### New Treasury Certificates Are Offered for Sale

Lynn P. Talley, governor of the Federal Reserve bank of Dallas, gives notice of receipt of Treasury announcement today, as follows:

The treasury is today announcing its September financing, which takes the form of an offering of nine months 3 1/2 per cent treasury certificates of indebtedness dated and bearing interest from Sept. 15, 1926, maturing June 15, 1927. The certificates are tax certificates, and the amount of offering is for \$350,000,000 or thereabouts.

The treasury will accept in payment for the new certificates treasury 4 1/2 per cent notes of the series B-1926, maturing Sept. 15, 1926. Subscriptions for which payment is made in notes maturing Sept. 15 will be given preferred allotment.

About \$400,000,000 treasury 4 1/2 per cent notes will be retired on Sept. 15, 1926.

The present offering is intended, with the balance on hand and the September tax receipts, to cover the treasury's further cash requirements until the December quarterly tax period.

### Counties Cannot Lease Highways For Oil Drilling

Counties are without authority to lease highway rights for drilling of oil wells, according to a ruling recently handed down by the attorney general's department answering questions submitted to them by the Jefferson county commissioners' court.

Counties are not in possession of rights-of-way, the opinion said. The state, in which control of the road lies, is invested with their custody, it held.

Only the legislature could grant authority for leasing the highway for drilling purposes, and this has not been done, the opinion said.

It has been suggested that Eastland county could lease some of its highways, which offset producing oil wells and thereby receive much additional revenue.
