Drops Dead at Home in Dallas While Eating Breakfast in Bed.

DALLAS, May 21 .- J. S. Strictland millionaire electric interurban promotor, builder and official of Dallas, dropped dead at his home here today while eating breakfast in bed. Death

was due to heart trouble.

Strictland had been ill for the last eight months but not seriously enough to prevent his going to work most of the time as usual.

He was one of the most prominent traction men of the country. At the time of his death he was president of the Dallas railway company, the Dallas Power and Light Company, the Texas Power and Light Company, the Texas Electric Railway company, the Dallas Securities company, Dallas Union Trust company, and active vice chairman of the Texas Land Securities Syndicate.

Strictland came to Texas in 1879, and spent his boyhood in Ellis county. He came to Dallas in 1909 and became connected with interurban electric railway promotion. He promoted and


