RANGER MAN IS BURNED TO DEATH IN HOME

RANGER BAND CONCERTS TO BE ARRANGED

Music in the Park Every Week During the Summer Appears Assured.

Italian Cardinal Attacks Prevailing Modes Women's Dress

NAPLES, Italy, June 5.—Cardinal Ascalesi today promulgated the church's first attack upon prevailing summer modes for women in a pastoral letter in which he violently criticized the present day dress.

"Have these short, neckless and armless gowns, so thin and clinging that they only betray the human form, become a sign of modesty, correctness and decency?" the cardinal wrote.

"Do these weak daughters of Eve not blush when it is said their moral sense is so perverted that they are progressively disrobing in order to become like women savages?" the letter continued.

"Are they not ashamed when people say that little by little they are returning to the styles of the Garden of Eden, or even worse, since their course is the opposite of Eve by disrobing instead of covering their nakedness?"

Wheat Harvesters Busy In Oklahoma

OKLAHOMA CITY, June 5.—Under the rays of the hot summer sun, harvesters went forth today to the fields to gather the 1925 wheat crop, according to reports reaching here. Old settlers said it was the earliest period they had ever known grain to ripen.

COLOR OF MOTOR CAR NUMBER PLATES CHANGE

AUSTIN, June 5.—Color of number plates of motor vehicles to be issued by the state highway commission in 1925 is to be changed. Automobile plates will be of battleship gray with black figures while the commercial car and truck plates will be blue with white figures. Bids for furnishing the number plates are to be opened by the state board of control, June 28.

PRESIDENT APPOINTS NEW SOLICITOR GENERAL

WASHINGTON, June 5.—President Coolidge today appointed William G. Mitchell of St. Paul, Minn., to be solicitor general of the United States, succeeding James Beck, recently resigned.

Plot Against King Of Spain Revealed

LONDON, June 5.—News dispatches from Cerbere, on the Spanish-French border, today reported frustration of plots against the lives of the Spanish king and queen by discovery of bombs laid on railway tracks near Barcelona and in the Barcelona cathedral, where King Alfonso was to attend mass yesterday.

POWERS URGE CHINA TO KEEP DOWN RIOTING

Protest Against Disorders In Shanghai and Demand Release of Captives.

PEKIN, June 5.—The foreign powers, in a second note to the Chinese foreign office, strongly protested today against the Shanghai disorders and urged measures to protect against further rioting, and also demanded the immediate release of all Chinese captives.

Missionaries Side With Student Revolt

WASHINGTON, June 5.—Several American missionary institutions in China have sided with the student revolt and against the United States diplomatic men and the police. The American legation at Peking much embarrassed by the action, has protested on the ground that their attitude is gravely inexpedient at this time.

HONG KONG, China, June 5.—

Virtual anarchy was reported today at Canton, where Yunnan troops holding the city already have clashed with the Canton governmental forces. Foreigners are quitting the city. Two British and two American gunboats are anchored in the river.

LONDON TO ABIDE BY HER AGREEMENT REGARDING CHINA

LONDON, June 5.—England's policy towards China in the present situation will be based on the Washington agreement, it was learned today. England, it was stated, has no intention of deviating from that understanding. This would tend to indicate that no undue pressure is to be exerted against China, so far as Great Britain is concerned. The Washington nine-power agreement with China in 1922 guaranteed the "open door" in China, and said its purpose was to safeguard the rights and interests of China and to promote trade and intercourse on the basis of equality and opportunity.

BUSINESS IN CHINA SUFFERS FROM RIOTING

SAN FRANCISCO, June 5.—Generally disrupted business conditions and closed schools were reported in Chinese cables today to the Chinese Times here. All banks in Shanghai were closed, but at Peking the banks were reported to be taking care of business there and at other points affected by the laborers' strike and student demonstrations.

Ships Ready to Sail On Amundsen's Trail

OSLO, Norway, June 5.—The Amundsen base ships, Fram and Hobbly, intended to start today on their cruise along the fringe of the Arctic ice in the hope of finding some trace of the Amundsen-Ellsworth polar air expedition. The captain of the Fram wired that his steel boat was not adapted for entering the ice pack and he also warned that any airplane sailing over the pack would be attended by danger. Norwegian authorities are discussing plans for sending another vessel northward.

COLLIN COUNTY BOY KILLED WHEN CRUSHED UNDER BINDER

M'KINNEY, June 5.—Willie Bailey, 18 years old, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. O. Bailey, while repairing a binder on his father's place one mile south of Murphy Tuesday suffered injuries which resulted shortly afterward in his death.

He had been working on the heavy machine, when it unexpectedly fell, crushing the youth beneath it. He is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. O. Bailey, two brothers, J. B. and Alvie and one sister, Gladys.

