BRECKENRIDGE HOTEL BURNS TO GROUND

WILLIAMS HAS HAPPY VISIT TO OLD HOME

Tells of Conditions in Syria, Where His Brother and Sister Live.

Conditions in Europe, and especially Syria, where the four corners of the world gather, are not sound, economically or financially, according to D. Williams of the Joseph Dry Goods store, who returned last Sunday from a nine-month trip to Europe and Syria.

"Money valuations fluctuate considerably," said Mr. Williams, "necessitating the spending of money while the people have it. For instance, one hundred piastres would drop in value one day until they would represent only about 50, then jump to a valuation of 125. The people are in constant turmoil, not knowing when they go to sleep at night whether or not they will have any money the next day.

"Labor is cheap, common laborers getting between 60 and 75 cents a day. The people are living for today, and not for tomorrow.

"On the other hand, Syria is now making arrangements for taking care of all tourists. Heretofore tourists in that part of the country had a hard time finding accommodations, but at the present time all conveniences possible have been arranged and tourists are reminded of America every time they stop at a hotel. The only objectionable part to traveling by automobile there is the gasoline ranges from 42 to 45 cents per gallon.

"Every make of American car that leads the market today is to be found in the old country. Buicks, Packards, Cadillacs, Hudsons, Studebakers, Fords and Dodges."

Leaving Ranger August 4, last year, Mr. Williams went by way of St. Louis, Detroit, Buffalo and New York City. Boarding the tourist ship, Asia, he sailed August 8. The ship made all points of interest and stopped at the larger ports, enabling the passengers to make short excursions to the cities, Lisbon, Portugal, Roumania, Jaffa, Beyrouth, Damascus and Tyre. Leaving the ship at Beyrouth, Mr. Williams said he journeyed to Beysour, Syria, where he spent seven months with his brother and sister. While in the old country he received a copy of the Ranger Daily Times regularly, although they would arrive in bundles of from three to five papers at a time.

"I kept up with Ranger," said Mr. Williams, "with the aid of the paper. I remained away as long as possible and then headed for the United States and Ranger. Here I am, glad to be back and ready to work."

NEGRO SUSPECT IDENTIFIED BY INJURED WOMAN

Police of Dallas Believe They Have Murderer of W. L. Minstead.

DALLAS, May 16.—Frank Noel, negro arrested here last night, was pointed out today by Mrs. Mabel Berry of Austin as the assassin who slew her companion, W. L. Minstead, and attacked her three weeks ago.

Mrs. Berry pointed out the alleged slayer without hesitation from a trio of suspects. Noel and another negro were arrested on suspicion and subdued after a struggle in which he was wounded by two detectives. Reward of about \$3,800 had been posted for the slayer.

Baptist Convention To Meet Next Year In City of Houston

The convention adopted a resolution urging the United States to enter the world court.

FRENCH BELIEVE OUTPOST BESIEGED BY RIFLIANS

RABET, French Morocco, May 16.—A French outpost at Oulez, which had been encircled and beleaguered by Riff warriors of Abd El Krim for a fortnight, was relieved by French troops yesterday after sharp fighting, according to official communications.

Riff reinforcements are being rushed to the aid of the tribe on the east of the Moroccan war zone. In the center, where Col. Freyden Borg is in command, the situation is unchanged.

Simmons Now University

Voices From the Air Will Keep Folks At Home Informed of Progress of the Search for a New Arctic Continent

United Press Staff Correspondent. WASHINGTON, May 16.—From a frozen arctic polar explorer these coming summer evenings will tell the story of his daily battle with the elements as folks on the front porch back home.

This prospect was made known to those who plan of Commander Donald B. MacMillan, leader of the crusade which starts next month, were obtained by the United Press.

MacMillan, companion of Peary when he discovered the north pole, has made arrangements to carry radio equipment that may even enable naval flyers to send back their reports from the frozen wastes where man has never been before.

World To Be Advised.

