### ITCH-FOR-OIL PUTS DRILLING ON FAST BASIS

#### Several Wells in Carter Pool, Northwest of Ranger, Nearing Pay Sand.

Drilling in the Carter pool, seven miles northwest of Ranger, is being rushed as the result of the bringing in of the Langford No. 2 for 4,500 barrels recently. Drilling was stirred to unusual activity with the bringing in of the Pritchard No. 1 several weeks ago and with the completion of the Langford No. 2 a perfect frenzy of search-for-oil activities descended on the once peaceful farming territory surrounding the completed wells.

Thomson-Carter Langford No. 3 is down 2,530 feet.

McLester and others Pritchard No. 1 is down 2,550 feet.

Pritchard No. 2 is down 280 feet and the Langford No. 1 is spudding in.

Barkley et al's Pritchard No. 2 is down 1,825 and their Pritchard No. 3 is down 425 feet.

### Farmers of Middle States Lose Heavily From Late Frosts

CHICAGO, May 26.—Farmers in the middle western states have lost heavily, due to frost damage to crops in the last few days. Both fruit and grain were heavily hit by the frost in all sections. Killing frosts prevailed over the larger part of Nebraska, Iowa, Kansas, Missouri, Illinois, Indiana, Oklahoma, Minnesota and the Dakotas. Ohio and Kentucky also suffered some frost damage, but the losses will be less acute in these states. In several sections of the rich corn belt, the entire replanting of the new crop will be necessary. Oats, hardest of the leading grains, is believed to have escaped serious damage. The climax of the cold snap has passed, the weather bureau reported today, and warmer weather is expected.

EL PASO, May 26.—E. R. Jones of Los Angeles, shot by his estranged wife, Mrs. Nettie Jones, in a courtroom here yesterday as a result of a quarrel over the custody of their 5-year-old child, probably will recover, physicians said today. Jones, however, will be blind in one eye from the bullet wound inflicted by a small calibre revolver fired at close range. It was indicated. Mrs. Jones will be held pending the outcome of her husband's injuries.

### Thaw Appears Once Again on Broadway

NEW YORK, May 26.—Harry K. Thaw is back among the bright lights of Broadway again, ending what had been virtually 19 years' exile from the "white way" since the fatal evening when he killed Stanford White. Thaw appeared last night at a cabaret in Broadway. A pretty dancer, "Fawn Gray," faced him at his table. Thaw was in a gay humor, as of old when known as a well-to-do young man about town. But time and prison confinement had left their marks on him. Thaw was recognized by the oldest Broadway patrons, but to the young merry-makers he was at first merely an elderly grey-haired man with wrinkles in his face.

### RECEIVER IN RED RIVER OIL LAND DISPUTES ENDS TASK

WASHINGTON, May 26.—After doing more than \$8,000,000 of oil production work for the government in the last five years, Frederick A. Deland, receiver for the disputed territory on the Red river bed, has reported to the supreme court that all his duties and obligations are ended. He was appointed receiver to handle the territory, following the court's decision on the boundary claims of the two states. Deland has permanently closed his office at Wichita Falls.

### PROSECUTION MAKES COVERT ATTACK ON DEFENSE ATTORNEYS

CHICAGO, May 26.—Jurors who have seen service in cases tried by defense attorneys in the Shepherd "zoom murder" trial were summoned today by State's Attorney Robert E. Crowe in an effort to throw further light on alleged efforts to tamper with the Shepherd jury. William Scott Stewart and W. W. O'Brien, defending Shepherd, issued a statement charging Crowe with attempting to intimidate the jurors in the present case. Crowe said he had ordered a general examination because he wanted to look into the court records of the defense attorneys.

### SPEED BOAT BEATS FAST RAILWAY TRAIN

NEW YORK, May 26.—The speed boat, Baby Gay, Wood IV, beat the Twentieth Century Limited in a race from Albany to New York this morning. The speed boat roared away from Albany down the Hudson even with the train early this morning. It arrived at the Columbia Boat club landing, 86th street, New York, at 9:50 a. m., having made the run in two hours, 45 minutes and 20 seconds. The train was not due until 10:40 a. m. Hundreds gathered along the Riverside drive to witness the finish of the race.

