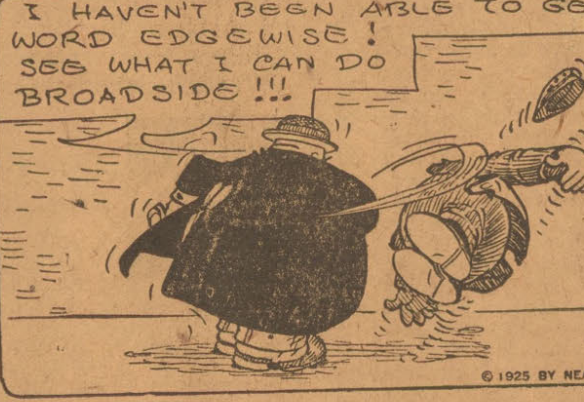
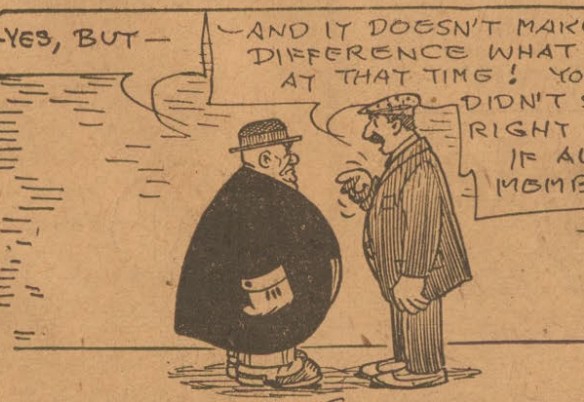

## Ancient Castles In England Too Costly For 'Poor' Nobles

LONDON.—The Tocsin has rung for Arundel castle, one of the most famous baronial castles in England, for many generations the residence of the Dukes of Norfolk.

Though the present Duke of Norfolk, the premier duke of England and hereditary earl-marshal, is one of the richest persons in England, he found the upkeep of Arundel too much for him.

The present duke has not yet come of age. He is 17 years old and a student at Oxford.

The closing of Arundel is another example of the land-poverty of England's great noblemen—Norfolk is but one of hundreds of peers who have been fopped in recent years,

on account of income tax and super tax, to close down or sell their ancestral estates.

Not only has the Duke of Norfolk closed his castle but he has been forced "to fire" over 50 members of his personal staff who have in many cases been with his family for generations.

Old retainers are to go. The indoor staff and outdoor staffs are cut down. Part of the garden has been let to a friend, while a great portion of the timber on the estate has been sold.

The estates in entirety comprise about 50,000 acres of the finest land for Sussex, Westminister, Sheffield, Norwich and several other places.

It is a significant fact that the late duke's town house, a great mansion on St. James' square, has also been let, the lessee being Mrs. W. H. Brown of Pittsburgh.

The last time Arundel castle saw a real celebration was the coming-out party of Lady Howard in 1923, when 900 guests were present.

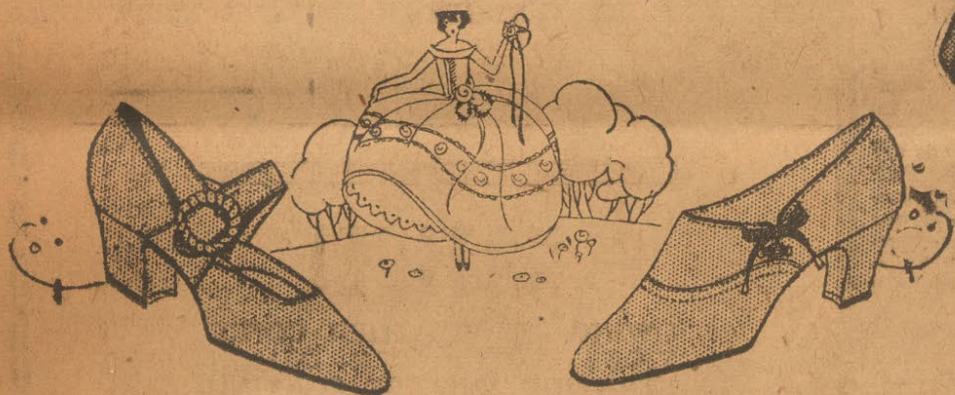

## JURY DECLARES AGED J. E. LUSE OF SOUND MIND

was very severe in his criticism of Mrs. Luse and said that, although his brother was very feeble and almost helpless, he knew all that was going on and knew what was said to him. He testified further that he knew nothing of the former insanity proceedings until sometime after it was had, though he was visiting at the home of his brother at the time. It had been previously shown at the former proceeding that J. E. Luse was confined to his bed at home and unable to be brought to court at Eastland.

In the beginning of the trial J. B. Barker, attorney for Mrs. A. L. Luse, wife of J. E. Luse, raised the question that the motion should be dismissed for the reason that J. W. Luse, not being an interested party, had no right to make the motion. This contention was overruled by the court, and it being admitted by the attorney for Mrs. Luse that no warrant was served on J. F. Luse prior to the first insanity proceedings, the court held that no jurisdiction had been acquired over J. E. Luse.

Luse's estate is valued at several hundred thousand dollars and that the value of property disposed of by Mrs. Luse under the authority given her by the court's rulings in the former trial, runs into thousands of dollars. It is also said that unless settlement or agreement can be reached with those who purchased property through Mrs. Luse, considerable litigation will result. Attorney's for Mr. Luse say that in their opinion there is no question but that every sale of property which has been made by Mrs. Luse could and would be set aside.

**GREAT BRITAIN HAS REAL AIR BATTLESHIP**  
 Will Carry Seven Tons of Bombs and Have Speed of 100 Miles an Hour.

By JOHN GUNTHER, United Press Staff Correspondent, LONDON.—Enter the battleship of the sky.  
 Tests are now being carried out at the marine air station at Felixstowe for the world's largest boat seaplane, which will be driven by four Rolls-Royce engines developing nearly 3,000 horsepower.  
 This new leviathan has been designed to operate with the fleet at sea. It is a battle plane in every sense of the word.  
 According to the air ministry, it is hoped that the ship will be able to ride out the fiercest of gales while at anchor (on a battleship) and can cruise with the fleet while on maneuvers for days on end without returning to its permanent base.  
 The fact that it has a speed of 100 miles an hour (minimum) and carries seven tons of bombs adds materially to the title claimed for it—the first dreadnought of the air.  
 For accommodations it has sleeping quarters for a crew of six men.  
 Full scale official experiments are shortly to be carried out at the air ministry's test airrome at South Farnborough, Hampshire. Among the experiments will be the tryout of a new device which promises to bring in new era of commercial aviation—a fog finder.  
 This, it is hoped, will remove the danger of one great besetting difficulty to British flyers in the channel and the North Sea—fog.  
 The apparatus consists of electric cables running to the ground and a delicate mechanism on the airplane itself. So long as the pilot remains within the radius of a powerful electric current radiating from the ground cables a small red gleam from an electric bulb on his dashboard from an electric bulb when he is unable to see the earth. Any deviation will be at once indicated.  
 Air ministry officials believe this new device will do away with the terror of fog.  
 It is but one of the new improvements to be installed on the first of England's seaplane "dreadnaughts."