Arctic explorers of the past have been lost to sight for months and even years. MacMillan plans to keep in constant touch with the world. His expedition will leave Boston, June 28 and will arrive at Etah, the ship base at the northern coast of Greenland, about a month later. Aboard the two boats will be eight navy fliers and mechanics, who will set up a base at Cape Hubbard.

From Cape Hubbard the fliers expect to dart hundreds of miles northward and westward in search of a new continent which is expected to lie out in the vast unexplored wastes.

Wireless at Etah.

MacMillan will set up his wireless

at Etah and his station will be known as "WNP"—meaning "wireless north pole." It will send on a 20-meter wave length for code words. But messages have been sent from New York to New Zealand on that length. Most of the messages will be transmitted to local amateurs in the eastern states, who in turn will relay them to the National Geographical society which is sponsoring the trip, or to the naval communications station in Washington.

When he wishes to use a microphone MacMillan by an adjustment of his apparatus can lengthen the wave length to 40 meters. This will be caught by some of the big broadcasting stations in the eastern states and relayed to fans throughout the country.

The airplanes will be equipped with sets which they expect to cover in search of the new continent. MacMillan hopes—although he is not reasonably certain—that he can accomplish it, to relay their voices to the states.

The ships upon which MacMillan plans to push up through the ice from Etah toward the pole are equipped with radio which will keep them in contact.

Never for a moment, if all goes well, will any member of the expedition be outside of telephoning distance of home, although he may be months away by ship.

Boy Criminals Come From Homes Where The Mother Works

KANSAS CITY, Kan., May 16.—Nineteen out of every twenty boys who "go wrong" come from families in which the mothers are forced to work, according to Henry Meade, judge of juvenile court, Kansas City, Kan.

Invariably, it is found that where there is a mother to stay at home and care for her children, little or no trouble is caused by the boys and rarely do they come to the attention of the juvenile authorities, Judge Meade observed.

It is the type of boy who is without maternal guidance that presents a difficult problem. Usually he has already found that parental discipline can be evaded and has become injured to punishment, the judge said. It is every boy's right to have a mother's sympathy and a mother's concern.

"In some cases it is an absolute necessity that both a father and mother work in order to provide for a large family. In other cases, it is merely a desire for added wealth that makes a mother forsake home responsibility for business.

"Perhaps, parents believe added money may bring added advantages for their children, but nothing can compensate for the loss of their boys," Judge Meade said.

"Only when we have found a way to keep the boy at home, in congenial surroundings, will we be sure of the type of boy which will be turned out from the average American home.

"Until then, we will have to struggle along under present conditions, and the juvenile courts will have its hardened by criminals—not really bad, but unmanageable."

Impulsive American Astonishes British

LONDON, May 16.—The Daily Mail and the Evening News of Lord Rothermere's group of newspapers today deprecated the initiative of John Cownie, glove manufacturer of Des Moines, Iowa, who walked up to King George at the Wimberly exhibition and shook hands with him.

Heretofore, explained these newspapers, the public has kept aloof when his majesty has been in public, but if the practice of shaking hands were to increase unduly it may be necessary to have a strong police cordon, which neither the king nor anyone else desires.

State vs. Humble Oil Company Suit Set for October 12

AUSTIN, May 16.—The suit brought by the state to secure title to a strip of land through the heirs of the Humble oil field in Harris county, valued at \$50,000,000, has been set for trial Oct. 12, in the Fifty-third district court in Travis county.

Bolshevik Suspects Held at Belgrade

LONDON, May 16.—Police discovery of a plot aimed chiefly at assassination of King Alexander and members of the cabinet, and dynamiting of the royal palace, is announced at Belgrade, according to a Central News dispatch.

Seventeen bolsheviks arrived recently to carry out the plot and several of them were captured as they pondered over their maps.

Another Belgrade message said that 25 of them had been captured and that their plans, included dynamiting of public buildings, were known.

