



Breakfast-Stewed prunes, cereal, thin cream, crisp toast, milk, coffee.

Luncheon-Jellied salad, graham bread and cream cheese sandwiches, strawberry shortcake, milk, tea.

eon dessert. Asparagus salad for small persons should be made with finely minced lettuce and heads of asparagus moist ened with olive oil and lemon juice. With these slight changes the menus can be used as suggested for children from four years up.

### Jellied Salad

One cup cold cooked peas, 1/2 cup diced cooked carrots, ½ cup diced celery, 1 cup flaked salmon, 3 hard cooked eggs, knuckle and shin of veal, medium sized onion, salt and

The bones of the knuckle must be well cracked. But into a large kettle with the onion and two quarts of cold water. Bring slowly to the boiling point and simmer gently for three hours, skimming as scum rises. Reduce stock to 1½ cups. Strain through two thicknesses of cheesecloth. Arrange vegetables, fish and eggs in layers, seasoning each layer with salt and pepper. Pour over broth, cover and weight. Let stand in a cold place for several hours to become firm. Serve on a bed of lettuce with mayonnaise.




