

Vegetable Luncheon

One pound dandelion greens, 8 tiny new beets, 1 head cauliflower, 1 bunch asparagus, 1 tablespoon minced parsley.

Wash and look over greens, removing the roots. Let stand in slightly eatted water for half an hour. Drain

and cook in boiling water to cover until tender. Wash beets carefully, Making care not to break the skin Cut off tops about two inches from the beet and cook in boiling water until tender. Dip into cold water and rub off skins. Let cauliflower stand in cold salted water, head down for helf an hour. Separate into flowerettes and cook in boiling salted water until tender. Drain from water. Cut the tough ends from the asparagus and tie in small bunches. Put into boiling water, standing the bunches up so that the heads are out of the water. When the stalks are almost tender put the bunches flat in the pan to cook the tips. Drain if necessary. Arrange vegetables in a deep platter, separating one vege-table, from another by strips of toast. Season the greens with salt, pepper and lemon juice.