BUSINESS AND PROFESSIONAL WOMEN TO MEET IN WACO

DALLAS, May 16.—Miss Adelia Pritchard of Portland, Oregon, president of the National Federation of Business and Professional Women's Clubs, will attend the Texas state convention of Business and Professional Women to be held in Waco, July 6 and 7, which will bring together prominent business and professional women from all over the state of Texas. Miss Pritchard's acceptance of the invitation to address the convention has just been received by Mrs. Margaret B. Conger, president of the Waco club.

The state convention will precede the national convention of the organization, which will be held in Portland, Maine, July 12 to 18, and many delegates will go on from the state to the national convention. Waco is planning to entertain at least 100 delegates. Probably 30 members of the Dallas Professional Women's club will attend the state convention. Miss Orenna Addison, president of the Dallas club, says, while Miss McKay of Dallas, chairman of transportation, expects as many as 30 delegates from Texas to go to Portland.

DR. SANDEFER SAYS COLLEGE SHOWS GROWTH

Meets Requirements to Fit Its More Distinguished Name; Will Speak in Ranger.

Dr. J. B. Sandefer, president of Simmons university of Abilene, spent Friday and part of Saturday in Ranger visiting friends and, before leaving, agreed to deliver two addresses in Ranger. Next Saturday night he will speak at the Ranger high school to the students and on Sunday morning he will preach at the Central Baptist church.

Dr. Sandefer is not a minister but a layman and has been president of Simmons university for the last 16 years. Simmons university was formerly Simmons college, but this year will become a university with all affiliations, having met all requirements. While in Ranger, Sandefer was the guest of Mr. and Mrs. J. M. White.

"Simmons college as was," said Dr. Sandefer, "enters the university class better equipped than any other university in Texas, with the exception of Rice Institute, at the time it assumed the name of university. Every university in Texas entered its career as an educational institution with virtually one building and its nerve."

"We waited patiently until we now have a building worth an investment of about \$500,000. I have recently returned from New York city on business concerning the university, and among the men interested in our school is Edgar L. Marston, of the Texas Pacific Coal and Oil company, who opened up a great many of the fields in this territory. The Marston gymnasium at the school today stands as a tribute to his name and is considered one of the finest in Texas."

"Several of Ranger's business men are products of Simmons, among them being Barney Carter and Hall Walker. A large number of Ranger students go to Simmons when they leave the high school.

"Speaking as a layman and not a minister," said Dr. Sandefer, "I think that the two great problems today are first: the social problems of society and to save in a constructive way the energies of the young; secondly, modernism vs. fundamentalism, that is, I give it as my conviction that the ministry must go back to the fundamentals of Christianity and preach to the fathers and mothers in order that they may save the young people of today, or else society and morals will go on the rocks."

TWO NEGROES HUNTED BY POSSES IN MISSOURI

SPRINGFIELD, Mo., May 16.—Two negroes were being hunted by posses near Marshfield today for the slaying of Charles Kinser, deputy sheriff, and the probable fatal wounding of Ollie Crosswhite, deputy sheriff. The negroes have been sought since May 2 in connection with the killing of a railroad man at Memphis, Tenn.

STORM STRIKES OKLAHOMA AND DOES DAMAGE

Tribey and Norman Chief Sufferers From High Winds And Heavy Rain.

OKLAHOMA CITY, May 16.—High winds and a near cloudburst over an area of four counties near here caused damage estimated at over \$500,000. Five business buildings and a dozen residences at Tribey, near Shawnee, were destroyed. Although several persons were slightly injured, no deaths had been reported as yet. The town was without communication today. Damage at Tribey was estimated at \$200,000.

Small dwellings were demolished and several were unroofed when a near cloudburst accompanied by high winds swept Norman, 20 miles from Oklahoma City.

Traffic on the Santa Fe railway to Norman was halted nearly two hours while workmen cleared the right of way. Traffic on the highway from Oklahoma City to Chickasha was halted today when it was discovered that a bridge had been washed away. The state highway commission rushed workmen to the scene.

