FORT WORTH, April 29.—Joseph H. Garrison, 72, was burned to death when fire destroyed a rooming house here early today. Other occupants escaped injury.

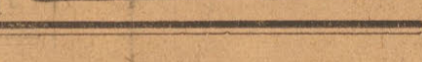

The plant can now filter 1,000,000 gallons per day, the commissioner stated.



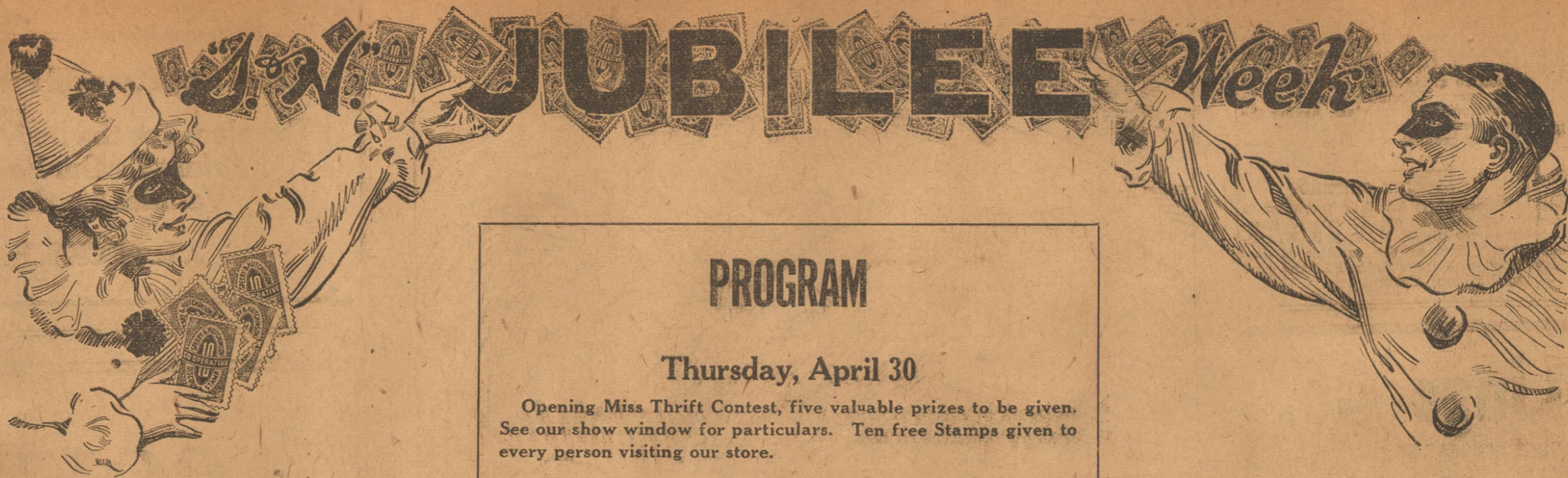

How To Prevent a Cold

Prevention is better than cure, according to Charles Terrell, General 6-B, whose health theme on "How to Prevent a Cold," was awarded honorable mention. The essay follows:

(By Charles Terrell)
Scientists believe that a cold may be brought on by a weakening experience—such as excessive fatigue, hunger, exposure to cold weather, or by any local irritation, such as dust or chemical vapor.

Several precautions against colds are: To stay out in the open air a great deal, eat plenty of plain, nourishing food, and avoid exposing yourself to the weather without proper clothing. These things seem to fortify us against the germs, but if we go hunting in rainy, windy weather, and stay all day without food or rest, or if we get our feet wet, especially when we are tired, the germs may set up an inflammation of the air passages.

One who is using his muscles in work or play does not readily take cold, but if a draft blows on a person who is sitting still, he may take cold. It is dangerous to have an overheated room and go riding on a cold day, although walking on a cold day is healthful. Changing direct from light to heavy underwear

is risky to those who are sensitive to colds.

The linen from the bed of a sick person who has a cold should not be handled or tossed into the air, but should be carefully bundled and dropped into boiling water or into a disinfectant solution. Those who have to care for the patient should always wash their hands carefully before leaving the room and especially before eating. Dusting by the dry method is not near so good as the wet method, because it scatters dust which, if it gets into the air passage, usually causes a slight cold.

HOME ECONOMICS TAUGHT IN HIGH SCHOOL

A home economics class is being taught in Ranger High by Miss Helen Stafford. The purpose of this class is to be more efficient in the home. The class has made much progress since the beginning of the term and the girls are very enthusiastic in their work.

The present enrollment of the class is 41 pupils, a much larger number than was enrolled last year. The first year's work embodies the preparation of breakfast, luncheon, and dinner. As a rule there is not much formal work in the first year economics, but an exception has been made this year because of certain outside meals that had to be served.

The second year course includes, luncheon, dinner, teas, and buffet suppers. School lunches are also stressed.

Home project work embodies application of all principles learned in school laboratory to the home laboratory. 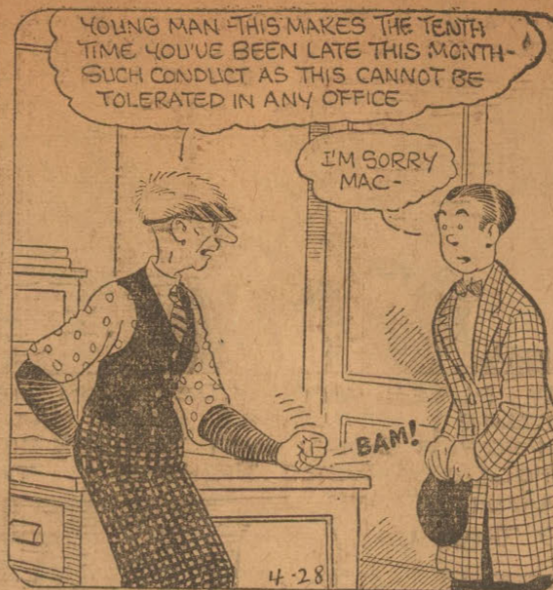

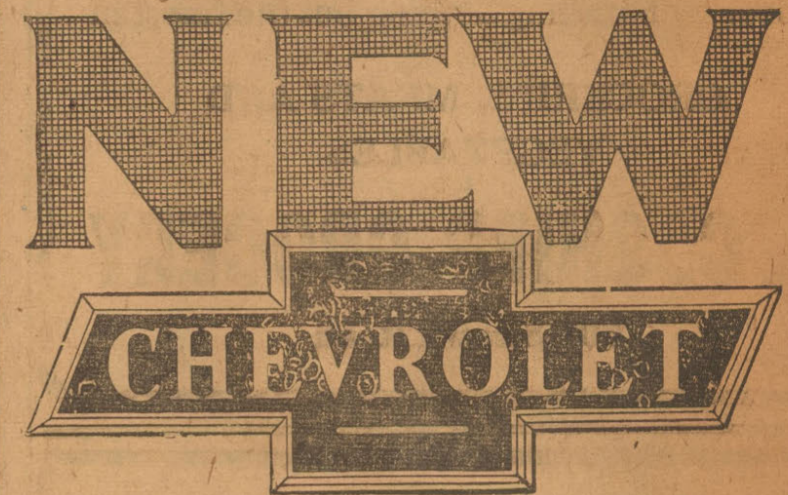
