Even as the faith of Mrs. Teakell denied ownership of the lifeless form, a message came from beyond the rim of her world telling her that her son was alive and well and would be home shortly to see her. He had read an account of his supposed death in the papers and hastened to deny the statements.

Smoke floated over the business district for some time before the blaze could be located. Police Captain Tom Weeks and Patrolman Ingram gave the first alarm, shortly after 3 o'clock. At that time they were in front of the Boston store, having rushed ever from the cart side in the losses of hose.

As the flames dwindled, the smoke became thicker and lower, filling the streets so that one could hardly pass along Austin from Pine to Main, and on down Main to Rusk. The Guaranty bank building and the Gholson hotel were directly in the drift of this smoke, and at one time the bank building could not be seen by a spectator on Pine street. While this condition lasted, an awning burst into flames, and a cry arose that the building had caught. It burned out in a few moments, however, and the alarm subsided. KANSAS CITY JAIL

Carnival of Plunder, Sabotage, Violent Death in Mary Towns Launched on Word From Communist Headquarters in Moscow.

BERLIN, March 24.-Martial law has been proclaimed in Hamburg as a result of the communist uprising, and Senator Hense has been appointed dictator, said a dispatch from that

Nearly a score of persons were reported to have been killed while the communists were occupying shippards and attacking government buildings at Hamburg. Four men were killed and twelve were wounded when workmen attempted to disarm the police at the Vulcan shipyards.

A mob, using stones, beer bottles and pieces of metal as missiles, attacked the police in the center of Hamburg. Policemen opened fire, killing and wounding over fifteen persons.

Five persons were wounded in a riot in the Holsted platz. Many persons were killed and wounded when communists, armed with rifles and revolvers, gave battle to the police at Eisleben. The mob was victorious. The police took refuge in a barricaded building while the mob pillaged grocery and meat shops and banks. The ringleaders of the mob sent an ultimatum to the police demanding their surrender and the surrenof all their arms. The mob leader threatened to burn the city is the ultimatum was not accepted.