Dobie Sink, 9-year-old daughter of Clarence Sink of Norman, became unconscious when the Sink home was picked up by the high wind and carried away.

Flood Conditions In Platte River Valley

CASPER, Wyo., May 16.—Flood conditions prevailed in the Platte river valley near here today as results of heavy mountain rains the last few days.

The town of Glenrock, 25 miles east of Casper, was reported partly submerged with many families fleeing to higher ground.

WIND AND RAIN STORM SWEEPS OVER KANSAS CITY

KANSAS CITY, May 16.—A heavy rain accompanied by high wind swept this section last night, causing minor property damage. Street car traffic was temporarily tied up and the light service crippled. Four houses were struck by lightning here and in Kansas City, Kan. The wind also felled many trees.

General Miles Dies At Ripe Old Age

WASHINGTON, May 16.—Gen. Nelson A. Miles, United States army, retired, 86 years of age, died suddenly late Friday while attending a circus performance here. He was famous as an Indian fighter and especially as the conqueror of Sitting Bull and Geronimo.

General Miles was a "boy general" of the civil war. Entering as a lieutenant at 25, he was advanced to major general and the command of a corps of 25,000 volunteers. He participated in more than 30 battles of the civil war and was wounded four times.

The watch was presented to Mr. McNew by Principal Lyman E. Forrest of the High school. Mr. Forrest said that the watch was given as a token of the esteem in which Mr. McNew was held by the teachers of the schools over which he had been superintendent for the last several years.

The response by Mr. McNew it was said was short. He said "I thank you," then made an effort to continue but apparently was overwhelmed by the gift which he was not expecting. He smiled tremulously and sat down when he was seen to nervously wipe his eyes. Later on Mr. McNew thanked the teachers separately for the token of their appreciation.

Coleman County Sheriff Dead; Two Negroes Are Held

COLEMAN, May 16.—John Smith, 23-year-old negro, was held here tonight upon a charge of murder in connection with the fatal shooting of Sheriff Dick Pauley, late Friday afternoon. The Coleman county sheriff was shot on Thursday at Edgewood. When he attempted to arrest Smith and another negro, stealing a ride on an freight train. Both negroes were captured by a posse shortly after the shooting.

Pauley was partially paralyzed by the wound and died late today.

Young Woman Leaps In Front of Train, Is Ground to Death

FORT WORTH, May 16.—Dashing out on the track when the car was too near to be stopped, Mrs. Gladys Lawson, 20, was ground to death between the wheels of a Fort Worth-Dallas interurban at Edgewood. The Dallas station, five miles east of here, today. Trainmen said the girl was standing near the station, apparently reading, until the car bore down on her, when she leaped across the rail and fled in front of the car.

Border Commission Organizes for Work

EL PASO, May 16.—Lincoln C. Andrews, assistant secretary of the treasury, was elected permanent chairman to preside over the deliberations of the international commission to deliberate on smuggling. Andrews was elected to permanent control after Primo Villa Michel, head of the Mexican delegation, had been elected temporary chairman.

Eight international problems will be considered by the border commission when it resumes its deliberations Monday, according to reports. Four of them will include smuggling of narcotics, liquor, precious metals and of aliens into the United States. The United States' proposals will not be given out until later.

MICKEY WALKER KNOCKS OUT LEFTY COOPER QUICKLY

SAN FRANCISCO, May 16.—Mickey Walker, world's welter weight champion, put away Lefty Cooper, one of the best boys on the coast, in 1 minute and 50 seconds here this afternoon. Walker's attack came as a surprise. With a volley of rights and lefts the champion sent Cooper reeling to the canvas. At the count of nine the California hope staggered to his feet. Another volley and he was again on the mat, this time on his back for good.

HARMON HOTEL DESTROYED BY FIERCE FLAMES

Three Business Houses on Ground Floor Guttered; Total Loss About \$15,000.

