LAKES IN EASTLAND COUNTY FILLING FAST

RANGER'S TEXAS RANGER BAND WINS SECOND PLACE IN CONTEST OF WEST TEXAS TWO-YEAR BANDS

Ranger's Texas Ranger band proved their ability by winning second place in the second year class of the West Texas band contest of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce convention at Mineral Wells, May 4-5-6. First place was won by Knox City. The opinion of the band boys and of director Leo M. Underwood is "We didn't do so badly for a four-month old band to be playing in the second year division."

Director Underwood's face wore a pleased expression when he emerged from the contest hall yesterday afternoon.

The Ranger band is being sponsored by the Carl Barnes post of the

American Legion of Ranger, which is bending every effort towards getting sufficient funds to insure the retention of Director Underwood.

While the Ranger band was organized several years ago, the attempt was only spasmodic and was, furthermore, a county proposition, while the band organized four months ago under the leadership of Mr. Underwood is composed of Ranger musicians only.

The band made a splendid hit with the convention visitors, who were also well pleased with the Ranger uniform. Crowds gathered around the band whenever it stopped on street corners and played.

RACE RIOT IN OIL FIELD HAS FATAL RESULT

One Killed and Several Seriously Wounded at Eldorado, Arkansas.

ELDORADO, Ark., May 7.—Caution was taken today to prevent further rioting between white and negro oil field workers, following last night's fight, in which one negro was killed and several white men seriously wounded.

Fighting began when 200 white workers asked the foreman of a camp of negro workers to have the negroes move out. While conferring with the foreman, the men were fired upon from a clump of bushes and general fighting broke out. More than 100 shots were fired before leaders of the men quelled the riot.

ASSASSINATION PLOTTERS FAIL TO SELL PLANS

Soviet Minister in Denmark Reveals Scheme Against Prime Minister.

COPENHAGEN, Denmark, May 7.—What police believe to have been a plot to assassinate Premier Stauning of Denmark and two members of his cabinet was frustrated here with the assistance of Russian Minister Kobetsky.

The suspects showed the Russian minister a complete detailed plan for setting fire to the public buildings and killing Premier Stauning, Minister of Justice Steincke and Minister of Social Affairs Borgbjerg.

Two suspects, a Swede and a Frenchman, both with criminal records, were captured in the street after they had called upon the soviet emissary and attempted to obtain remuneration for the proposed killing.

RAINFALL IN LAST 24 HOURS VERY ABUNDANT

Precipitation Ranges Between 2 1/2 and 5 Inches, Making The People Rejoice.

Rainfall ranging between three and four inches fell Wednesday afternoon, Wednesday night and Thursday morning over Eastland county. Lake Eastland, from which Eastland obtains its water supply, and Lake Hagaman, which supplies Ranger, were filling rapidly all morning. Lake Eastland being reported about five feet above yesterday's gauge and Lake Hagaman about seven feet higher.

Every canyon and creek in Eastland county was reported running bank full and these were emptying their water into the various lakes. Cisco was feeling joyous over the expected rise of Lake Cisco, some of the more optimistic believing the water might get high enough at this time to go over the spillway at the dam.

At noon the rain had stopped falling and the sun was shining, but during the afternoon clouds again gathered and there appeared a good possibility of more rain. While the lakes supplying water for the cities are sufficiently supplied now to get through the summer, it would never do for any people or community in West Texas to grumble because of too much rain, so if more falls it will be given a hearty welcome.

The rain gauge at the Leon lake powerhouse of the Oil Cities Electric company showed the rainfall there a little more than two and one-half inches. The government rain gauge at the railroad station in Eastland showed rainfall of 3.55 inches. At Ranger the rainfall was estimated by the water running down canyons and filling low places at between four and five inches.

The cut across the Bankhead highway in Ranger, just west of Elin street, was between four and five feet deep in water the greater part of this morning and automobiles had to make detours. The cut under the Texas & Pacific tracks a little way west of Ranger was so full of water it was difficult for vehicles to get through. But the water in these places ran off quickly after the rain stopped.

Farmers had a pleased expression this morning and were jubilant over the prospects for a banner year in crops as the rain in the past few weeks has given the ground excellent seasoning. Stockmen whose depleted tanks were filled by the rain last night are pleased with the downpour and grass will now start to grow in earnest. With the ground thoroughly soaked and seasoned, the rangers will soon be covered with green grass instead of being spotted as heretofore.

TRINITY RIVER FLOOD WARNING IS SENT OUT

Rainfall of Between 3 and 4 Inches Starts Stream Rising And Crest Yet to Come.