### COAL COMPANY WINS SUIT

DETROIT, Mich., May 26.—A jury in federal court today returned a verdict in favor of the Mancont-Winters coal company for \$115,167 against the Ford Motor company in a breach of promise suit. The coal company charged it had a contract to deliver Ford coal for \$7.50 a ton for the year of 1921 and that the motor company refused to accept the coal when the price dropped \$2.

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### Dallas Woman Says She Does Not Know Man Shot to Death By Her Husband

DALLAS, May 26.—Preliminary hearing was scheduled here today for D. J. Rook, 34, an electrician, charged with murder following the fatal shooting of Roy Wilson, in a theater here yesterday. Rook dragged Wilson from his seat and killed him before a crowd when he discovered him sitting next to Mrs. Rook. In a statement to the police, Rook charged his unknown victim with attempting to break up his home. Mrs. Rook told officers she did not know Wilson and that he sat down beside her by chance in the theater. "I do not know the man who was shot by Mr. Rook," she said. "He came into the theater and walked in front of me and another man who was sitting on my left. He stumbled slightly as he walked by and asked our pardon." She said she had come to the business district with relatives. Wilson was 23 years of age, married and the father of two small children. He was shot five times and died almost instantly.

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### Rye Whisky Offered To Government At Its Cost Price

WASHINGTON, May 26.—An offer to sell to the government 1,800,000 cases of rye whiskey acquired yesterday by purchase of the old Overholt distillery, was made today by Park and Tilford, in a telegram to Surgeon General Cummings of the United States public health service. Park and Tilford said the liquor was at the government's disposal at the "exact purchase price." The action was "in the interest of preserving the health of the nation."

### A. & M. Senior Is Killed By Falling From Freight Train

COLLEGE STATION, May 26.—C. R. Wood of Honey Grove, senior student in the A. & M. college of Texas, was killed here last night when he fell from a freight train. The mangled body was discovered on the tracks early today. He was last seen when he boarded the train at Bryan shortly before midnight, with two companions en route here.

### Mrs. Hildebrand of Ranger Dies After Protracted Illness

Mrs. Charles Hildebrand died Monday afternoon at 4 o'clock at home on South Austin street after a long illness. Her husband and two small children, her parents, four sisters, one brother and her grandmother were all at her bedside when she passed away. Deceased was born Mary Ruth Winchell, in Marion, Ind., in 1898. Funeral services will be conducted this afternoon at 4 o'clock in Central Baptist church by the pastor, Rev. A. L. Leake. Interment will take place in Evergreen cemetery.

### POLAR AERIAL EXPLORERS YET UNHEARD FROM

NEW YORK, May 26.—No news of the Amundsen-Ellsworth polar aerial expedition has been received here, the American Alliance announced today. OSLO, May 26.—Reports of stormy weather in the Arctic, received here Monday night, increased the apprehension over Capt. Raold Amundsen and his aerial expedition to the north pole. With the beginning of the fifth day since Amundsen's departure, the world is still without advices as to the outcome of the adventure. The winds, which presumably are sweeping across the polar district now, according to weather reports, may have delayed the explorer in his return trip. If the storms continue severe, flying would be almost impossible. "With each hour that fails to bring word out of the north, fears for the expedition increase, but Amundsen's friends and relatives are still hopeful. "There is no reason for nervousness," said Amundsen's brother Monday. "Silence does not mean the loss of the airplanes." Dr. Skatnum, president of the Norwegian Geographical society, maintains that it is unlikely that Amundsen landed at the pole. He believes the explorer secretly planned to continue to Alaska and to open a base between East Siberia and Alaska. This district has never been explored and Amundsen planned last year, according to Dr. Skatnum, to include it in his trip. "The flight can and will succeed," Dr. Skatnum said Monday night.

