

WELL ON HARBIN PLACE ATTRACTS BIG ATTENTION

Other Dévelopments Are Nearing Pay In Vicinity Of Eastland

Increasing interest in oil circles in Eastland county, occasioned by the splendid showing being made by wells in wildcat and semi-wildcat territory, is noted this week. The progress being made on drilling wells in proven territory during the past week, if continued for a few days longer, will bring a number of them to the pay.

The latest development to attract more than usual attention, was the striking of the pay in the Jess Har-bin well four miles south of Eastland in the Flatwoods community and on section 15, block 2, H. & T. C. Rail-way company survey. At a depth of 1,230 feet this well is bailing more than two barrels per hour. It has not been drilled in and is making no gas. Lewis, Moore and associates of Eastland own the well. Pritchard Well.

The derrick and rig on the Judge Ed Pritchard well in the Flatwoods section, which burned a few days ago when an unexpected flow of gas ignited, is being rebuilt for the purpose of continuing drilling operations, the gas flow having been encountered at a very shallow depth.
