RELIEF PARTY MAY GO FAR INTO THE ARCTIC

TRIAL AWAITS TESTIMONY OF SICK WITNESS

Court Admits Some Evidence In Trial of Frank Collier Relating to His Wife.

HASKELL, May 27.—An instructed verdict of guilty will be ordered here this afternoon by Judge Bruce Bryant in case Mrs. Frank Woods, star witness for the state, is not able to resume the witness stand in the trial of Mrs. Frank Collier.

This ultimatum was served on Mrs. Collier's counsel by the court today after physicians called here from Wichita Falls last night examined the girl and rumors that she had developed appendicitis circulated.

Judge Bryant pointed out that the state allows the defense, when a material witness is unable to take the stand for good cause, to retract an admission of preparedness for trial. No such provision is made for the state, however, and the judge declared in order to protect the state fully, he would be compelled to call for an instructed verdict of guilty.

A decision will be made early in the afternoon after two physicians have investigated the reported illness.

HASKELL, May 27.—Court was recessed until 1:30 o'clock today in the trial of Mrs. Frank Collier of Wichita Falls, charged with being an accessory to the murder of her son-in-law, Elzie Robertson, due to the illness of the widow of the slain boy and the state's star witness. Mrs. Wood fainted on the witness stand early yesterday afternoon while under questioning by the district attorney.

The ailing witness was in a private home under guard today to prevent her communicating with any one not connected with the district attorney's office. She appeared ill when she took the witness stand yesterday and showed nervousness. Suddenly she fell from the witness chair to the floor and a physician had to be called to revive her.

State Scores Point. The state scored a point Tuesday morning in having a testimony given by Mrs. Collier at the habeas corpus hearing of her husband admitted. The defense objected to its introduction but was overruled by the court. The testimony read from the transcript of the record was in regard to how and where the pistol was procured with which Buster Robertson was shot.

When the Thirty-ninth district court was opened by Judge Bruce W. Bryant Tuesday morning, District Attorney Alfred announced that 20 or 30 additional witnesses had arrived. These were lined up in front of the bench, sworn and placed under the rule. Judge Bryant admonished the audience that order must be maintained or he would instruct the sheriff to clear the courtroom.

Mrs. Wood was the first witness called to the stand by the state. She testified that she knew Buster Robertson and had visited in the Collier home.

"Has Mrs. Collier ever visited in your home?" asked Attorney Allred for the state. "Objected to by Attorney Cummings of the defense as being irrelevant and misleading. Sustained. Witness testified that she was married June 24, 1924, and during that summer was a visitor to the Collier home. While there she had heard Mrs. Collier discuss Mary Frances and Buster and say that she "hoped Buster would leave Mary Frances alone."

At this point the witness fainted. Weapon Identified.

T. E. Bates, deputy sheriff of Wichita Falls, described the arrival of Frank Collier and his wife at the sheriff's office in Wichita Falls the night of Feb. 14, 1925, after Buster Robertson had been shot and identified the six-shooter as the weapon turned over to the officers. He said that Mrs. Collier was not under arrest when at the sheriff's office. The jury was sent from the room while the attorneys had the court pass on the admissibility of certain witnesses used in the trial of former Mayor Frank Collier at Wichita Falls in March.

The first testimony read from the transcript was a portion of that given by Mrs. Collier, the defendant, at the habeas corpus trial of her husband, Frank Collier, in Wichita Falls. She told of her visit to Mrs. Duke, and of getting the pistol with which Buster Robertson was killed threatening at the time to "blow Buster's brains out if he came and got Mary Frances and took her to the home of Mrs. Robertson, his mother."

Cummings of the defense objected to its introduction on the grounds that the testimony of the wife could not be used against the husband, whose case is now on appeal. He argued at some length, producing authorities.

Attendants at the sanitarium said that Gladys Wilkerson had a badly lacerated arm, some fractured ribs other injuries and that Dorothy Latimer had a broken collar bone. Harvey Martin and J. W. Campbell, who were in the car with the girls are under bond, charged with driving a car while intoxicated.