### Dirigible May Yet Be Sent In Search Of Amundsen Party

WASHINGTON, May 26.—Sentiment for the ultimate dispatch of the navy dirigible Shenandoah or the Los Angeles to search for the Amundsen expedition grew swiftly in navy circles today. A statement by the white house spokesman favored the use of all practical and possible means of carrying relief to the missing exploring party, if it finally appears necessary. A declaration by Secretary of the Navy Willbur, that while no official consideration has been given yet to such use of the giant airships he personally was giving much thought to the subject. The president, however, was said to believe that it is not yet certain that dispatch of a rescue party is needed and until the need is manifest, plans would be held in abeyance.

## WOMAN'S PART IN MURDER IS TOLD TO JURY

### State Witnesses Begin Testimony in Trial of Mrs. Frank Collier.

HASKELL, May 26.—Fainting of a young woman in the witness chair and a commented legal debate over the admissibility of certain evidence punctuated the second morning of the trial of Mrs. Frank Collier of Wichita Falls, charged with murder in connection with the fatal shooting of her son-in-law, Elzie Robertson. Mrs. Frank Wood, school girl companion of Mary Frances Collier Robertson, fainted under questioning of District Attorney James V. Allred and pitched headlong from the stand. First aid treatment failed, and she was carried from the courtroom and placed under the care of a physician. The court adjourned shortly after 1 o'clock to allow her to regain her composure. She will be the last witness the state will summon. After heated arguments, Judge Bruce Bryant ruled that testimony offered by Mrs. Collier in the habeas corpus hearing for her husband's freedom last March could be admitted by the state at this trial. Collier was sentenced to three years on a charge of manslaughter for the slaying of young Robertson, who married Mary Frances secretly a year ago. Robertson was slain by Collier last February when efforts to dissolve the wedding were unsuccessful. Other witnesses today were: C. E. Bates, Archie Smith and John McMahon. The latter a companion of Robertson, told of an incident of several weeks prior to the killing when Mr. and Mrs. Collier approached young Robertson and the former mayor pursued the boy with an automobile crank in his hands. State Offers Evidence. First of the 51 witnesses summoned for the state began giving their evidence yesterday. The defense has 50 witnesses to be heard after the state has closed. The state is represented by District Attorney J. V. Allred of Wichita Falls, who prosecuted Frank Collier and obtained a conviction of manslaughter for a sentence of three years; District Attorney Tom Davis of Haskell and County Attorney Clyde Grissom of Haskell. W. H. Murchison of Haskell, and Charles L. Francis and B. Y. Cummings of Wichita Falls represent the defense. Mr. Collier is here with his wife and is one of the witnesses in the trial. The jury was selected Monday with little difficulty, the indictments read to Mrs. Collier and she pleaded "not guilty."

said that after Buster fell she picked his head up in her arms and begged him to speak to her, but the blood gushed and he couldn't utter a word.