DALLAS, May 7.—Flood warnings were sent out to residents in the Trinity lowlands today as weather reports told of continued rain in Northern Texas. Streams were running bank full in many places, and floods will result with additional rains.

The Trinity was at the 16-foot mark here today and rising. Little damage was anticipated until the stream passes the 30-foot stage. Approximately 2-1-2 inches had fallen and the rainfall is continuing. Fort Worth reported 3.75 inches at 5 o'clock today with the Trinity at 12-foot mark and rising.

Other points along the stream reported rises with fall ranging from 1 to 2-1-2 inches.

The slow steady rainfalls which was said to be general are welcomed.

MRS. SHEPHERD LEAVES HIDING, SEEKING BAIL

State Attorney Crowe Believes Task Made Harder by Her Entrance Into Case.

CHICAGO, May 7.—An open break was threatened today between State's Attorney Robert E. Crowe and Chief Justice Harry Olson of the municipal court over the former's attitude toward Mrs. Julie G. Shepherd, involved by a coroner's jury in the death of Mrs. Emma McClintock and her son, Billie.

Crowe, although under, yesterday's mandate from the coroner's jury to proceed against the woman, is taking his time, and at the same time making no secret of his displeasure. Justice Olson is miffed at Crowe's attitude.

Mrs. Shepherd, after 24 hours in hiding, came to Judge Jacob Hopkins' court late yesterday to see about the matter of bail.

Crowe feels that Mrs. Shepherd's entrance into the case makes his task of prosecuting Shepherd all the more difficult.

RUM ROW FEELS STRAIN OF THE DRY BLOCKADE

Several Liquor Laden Ships Sail Northward, But Major Portion Remain.

CLIFTON, N. Y., May 7.—Rum row is breaking up under the strain of the dry navy's blockade. Wireless reports received here today were that several of the liquor laden ships had weighed anchor and were sailing northward, probably with the hope of establishing communication with shore points unguarded by the fleet. Government boats are trailing the retreating rum runners.

The major portion of rum row remains immobile, however, coast guard officials said.

Methods of "Furniture Bootleggers" To Be Discussed at Convention

DALLAS, May 7.—The methods of the "furniture bootlegger" will be discussed at the Texas Retail Furniture Dealers' convention which will be held here May 12, 13 and 14, according to W. H. Wray, Dallas furniture man.

In Dallas and other Texas cities the unscrupulous dealer is operating under a new method. He handles the very cheapest grade of merchandise in the first place. A house is furnished and an "agent" placed in charge under the guise of the lady of the house, who represents to private prospective purchasers that her husband has just died, leaving her with small children to support, and furniture that she must sacrifice. Thinking that they are profiting by another's loss, and not knowing that they are paying several prices for cheap merchandise, the gullible public bites this popular "gag," and the practice has become a regular habit with the furniture bootlegger.

Means of putting a stop to this practice will be openly discussed at the convention and it is hoped that unfair methods of competition and of fleecing the public can be eliminated in the furniture trade.

Second Naval Oil Lease Probe Is For Special Grand Jury

Atlee Pomeroy and Owen Roberts, special government oil counsel, decided today, after a conference with United States District Attorney Gordon, not to submit the case to the regular grand jury now in session and called for a special panel.

Bomb Explosion In Brooklyn Kills Man

BROOKLYN, N. Y., May 7.—One man was killed, six others were painfully injured and scores suffered from shock early today when two time-fuse bombs exploded at the home of Pietro Spinelli, in the Sheepshead Bay district.

Several houses were badly damaged, one being almost completely wrecked by the terrific blast that shattered windows within a radius of seven blocks.

CRAWFORD APPEALS HIS CASE TO HIGHER COURT

AUSTIN, May 7.—William Lester Crawford, Dallas lawyer, convicted of manslaughter in connection with the fatal shooting of Paul M. O'Day, also a lawyer, in Dallas, Sept. 11, 1924, and sentenced to five years, has filed an appeal in the court of criminal appeals. The tragedy grew out of a brief prepared by O'Day in a suit.

Fighting In Morocco Like Real Warfare

TANGIERS, Morocco, May 7.—Three French columns in Morocco are pressing hard against the Rifian line. General Colombat, who commands the left wing of the French line, is meeting strong resistance from the Moors in his territory, but has succeeded in relieving the more isolated posts in the western sector.

Advancing eastward, Colonel Camby met with a heavy attack in the Kisan district.

The fighting in Morocco as described in Tangiers dispatches is assuming the character of real warfare, somewhat resembling that of the world war.