BRECKENRIDGE, May 16.—Fire which started at 2 o'clock this afternoon in the Harmon hotel, a large frame building, destroyed that hostelry at a loss of about \$8,000, and three business houses that occupied the lower floor. The total loss is placed at around \$15,000.

The Martin grocery, the Home laundry and the Dynamo Tailoring shop, occupying the ground floor of the hotel building, were gutted by the flames and were a total loss. They were partially insured, but the value of the grocery stock and laundry machinery was said to be far more than the insurance. The hotel was insured for \$2,500.

The origin of the fire is not known, but is believed to have been due to leaving gas. A plumber was at work on the pipes, when an explosion occurred and flames spread quickly through the building. Those in the house had barely time to escape. None was hurt.

The new fire truck of the Breckenridge fire department proved very efficient and the powerful stream of water it threw on the burning structure soon tore the foundation from the blaze and put out the flames.

Flying Ebony With Sande Riding Wins Big Kentucky Derby

CHURCHILL DOWNS, LOUISVILLE, Ky., May 16.—Flying Ebony, Kentucky horse, and a rank outsider in the betting, stood a hard drive to win the 51st Kentucky derby today.

Captain Hal, eastern entry, after leading to the stretch was forced to be content with second place, while Son of John came through the rut to finish third.

Horsemanship won again for Earl Sande, back in the saddle after a long layoff. He had the mount on Flying Ebony and rode the masterly race from start to finish.

Quatrain, favorite for the big event, failed to show among the leaders at any time.

Calculations at the track were upset at the late minute when a gust of rain swept over the downs. The sudden change of track conditions may have had something to do with the defeat of the highly rated horses.

The time for the mile and a quarter was 2:7 2-5, considered excellent in view of the sloppy condition of the track.

BOXER HAS JAW BROKEN IN BOUT AT WICHITA FALLS

WICHITA FALLS, May 16.—Clyde Hull, St. Paul boxer, was at liberty tonight under \$500 bond, following a bout last night in which Joe Denton, Amarillo welterweight, sustained a fractured jaw. Hull was arrested when it was feared that Denton had fractured his skull when knocked out.

GOVERNOR NAMES WEEK TO RAISE LEGION'S ENDOWMENT

AUSTIN, May 16.—Gov. Miriam A. Ferguson issued a proclamation today endorsing the plan of the American Legion to raise an endowment fund of \$5,000,000 to care for orphans of the world war in this country. The Texas quota is \$225,000.

The governor proclaims the week of June 1 to 6 an American endowment week. Subscriptions will be taken during that week.

FOREST FIRES BURNING WISCONSIN TIMBER LANDS

LAONA, Wis., May 16.—Despite light showers which fell in this section today forest fires continue to burn along an eight-mile stretch of virgin timber. National guardsmen, numbering about 800, are helping the volunteer fire fighters who have been on duty for more than a week. The rain today was of some help in wetting down leaves and underbrush, but was not sufficient to halt the flames that were spreading through the timberlands.

VETERANS OF FOREIGN WARS ELECT OFFICERS

DALLAS, May 16.—Dan F. O'Conner of San Antonio was elected departmental commander of Texas veterans of foreign wars at the close of the annual convention today. M. F. Kerr of Houston was elected junior vice commander; William C. Moore, San Antonio, quartermaster; Rev. M. S. Garriga of Houston, chaplain.

A resolution to request the state legislature to enact laws to allow retired men from all branches of service to vote in Texas was unanimously adopted.

LIVES LOST THROUGH IGNORANCE.
Each year more than two million babies are born in this country. Upon their feet the nation must march forward. The lives of two hundred thousand babies are lost every year, largely through ignorance and lack of protective measures. Five other countries take better care of their babies than we do, where New Zealand loses only 42 out of every thousand babies born, and Norway '62, we lose 76. One out of every 11 babies born in this country fails to reach its first birthday.

