He is considered a "kulak" or "fist," and not permitted to vote in elections. His taxes are increased and he is bound to provide his laborers with a certain amount of clothing and not to overwark them None of the requirements hold good if he only employs his own family. Now the peasant with his proverb-ially shrewd eye for his own inter-ests, has found a solution of his economic difficulties in frequent summer marriages. On the eve of the harvest season, when the need of extra labor is greatest, he picks out a strong, healthy peasant girl, uses her labor and divorces her in the autumn. This leaves the girl stranded with the unpromising alter-