Religion Essentials Count, Says Pastor

ST. LOUIS, Mo., May 7.—Few people have religion, yet everybody is a heretic or orthodox, according to Rev. William Normal Guthrie, pastor of the Saint Marks-in-the-Bowery, New York.

The New York pastor, who is one of the outspoken figures in the fundamentalist-modernist argument, spoke at an open forum in connection with the fifty-first annual session of the church congress of the Episcopal church. He was one of the pastors who talked on "heresy—what is it and what shall we do with it?"

There were several thrusts at the extreme modernistic viewpoints of the New York pastor, but Guthrie answered:

"I welcome controversies. The only place you want agreement is in a lunatic asylum and you don't get it there."

He said religious controversies were waged over the meanings of words and phrases rather than the essentials of religion.

Oklahoma Wheat Crop Half of Last Year

OKLAHOMA CITY, May 7.—The 1925 Oklahoma wheat crop will approximate 30,000,000 bushels, or a little more than half of last year's production, the state board of agriculture forecast today. Drought conditions lasting until the latter part of April caused 9 per cent of the planted area to be abandoned, the board stated. The total production of last year was 53,938,000 bushels.

Court Comments on Receivership For Chicago Packer

PHILADELPHIA, May 7.—A victory against attempts to throw them into a liquidating receivership was scored by Wilson & Co., Chicago meat packers today when the United States circuit court of appeals upheld a decision of the New Jersey court in dismissing the receiver appointed by Vice Chancellor Backes of New Jersey in August, 1924.

Backes appointed the receiver on application of Morris I. Klein, a stockholder. In its opinion handed down by Judge Buffington, the court of appeals sharply criticized the Klein suit, agreeing with the lower court it seriously jeopardized the rights of the 7,000 or more stockholders.

DEFENDANT IN MURDER TRIAL AGAIN FOUND GUILTY

King was found guilty and sentenced to 25 years at a previous hearing at Hempstead. The case was reversed on the plea that a private prosecutor had been employed.

Chicago Bandits Rob Pawnbroker

MAKE YOUR SUMMER DRIVING MUCH LESS EXPENSIVE

NEW YORK, May 7.—The most delicate and the most expensive part of the automobile is of course the engine, yet as it is hidden from your eyes as you drive, anything can happen to its internal workings, unless a certain amount of precaution is taken. How many motorists know that there are sixteen ways or causes of overheating an engine? Set forth briefly they are: Radiator leaks, and clogged mufflers, rotten of the rubber hose connections, choked water passages, cylinder friction, loose oil pipe connections, clogged strainers, broken oil pumps, worn piston rings, driving with a retarded spark, improper timing, improper carburetor adjustment, broken fan belts and clogged mufflers are some of the more important reasons for a heated motor, and must be carefully guarded against.

Inasmuch as the engine is covered with a vault-like steel covering, it was found to be impossible for the motorist to ascertain when engine trouble was imminent on account of an overheated condition, until the damage was done. This accounts for the presence of the heat indicator on the radiator cap of most automobiles, and it has been proven many times, that if the driver will keep a casual eye on this instrument his motor troubles will disappear, for the heat indicator is a sure prognosticator of trouble.

Ranger and Eastland Shown By Business Conditions Map To Be In Control Right Now of Favorable Influences

Two business maps published this morning in the Fort Worth Record, showing a comparison of business conditions throughout the United States in April of 1924 and April, 1925, should be encouraging to Eastland county, and the several communities in the county.

The maps show good, fair and slow or quiet conditions by the coloring. In April of last year Texas was shown to be "good," as was North and South Carolina, Oregon, and Washington and the larger part of California; fair conditions were reported over the larger part of the United States, and quiet conditions in several states.

This year fair conditions are reported throughout the larger part of the United States, with quiet conditions in only a few scattered places, but what is of significance to Eastland county is that good conditions are reported in only a few places, conspicuous among these being a strip through North Texas and a portion of Oklahoma, including Fort Worth and the territory west of there to the western limits of Eastland county.

In connection with this map, the Record says:

"Maps like those appearing here-where were taken from the Nation's Business, official organ of the United States Chamber of Com-

merce, are drawn for the benefit of big business executives, manufacturers and jobbers who have large amounts of money to invest. These men study these maps diligently before making investments.

"The expenditure of millions of dollars hinges on the color of these maps. Areas that are continuously 'white' are bound to attract capital. It is natural for big business to turn to those areas where business is known to be good.

"Men and industries with huge sums to invest are going to be guided impartially. They will be governed by facts. And that is what maps such as these are designed to show."

