



Childlessness Now Deplored By Most Women

CHICAGO, Sept. 13.—Motherhood is the primary function and glory of women. This is recognized thruout the universe, whether among civilized peoples or harbaric tribes.

Not many years ago it was the custom to regard childlessness as an act of providence, and evidence of the heavy hand of an unkind fate. The biblical stories of childless women properly may be held responsible for this attitude, but fortunately, in recent years, there has been a markrecent years, there has been a marked change in the mental attitude the involuntary childless woman.

She no longer considers herself the ore to a life of childlessness. With the advance of medical progress and religious enlightenment, it has been found that sterility is based on purely physical conditions, faulty anato-mical or physiological arrangements most, if now all of which, can be corrected and relieved by medical

The entire subject has been eliminated from human thought as a spiritual problem and has become, in stead, a medical matter amendable to medical practice. In other words childlessness is simply another mani-festation of bad health, which usual-ly can be corrected by proper mea-

It has been found that the child bearing organs in women become di-seased because of various reasons which need not be discussed. When hese abnormal conditions are correct ed whether by hygienic or surgic measurers, these woman can be made happy by becoming mothers of fine,

healthy children.
In most cases surgical measures are required because the trouble cannot be corrected by medicines taken by mouth or otherwise. As mattf fact most medicines rec for childlessness belong to the quach class, particularly those claimed as "cure alls" of women's ailments.

Operative procedure, in most case is slight; sometimes the condition such that more extensive surgery may be required. In still other cases, i may be necessary to remove tumors and other growths.

There is a class of cases in which certain medicines taken by mouth are all that may be neded. These cases of improper development of the child bearing organs, in which they remain immature and undevelop ed and incapable of performing their

proper function.

These are what are called endocrine cases, and they often make marvelous response to proper treatment. It is important to remember that the substances which bring about this happy result can do great harm if taken injudiciously, but if harm if taken injudiciously, but if properly used the results border on the miraculous. Therefore, they must ified to administer them because of his knowledge of the mysterious workings of the internal secretions.

Hundreds of children, in many of our cities, will be gathered together carrying diseased conditions inimical to themselves and dangerous to of ers. It will be well, therefore, for parents and teachers to give heed the health of their charges. Especial y is this true in the lower grade. where children are too young to draw attention to any abnormality or to a feeling of ill being.

Inspection is particularly needed

in rural districts, the villages and towns, for in the larger communities Boards of Health have staffs who daily or less frequently visit the chools and examine all children who in the judgment of the principa need to be looked over. Those wh are ill or a danger to others are ser home to the care of the family ph cian and suggestions are made nim of possible deleterious affection All parents must realize that n child can do justice to himself i handicapped by ill health; that man ases of illness might have been pr vented, if, in the early stages, the symptoms had been removed or a deformity correctd; and that the pread of a contagious disease migh have beeen cut short if the child had been seen early by the family phy sician and kept at home away from