It was said at one time he had gone back to Virginia and at other times that he was "out" or "busy."

Shipping Board to Advertise 200 Ships For Sale as Scrap

WASHINGTON, May 27.—The shipping board today voted today to advertise two hundred of its ships for immediate sale for scrap. The total tonnage is 118,130 dead weight tons. The action finally clears the way for Henry Ford to bid for the vessels, if he so desires.

ELECTRIC PARK AT KANSAS CITY SUFFERS FROM FIRE

KANSAS CITY, May 27.—In a spectacular blaze here early today, more than half of the buildings at the Electric park were destroyed. The loss is estimated at \$150,000. The merry-go-round and numerous concessions were destroyed.

Naval Lieutenant Found Guilty of Trying to Smuggle

NORFOLK, Va., May 27.—Lieutenant Donald B. Hill, Jr., was found guilty by a naval court martial today of attempting to smuggle liquor into the United States aboard the U. S. Naval transport Bauftort last February. Hill was acquitted of attempting to deceive his superior officers by failing to report the presence of liquor in his cabin. The conviction is the third of a series of court martials growing out of a raid on the ship on its arrival from the West Indies.

Twenty-Six Wells Being Drilled or Rigging Up In Carter Pool, Rich Area Seven Miles Northwest of Ranger

Twenty-six wells are now being drilled or rigging up in the Carter pool, seven miles northwest of Ranger, according to the latest statistics. Due to the rapidity with which new locations are being made, it is exceedingly difficult to keep up with the wells as they are located and preparations made to drill. Leases are changing hands slowly, although several of the big companies have their men on the ground dickering for acreage.

Soldier Falls and Breaks His Nose

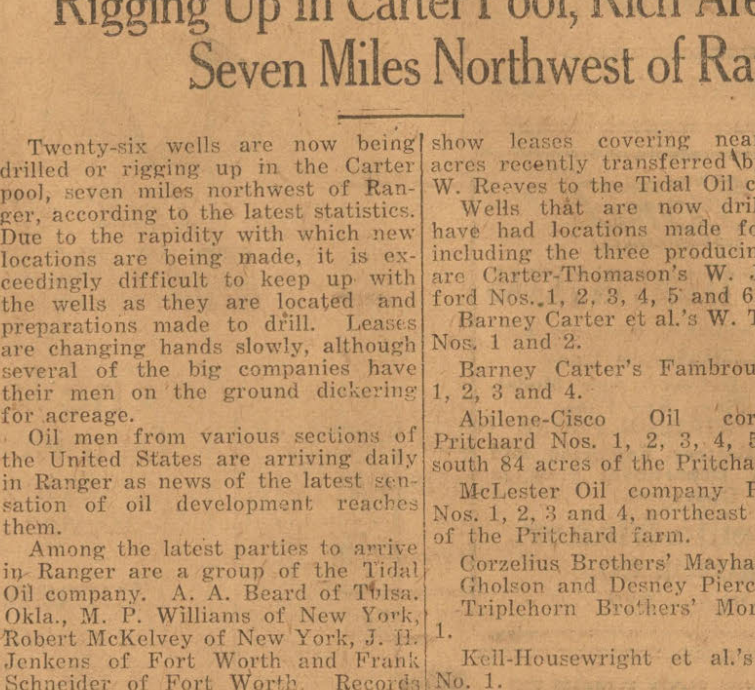

AMUNDSEN MAY BE LINGERING AT NORTH POLE

OSLO, Norway, May 27.—The Norwegian government is now prepared, if necessary, to send a relief expedition after the Amundsen-Ellsworth polar flight. This represents a change in front in the last 24 hours, for the government earlier declared through the foreign minister that the project for a relief expedition had not been considered.

AMUNDSEN MAY BE LINGERING AT NORTH POLE

OSLO, Norway, May 27.—The Norwegian government, so far, has not discussed the question of a relief expedition to hunt the Amundsen-Ellsworth north pole party. Foreign Minister Nowinski told the United Press today. There was still no news of the polar flyers this afternoon.