And in the waste of our motherhood we have an even more serious accusation to face. Sixteen other countries have reduced their maternal mortality lower than we have. In this country between sixteen and twenty thousand women die in childbirth each year. One out of every 185 confinements ends in death. With adequate care, most of these deaths could be avoided. The neglect of prenatal and natal attention for mothers is closely related to the loss of the hundred thousand babies who die in the first month of life.

WOMEN OF THE WORLD.
The most important gathering of women ever held has just been in session in the sixth quinquennial convention of the International Council of Women, which met in Washington. About 40 countries were represented, each through its own National Council of Women affiliated with the International council.

Each country, whether large or small, has the right to send 10 delegates and 10 alternates but many of the smaller countries, because of the expense involved sent only two or three delegates.

A glance at the program shows that prominent among the subjects were permanent peace, international arbitration, education, citizenship, the position of women, industrial and otherwise; child welfare and equal moral standards and the opium question.

These conventions take place every five years, and this is the first one in the United States, though the International council was formed in Washington in 1888. The last quinquennial was held in Christiania, Norway.

THE LEADING INDUSTRY.
The automobile industry now ranks first among the manufacturers of the United States, the rating being on the basis of wholesale values. The steel industry is second and meat packing third.

The federal taxes paid on motor vehicles from 1917 to 1925 was \$799,385,209, or more than twice as much as was expended in federal money toward highways.

About 65 per cent of automobiles in the United States are owned in communities having less than 25,000 population, while 48 per cent of the cars are owned in communities having less than 5,000 population, the average retail price of a motorcar is now set at \$825.

Nothing ever provoked so much adverse comment among the other nations as France's big loan to Poland for armament purposes, while unable to straighten its own financial tangles. In view of the conditions and criticisms, American financiers have loaned the money to Poland and relieved France of the last payment of \$100,000,000.

Senator Spencer Of Missouri Dies After Operation

WASHINGTON, May 16.—United States Senator Selden P. Spencer, of Missouri, died here tonight at the Walter Reed United States hospital. His death was caused by an embolus, which lodged in the circulatory system, attending physicians said.

The senator had been apparently recovering from an operation for hernia, which he underwent on May 7, when death came suddenly at 8:15 tonight. Five minutes before death the senator was laughing and talking with his nurse, when he suddenly collapsed. Mrs. Spencer, who was at a nearby hotel, was unable to reach her husband before he died.

He was born Sept. 16, 1862, and elected senator from Missouri Nov. 5, 1918, and re-elected in November, 1920.

Explosion In Mine In Germany Claims Lives of Many
By United Press.
BERLIN, May 16.—At least eight men are dead and twenty-four injured as the result of an explosion which imprisoned 225 miners in a shaft at Dorstfeld, near Dortmund, late this afternoon. A depot containing two tons of dynamite exploded, destroyed the pits and hurling gas fumes down into the lower workings.

Those killed were believed to have been choked to death by the gas and destruction of the pit made rescue work most difficult. There were pathetic scenes at the mouth of the shaft as relatives stood watching. Seven men had been brought out dead at 1:30 o'clock this morning. Another miner had died from his injuries. The accident is another of long list of industrial tragedies which have occurred in Germany this year.

AMERICA WINS POINT IN ARMS TRAFFIC CONFERENCE

GENEVA, May 16.—America won a victory today in connection with the arms traffic conference when the conferees acquiesced in the claim of Chairman Britton of the American group that a league sub-commission for statistics should not be competent. Instead, it was agreed that a sub-commission should be named to study the creation of a central committee on publication of the traffic figures.

Britton's triumph came despite energetic opposition of others.

Contest Hen From Driskill Leghorn Farm Makes New Record In Egg Laying
For three consecutive months the hens from the Driskill Leghorn Farm of Ranger entered in the Texas national egg-laying contest at A. & M. College, have been mentioned for some special performance, and they have also climbed steadily up the scale until the report for the six months, April 1 to 30, showed them in 33rd place instead of 60th, as early in the contest, in which 80 pens are entered.