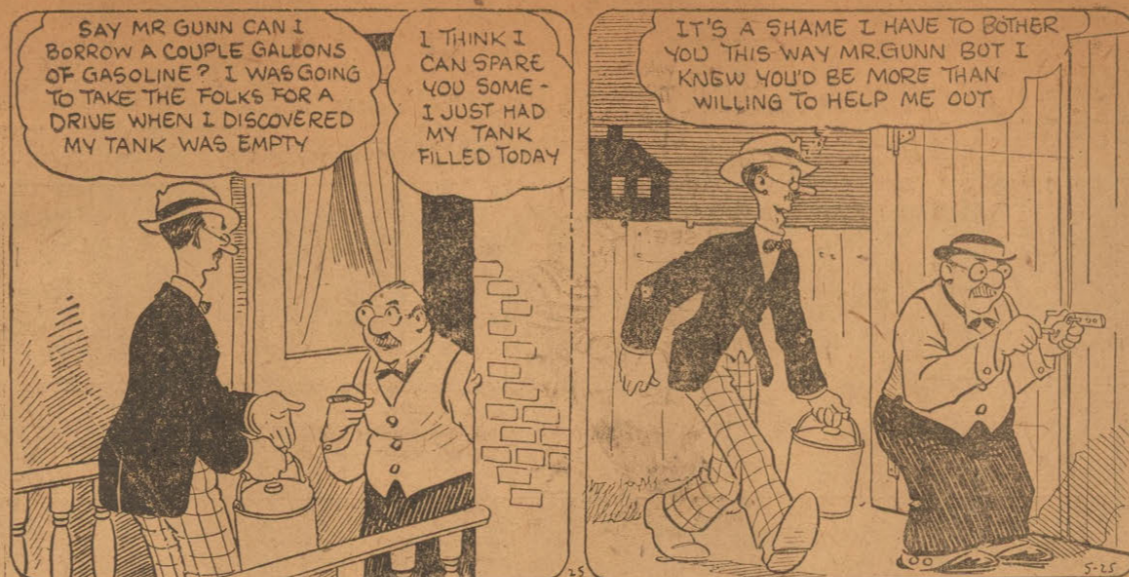



**HASKELL, May 26.**—James E. Ferguson, former governor of Texas and the chief adviser of Gov. Miriam A. Ferguson, was left only \$100 in the will of Mrs. Kate F. Morton, his sister, disposing of an estate of more than \$300,000.

Alvah Ferguson of Temple, another brother, was left \$100 also and he has filed a suit before County Judge Foster protesting the probating of his sister's will. Aside from a few minor bequests, the bulk of the Morton estate is left to Alex M. Ferguson, a nurseryman of Sherman, and Joe Lee Ferguson, a rancher of Hale Center, Hale county, to be divided jointly.

Joe Lee Ferguson has been appointed temporary administrator of the estate, but this appointment has been contested by Alex Ferguson, co-heir with him in the larger portion of the estate.

The will is dated May 3, 1914, and was written with pen and ink by Mrs. Morton on her business stationery, prior to her departure from Haskell on vacation trip last summer.

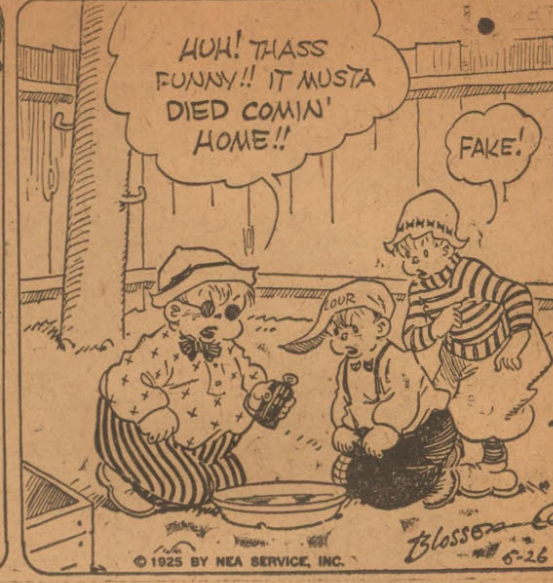
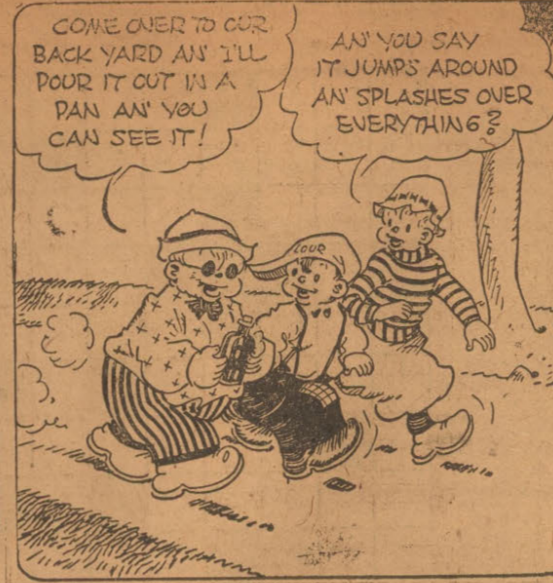

**When two young pitchers win 34 games between them and lose only 13 contests in their first year in the majors, it is quite a break for any ball club.**

The Pittsburg club of the National League enjoyed such good fortune last season. Yde, a southpaw, won 16 and lost only three trays, while Kremer won 18 and lost 10.