HOT WEATHER CAUSES MANY PROSTRATIONS

Death's Toll From Heat Wave 112 This Morning, With Others in Prospect.

The most disastrous heat wave since the weather bureau was established had increased its toll to 112 deaths this morning when, for the fifth successive day, a rising tide of heat enveloped a large portion of the nation. Soaring temperatures and low humidity were expected to continue their havoc and suffering, with no relief in sight for the next three days.

Forty-four more deaths in the last 24 hours added to the 68 fatalities occurring previously during the current heat wave. Tropical weather caused ten more deaths in Chicago during the last 24 hours, bringing the total of deaths to 18; in New York nine deaths were reported; in Pittsburgh six. In Boston, where the maximum temperature reached the record breaking 96.3-10, four persons were killed by the heat. Four deaths were reported at New Haven, Washington, officially the nation's hottest spot, with a maximum temperature of 99, had three deaths and 39 prostrations. In Detroit two died and more than a score were prostrated. At Binghamton, N. Y., there were two deaths. Two bathers were drowned at Philadelphia, Albany and Syracuse each reported one death, while St. Louis, Wilmington, Del., and Harrisburg, Pa., reported numbers of prostrations.

NEW YORK, June 5.—Nine deaths here have increased the city's heat toll to 15. Thousands of inhabitants slept last night in the parks on benches and more than 10,000 slept on the sands at Coney Island. Down in the smothering caves on the east side, men women and children leaped out of tenement house windows until long after midnight seeking a breath of fresh air that was not there. Others walked the streets and suburban roads were crowded with motor cars in which many sought relief from the heat.

Secretary Work is Charged With Bias In Water Dispute

AUSTIN, June 5.—In statements filed today with Attorney General Dan Moody, as basis for the water suits to be filed by the state of Texas against the state of Colorado, allegations are made that Colorado has obtained permits from Dr. Hubert Work, secretary of the interior, to take all of the water of the Rio Grande, which "is wrong and unjust to the water users obtaining their supply from the Elephant Butte dam, and will work a serious loss to them."

The Colorado dam is yet to be constructed and the suit to be filed by Texas in the United States supreme court will be one of equity to prevent appropriation of the waters of the Rio Grande river.

SOLDIER MAY BE NAMED HEAD A. & M. COLLEGE

Major Richard Croke Burlison, U. S. A., Being Considered For President.

AUSTIN, June 5.—The board of directors of Texas A. & M. college will be asked to appoint Major Richard Croke Burlison, U. S. A., as president of that institution, to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Dr. W. B. Bizzell, according to Austin friends of Major Burlison. Burlison is a native Texan, a graduate of Texas A. & M. and also of West Point. For a time in France, under appointment of General Pershing, he served as instructor of young officers. He is now on the general staff at Washington, detailed to write the history of the world war.

Allied Note Points To Germany's Failure To Observe Treaty

LONDON, June 5.—The allied note on German disarmament defaults delivered to German Chancellor Luther, yesterday, declared that it rests with Germany to assure allied evacuation of Teuton territory. This, the note, made public this evening, declares evacuation can be accomplished by Germany showing her good intent to rectify her shortcomings in respect to fulfilling the Versailles treaty armament clauses. The note enumerates German defaults, chief of which is charged to be the failure of Germany to organize her "security police" on non-military basis.

For instance, Germany houses her police in barracks, military style and it is claimed the force is greatly overstaffed.

Secondly, the note accuses Germany of having failed to meet the requirements of conversion of her factories into peace time industries. Many of them are still capable of manufacturing ammunition and arms.

Contract Awarded For Five Stores By Dr. A. K. Wier

Contract for erection of one-story fire-proof building on the property known as the Bohning property on lower Main street, Ranger, to Borden Brothers, of Ranger, was announced today by Dr. A. K. Wier, owner. Amount of the contract was said to be about \$15,000. Three stores will be constructed facing So. Rusk street and two stores will be facing Main.

Consummation of the transaction whereby the Bohning heirs sold the property to Dr. A. K. Wier was announced recently.

Baby Is Hurt When Cars Meet Head-On

The 3½-year-old baby girl of Mr. and Mrs. B. A. Smith of Ranger, was cut about the head and face when thrown through the windshield of a Ford coupe when the car was struck by a Chevrolet roadster in a head-on collision on West Main street, Ranger, near the Mission garage, last night about 9 o'clock. Mrs. Smith was suffering from a severe shaking up and was slightly bruised from the crash.

The car of Mrs. Smith was coming down Main towards town and the other car was going west. According to reports the two cars met practically head-on. The accident was blamed to the bright lights, which blinded the driver, it was claimed. The child was taken to the clinical hospital, where the gash in her forehead was sewed up, several stitches being necessary after which she was removed to her home. Both cars were damaged from the collision.

NORFLEET GETS LAST SWINDLER HE HAS SOUGHT

Waits Outside Prison Gates to See Him Arrested For Another Crime.

