At 2,003 feet, Pratt No. 1 is making something over 500 barrles of oil a day and 15,000,000 cubic feet of gas, by far the biggest well that has been drilled in this area single the correctional in this area since the sensational wells that came in last year in the Barney Carter pool at Sand City.


