EDUCATIONAL INEQUALITIES.
 As a nation we spend over a thousand million a year to educate the 24 million children who are in our schools. Of that amount but a fraction over 1 per cent is expended to insure that they will grow to strong manhood and womanhood. According to the United States bureau of education, but one-tenth of the nation's school children are receiving adequate physical education and "anything which even pretends to be health training."
 It is estimated that we pay one billion four hundred million dollars a year for the services of physicians and other healers, for nurses, hospital services, drug and patent medicines, while for health work, part of which at least is preventive, we spend through federal state and municipal agencies only 60 millions. We actually spend a larger sum in this country for chewing-gum than we appropriate through legislative bodies for health activities.

LOW TAXES IN FRANCE.
 Senator Borah, of Idaho, has reiterated his recent statement that French taxes are lower than those in the United States. He declares: "Our citizens are paying around 70 per cent, including federal and local taxes, and my information is that the French citizen is paying altogether about \$33.58 per capita, all levies included. That is quite a difference."
 Mr. Borah cites several European authorities for his statement. He admits that the entire per capita tax in Great Britain is \$87.28; France, \$33.58, and the United States, \$32.56. However, these figures represent only federal taxes, when state, county and municipal taxes are added we pay between \$68 and \$69 per capita, or double the tax of France, and reiterates his plea for the payment of debts.

If the United States really desires peace in Europe, why do our financiers continue to loan them money for armament purposes? It does not fit in with the pleas for peace, participation in League of Nations or otherwise. It savors so strongly of hypocrisy that one is justified in loss of faith.

Another federal court has sustained the legality of the publication of income tax returns. The final word, however, will have to be spoken by the supreme court. The decision will not be on the question of constitutionality, but on a decision of what congress intended, or did not intend by the law passed.

Wisconsin holds that the interest of the gasoline consumer is equally as important as the interest of oil and gasoline dealers, and has passed a law compelling gasoline dispensers to publicly display a list of their prices. Other states are studying the plan with a view of adopting a similar system.

Ten million school children in our rural districts are beyond the reach of the better health facilities of the cities, and this inequality of opportunity is demanding the attention of educators and statesmen. Every child should have a square deal.

Miss Irene Lisenbee was among those from Cisco who attended singing here Sunday night.

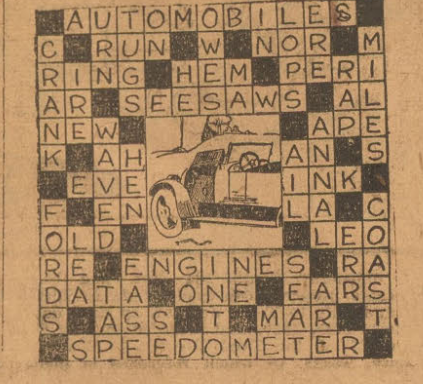
PAINLEVE OUTLINES FRENCH POLICY IN MOROCCO.

PARIS, May 21.—French Premier

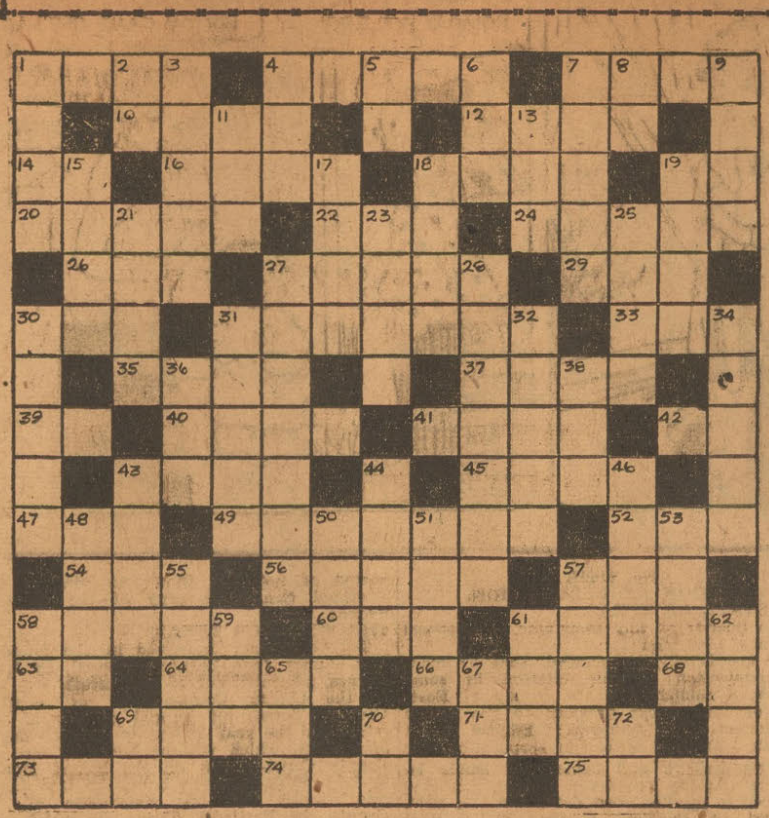