LEAVENWORTH, Kan., June 5. J. Frank Norfleet, Hale Center, Texas, rancher and trapper of confidence men, was present at the gate of Leavenworth prison today when W. B. Spencer, last of the gang that swindled him out of \$45,000, was released after serving a two-year term for peddling narcotics.

Spencer was re-arrested by Harry Hamilton, deputy sheriff of Tarrant county, and an effort will be made to return him to Texas to serve a four-year sentence imposed there for swindling.

Warden Biddle of the penitentiary had ordered Norfleet out of the prison grounds because he feared a fight between the two. Norfleet waited patiently outside the prison.

Six years ago he began a long chase that has resulted in the roundup of 70 bunco artists after he had been swindled out of a fortune. The pursuit led him over the world and cost him \$17,000.

New York Merchant Shot and Wounded

NEW YORK, June 5.—Thomas Leeming, wealthy drug importer and president of the company that bears his name, was shot and perhaps fatally wounded today by Charles Miller, an ex-convict.

The shooting occurred without warning as Leeming entered an elevator car. Miller was captured after a chase. He admitted the shooting but did not tell his motive.

NEW YORK, June 5.—Thomas Leeming, New York importer, who was shot today in his office, died at 2 p. m. in a hospital.

Charles Miller, arrested after the shooting, was ordered held on a murder charge. Miller told Assistant District Attorney Jones that he was an unrecognized son of the late Woodruff Leeming, of whose estate Thomas Leeming was the executor. He said he was left \$5,000 under the will of Woodruff Leeming, but had been unable to collect it. Miller said he went to Leeming's office today to demand a settlement, but was refused.

Bobby Jones and Willie McFarlane To Play Off Tie

WORCESTER, Mass., June 5.—After 18 holes of bitter battling under a blazing sun, Bobby Jones and Willie McFarlane were all square with scores of 75 at the end of 18 holes of their playoff for the national golf championship this afternoon.

Jones and McFarlane will play another 18 holes this afternoon in an effort to settle the championship. They will start at 3:30 p. m.

ITALY ASKED ABOUT ATTACK ON VICE-CONSUL

WASHINGTON, June 5.—Ambassador Fletcher has made "appropriate representations" to the Italian foreign office regarding the attack by fascists on American Vice-Consul Frank C. Gowen at Leghorn, Italy, the state department announced today.

"Premier Mussolini has ordered a thorough investigation," according to the department's announcement.

NO SPECIAL LEGISLATIVE SESSION IS CONTEMPLATED

AUSTIN, June 5.—After a conference today with Governor Ferguson, Representative J. W. Stevenson, Victoria county, announced that there will not be a special session of the legislature. Stevenson is chairman of the committee to study the tax situation in this state and made recommendation with raising revenue.

PAT M'GONICAL DARES FIRE IN SEEKING CHILD

His Baby, Severely Burned, Dies Several Hours Later; Wife Badly Injured.

W. A. (Pat) McGonical, aged 40, was burned to death in an early morning fire that destroyed his home here today. Patsy, his 3-year-old son died several hours later at the City-County hospital, from burns received in the fire from his chest to his head and from his hips down. His wife was cut severely by glass, when she was forced to break a window to escape from the flames, and was burned about the head and upper part of the body. She is also at the hospital.

Mr. McGonical, known to all of his friends as "Pat", was employed by the Barkley Tank company as superintendent, had been working on tanks in the new field near Ranger, and had not had much sleep for the past week. His wife stated that she awoke to find the house in flames, and grabbed her baby and threw him out of a window, then tried to wake her husband. Mr. McGonical woke up and began to look for the baby, and was burned to death thinking his baby was in the fire. He did not get outside of the house.

According to Mrs. McGonical, she awoke to find the house in flames and immediately turned her attention to arousing her husband. He had been losing considerable sleep the past week and was hard to wake. She said that after arousing her husband the flames were so bad that she grabbed her baby and threw him through a window to the ground outside and then tried to make her way back to her husband. Instead, the flames and smoke drove her to break through another window and escape to the outside. Mr. McGonical, she said, did not get out of the house at all, as well as she was able to remember.

The baby went back into the burning home after his mother had thrown him out and was taken from the flames by a baby who entered the house at the risk of his own life. It was when the baby went back into the house that it was fatally burned.

Dr. H. A. Logsdon, attending physician, said it was probable the baby had inhaled some smoke and flames. This was the second fire to visit the McGonicals within a year, their home in the Lackland addition being destroyed by fire last winter. At that time McGonical was away from home and Mrs. McGonical and her child had a narrow escape.

Besides his wife and baby, decedent is survived by his mother, of Scitooka, Okla., who has been notified of his death. The body is being held at the Killingsworth-Cox undertaking parlors.