COOLIDGE INSISTS ON PARTY LOYALTY.
Recognizing that his party is weak in leadership it is said that President Coolidge proposes to assume the initiative by refusing to recognize those senators who fail to stand up and be counted on administration measures. This move is said to be directed particularly at Senators Norris and Howell, of Nebraska, who voted against the confirmation of Charles B. Warren for attorney general.

Many of the old guard leaders, however, question the political wisdom of this policy, and fear results of the next election. President Coolidge, however, proposes to enforce strict loyalty in the party and to this end has recognized Senator Lenroot in the distribution of all Wisconsin patronage. Reports indicate that instead of strengthening Lenroot it has weakened him, and it is believed that if the president should decline to recognize Senators Norris and Howell in the distribution of federal patronage for Nebraska it might tend to make them more hostile to the party and to administration measures.

BUSINESS CONDITIONS GOOD.
A single office building in Atlanta, Ga., is to cost \$6,000,000; and Harvard university is to build a business school at Brighton, Mass., for which it appropriates \$5,000,000. New irrigation works at Gracia Valley, California, will cost \$7,500,000; a hotel in Portland, \$2,000,000; a Presbyterian temple-church at Dallas, Texas, will cost \$2,000,000; a bridge at Wilmington, N. C., will cost \$1,500,000; a hotel and garage at Indianapolis will represent \$3,500,000; the Rainier-Longview bridge across the Columbia will cost \$2,000,000; a hydro-electric system at Leeper, Mo., will cost \$3,500,000; Gulfport, Miss., will spend \$1,500,000 on roads and bridges.

These items are taken at random from all over the country, as indications that business conditions generally are good and that people have faith in the future. This record of employment and investment is the result of sound public consciousness—the condition which makes prosperity.—Industrial Review.

SHERIFF DOES NOT SET FREE PARDONED MAN

Law Violator in Stephens County Held in Jail Notwithstanding Governor.

AUSTIN, May 7.—Although pardoned by Governor Miriam A. Ferguson, A. Green, who was fined \$250 and sentenced to 90 days in jail for contempt of court in violating a liquor injunction of the 90th district court of Stephens county, is still in custody. The sheriff of Stephens county has refused to recognize the governor's pardon and remission of fine. This unusual situation was revealed in Green's writ of habeas corpus filed today.

Stephens county officials say they are holding Green under a mandate of the supreme court affirming judgment of the trial court. The pardon was granted March 17, prior to final decision of the supreme court. For that reason they claim the pardon proclamation is void and that the supreme court mandate is still in force.

FORD RESALE CONTRACTS ARE BASIS OF SUIT

JACKSON, Miss., May 7.—Charging a criminal conspiracy to violate the anti-trust laws of Mississippi, W. J. Miller, state revenue agent, today filed suit for \$12,000,000 against the Ford Motor company.

Mississippi Ford dealers and the banks in which they do business are named co-defendants. The suit is based on the contracts between the parent company in Detroit and the Ford dealers which are alleged to fix the resale price on Ford cars.

DETROIT, Mich., May 7.—Officials of the Ford Motor company refused to make any comment on a suit said to have been filed in Jackson, Miss., charging criminal conspiracy to violate anti-trust laws in that state.

"We will make no statement in regard to the suit," said a Ford spokesman, "until officially notified of the suit."

Leo Healer, Ranger Central School, Wins Award for Essay on "Milk"

Leo Healer, 6-A student at the Central Ward school, Ranger, was given "honorary mention" in the awards for "health" essays which featured the observance of national health day in the Ranger schools. Taking for his subject "Milk," he wrote: "Milk is nature's future for the young, for it contains in itself the various kinds of foods we need. It contains fat in the cream; it has building foods in the curd, or solid part of clabber; and sweet milk con-

tains sugar as well. Children and most sick people should use a great deal of milk. It makes weak persons strong and helps children to grow. The body can make use of milk more quickly than of almost any other food.

"All food should be kept clean, but especially milk. Milk may become very dangerous when it is not clean. Dirty milk may cause disease, because if there is dirt in milk there are germs in it also. These germs may be very harmful. They may cause typhoid fever and other diseases. Milk that had dirt and germs in it has caused the death of thousands of children.

"Dirt and germs get into milk in various ways. When milk buckets, cans, and bottles are not washed clean with boiling water, dirt and germs are sure to be already there. They may be washed into these vessels from the dirty hands of the milkers or they may drop in with filth blown about the cow-lot, or a dirty fly may fall into the milk.

"The Child Welfare club in Ranger furnishes milk free to the boys and girls 10 per cent below weight in the first and second grades. The school nurse finds that the children in these grades gain just twice as much on the average as the children who do not drink milk at recess."