But the Driskill pen has a special distinction in that one of the hens has made a run of 56 eggs on 56 consecutive days, which is said in the report to be the best record so far this year. The nearest to it is a record of 52. The report says: "The long distance cycles continue to increase, but are a little short of last year's records at this time, although there are a greater number of hens with good records of consecutive daily production. Lester Sprowls' Red laid the first 16 days of the month, bringing her run to 52, which is a new record for Reds and only 14 short of the best record for a heavy breed in this contest. The Leghorn owned by Driskill Leghorn Farm stopped her run at 56, which is the best record so far this year.

It is probable that several chicken raisers of Ranger and a number at other places in Eastland county will enter pens in the egg-laying contest next year. The Driskill Leghorn Farm has blazed the way for Eastland county hens which are yet to win special distinction for their egg laying efforts.

BUILDING AT BIG SPRING.
BIG SPRING, May 16.—Construction work on three handsome churches for Big Spring is progressing steadily. The brick work on the walls of the \$65,000 Methodist church is under way.

Pouring the concrete foundation for the First Christian church was started the first of the week. The brick walls of the Church of God on Main street are being rapidly constructed.

EXPLOSION ON ITALIAN STEAMER INJURES SEVERAL
WASHINGTON, May 16.—Several members of the crew of the Italian steamer Adige were injured by an explosion and fire which followed aboard the ship while lying at anchor off Hampton Roads early today, according to a dispatch to the navy department.

The injured sailors were taken from the steamer to the naval hospital. The message did not give the number of men injured nor extent of damage to the vessel.

UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS STUDENTS HOLD ELECTION

Blalock of Marshall Chosen President of Students' Association.

Special Correspondence.

AUSTIN, May 14.—Victors in one of the most closely contested student elections ever held at the University of Texas, 15 students have just been elected to the various offices of the student self-government. There were 3,131 students who cast their votes for their respective choices.

Richard W. Blalock, of Marshall, was elected president of the Students' association by a vote of 1,612 to 1,295. His opponent was T. W. Erwin, a law student of McKinney. Otis Rogers, of Canadian, was elected chairman of the men's council, winning by 895 votes as compared with 866 of his opponent, James Hart, of Austin. Sam Johnson, of Marlin, was elected managing editor of the Daily Texan by a majority of 111 votes over Charles T. Banister, of Corsicana.

Warren Collins, of Dallas, was elected vice president of the students' association, and Richard H. Guelich Jr., of Longview, was made secretary-treasurer. Miss Mildred Beall, of Nacogdoches, was elected chairman of the women's council; Edwin Tangel, of Thorndale, was made academic councillor, and J. W. Akkerman, of San Antonio, was elected engineering councillor.

There were five girls selected as new members of the woman's council, each by a very close margin. Nine students were in the race, five to be elected. Those elected were Mabel Cooper, of San Antonio; Frances Agnew, of McAllen; Patti Bailey, of Rockport; Virginia Taber, of Brownwood, and Marjorie Little, of Beaumont.

DeWitt Reddick, of Fort Worth, was re-elected to the position of editor-in-chief of the Longhorn over Melvin Williamson, of San Antonio, by a 700 vote majority. William M. Rippey, of Dallas, polled 891 votes in the yell-leader race, his closest contender being Raymond Gerhardt, of San Antonio, who will be assistant yell leader. C. A. Pickett, of Beaumont, will also be assistant yell leader.

Uncontested positions were filled as follows: Stewart Harkrider, of Brady, editor-in-chief of the Daily Texan; Robert L. Harris, of Cleburne, editor of the Cactus; Howard Williamson, of Texarkana, editor of the Ranger; and Roland Voight, of San Antonio, graduate councillor.

Introducing the cardinal, Bishop Lynch called attention to the fact this was the first time so high an officer of the church ever had visited Texas.