The origin of the fire was not learned.

Firemen Respond To Three Alarms During the Night

The Ranger fire department was called on three times during last night. The first call was to Main and Commerce street where a Dodge car was burning. This fire was extinguished before the firemen arrived.

The second call was to an old feed barn on Hunt street, near the Hamon-Kell railway depot. The blaze was extinguished with only small damage to the property. The third call was to the McGonical home, which was totally destroyed, the fire having gained great headway before the alarm was burned in. The fire engine made a record run, but the firemen were unable to save the house as it was practically burned when the trucks arrived.

Columbia President Laughs at Tennessees

NEW YORK, June 5.—Laws such as that recently enacted in Tennessee, prohibiting the teaching of evolution, were described as an affront to popular intelligence by Dr. Nicholas Murray Butler, president of Columbia university, in a speech at the 171st commencement exercises at the university.

"The legislature and the governor of Tennessee," Dr. Butler said, "have with every appearance of equanimity just now joined in violently affronting the popular intelligence and have made it impossible for a scholar to be a teacher in that state without becoming at the same time a law-breaker."

DALLAS NEGRO EXECUTED

HUNTSVILLE, June 5.—Lavanie Twitty, Dallas negro, was electrocuted at 12 a. m. today for the murder of Ed Reed, service car driver, at Dallas in February, 1923. Reed was slain with a butcher and afterwards robbed by Twitty.

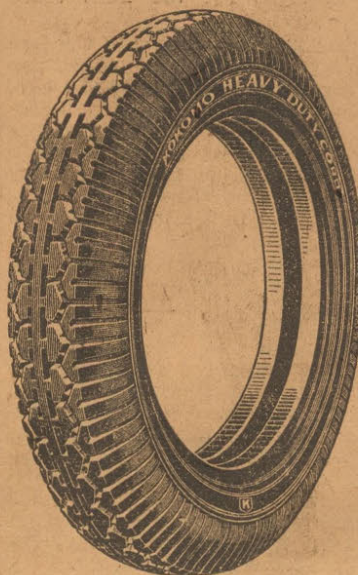

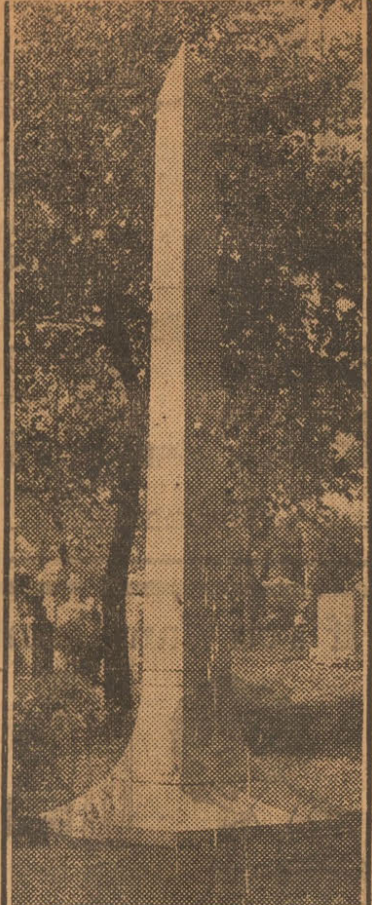

Arizona Photographs Indicate Vast Antiquity Of Man On This Earth

LOS ANGELES.—Remnants of a dinosaur that may upset by millions of years present theories of scientists on the antiquity of man, were discovered by the Doheny expedition in the Hava Supai canyon, in northern Arizona.
The expedition, headed by Samuel Hubbard, curator of archaeology at Oakland museum, and financed by F. L. Doheny, oil magnate, returned to Los Angeles recently after six months of research and exploration for tracts of prehistoric man on the North American continent.
Discovery of a dinosaur pictograph cut into the wall of the famous canyon reveals, according to Hubbard, that man is probably millions of years older than scientists have heretofore admitted.
The pictograph shows a dinosaur balanced on its tail, indicating the prehistoric artist saw it alive. The conclusion indicates a vast antiquity.
A reproduction of an elephant attacking a man was found on the same wall with the dinosaur pictograph. This find, Hubbard said, completely establishes the contention of Dr. Frederik A. Lucas, director of the American Museum of Natural History, that men and elephants were coeval in America.
"Ibex were also found pictured on the wall of the canyon," said the curator. "The figures were artistically executed, and one panel shows several hunters driving seven ibex and two deer into a trap, though no ibex, not even fossil ones, have ever been found in America."
The expedition which made the historic finds, included, besides Hubbard, Clarence W. Gilmore, curator of vertebrate paleontology of the United States national museum; Robert L. Casson, photographer; Joseph F. Roop, sculptor; Fred W. Shaw and Arthur Metzger, assistant, and Bud Clawson, guide.