When a veteran wins 15 or more games he is considered as having a good season. For two recruits to so deliver is decidedly out of the ordinary.

It is a rather interesting fact that Yde, in winning 16 out of 19 games, tied a National League record. His average of .842 was the same as Tom Hughes established with the Braves in 1916.

Yde, little figured on at the start of the season, was given his chance only after some of the veteran stars were unable to win. He obliged with eight straight victories.

So far this season Dame Fortune has failed to smile as kindly on Yde and Kremer. As a result the Pirates have suffered a serious setback in their pennant aspirations.

**YDE AND KRAUSE**

**The remarkable performance of Yde last season recalls the work of Harry Krause with the Athletics in 1909.**

Connie Mack, discoverer of phenoms, unearthed Krause in California. He was a star among the college teams of that section. Like Yde, Krause tossed 'em with the left hand.

Krause was a slender chap, built on the lines of Herb Pennock, another Mack protege, now with the New York Yankees. Krause didn't look sufficiently strong to stand the grind of the majors. Yde of the Pirates is built along solid lines, looks good for years.

Krause boasted no great speed, but he had a tantalizing curve and great control. He looked just ordinary in spring training.

Inside of a month he was the sensation of the American League. He won his first 10 starts, then slumped, only breaking even in his next 16 games.

His record for the year was 13 wins and eight defeats—a most impressive big league first season.

Krause, however, lacked strength, and shortly passed out of the majors. Yde, the husky athlete, need have no fear that he will suffer a similar fate.

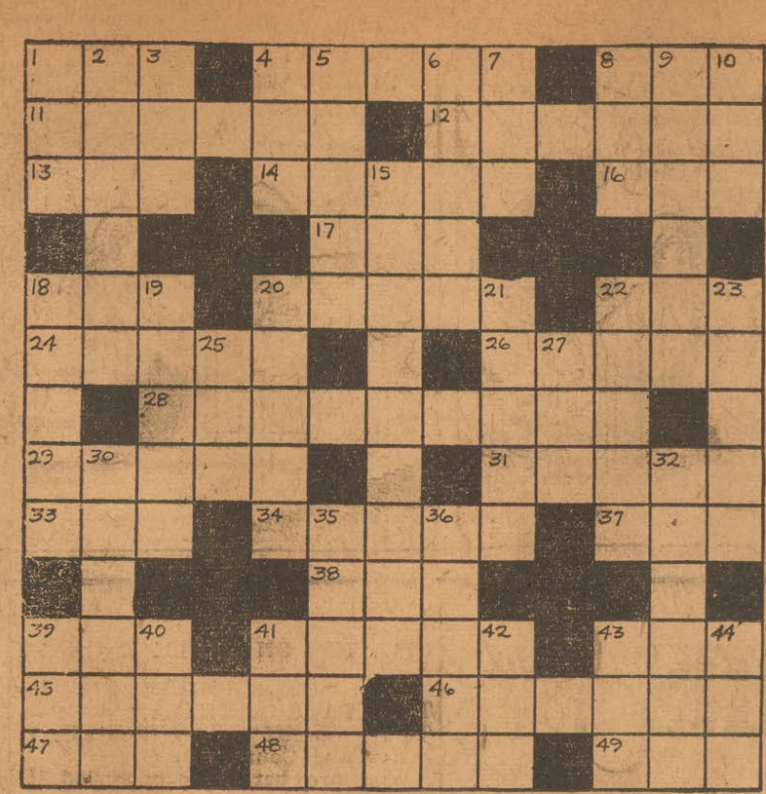

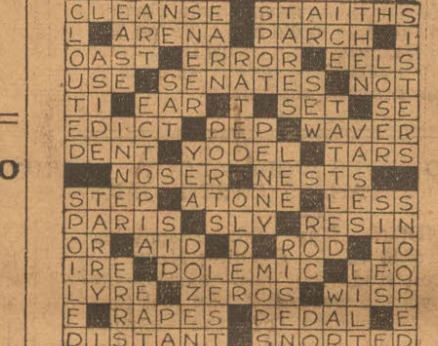