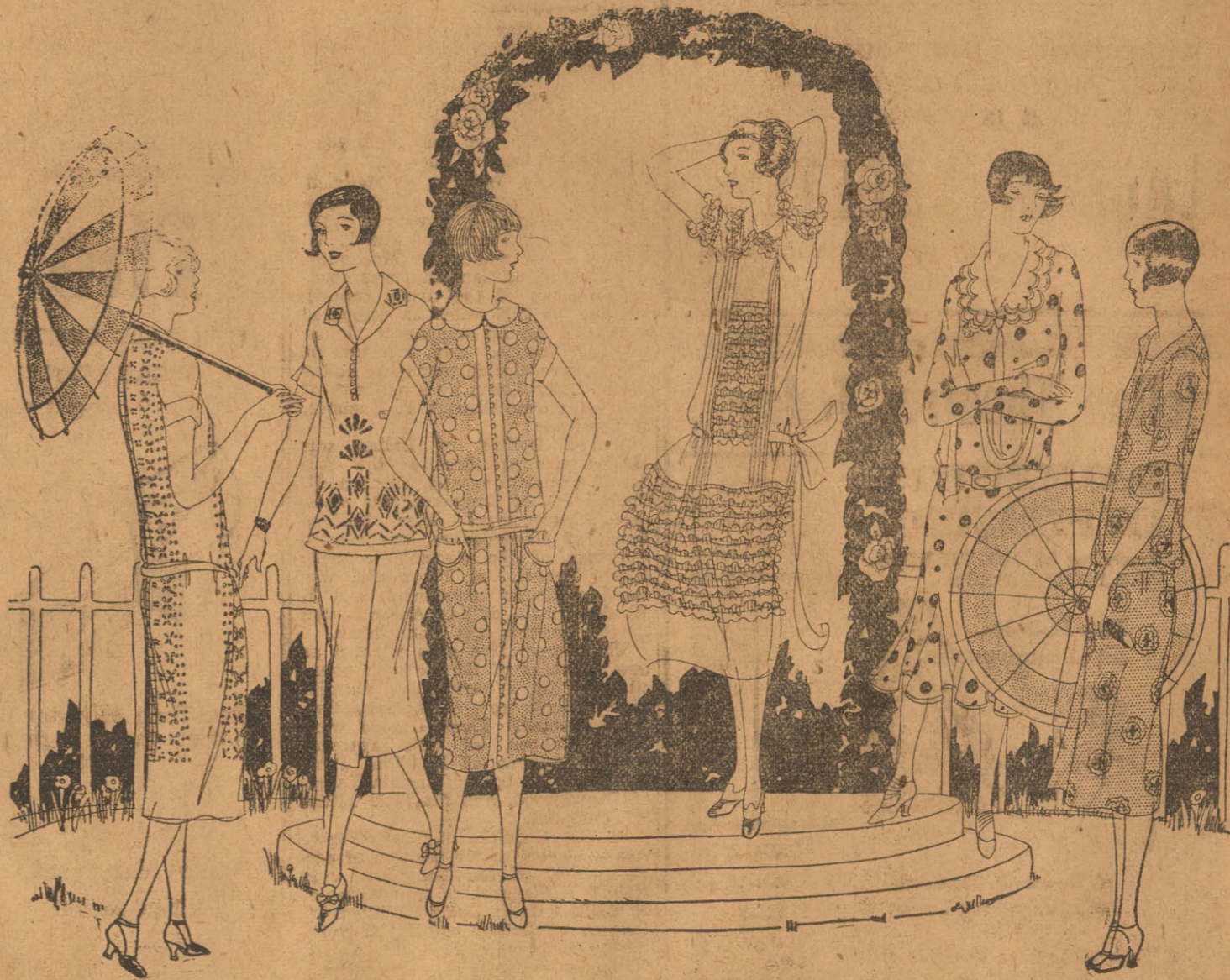
**FARMER THROWN FROM WAGON
