Menus for a Family

Breakfast—Oranges, cereal, thin cream, eggs poached in milk on whole wheat toast, milk, coffee.

Luncheon—Cream of onion soup, toasted crackers, lettuce and cottage cheese sandwiches, bread pudding soufflé, milk, tea.

Dinner—Smothered veal steak, mashed potatoes, scalloped tomatoes, celery-apple and nut salad, cheese cups, lemon pudding, whole wheat bread, milk coffee.

The salad for children under ten years of age should consist of finely diced apple and celery on a bed of shredded lettuce sprinkled lightly with lemon juice and olive oil.

With the exception of this change juniors may be served the menus for the day as planned.

Cream of Onion Soup

One and one-half cups sliced onion, 1/4 cup diced carrots, 2 tablespoons minced celery, 4 tablespoons butter, 4 cups water, 1 cup thin cream, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, 2 tablespoons grated cheese, 2 tablespoons minced parsley.

Melt butter, add onion, carrot and celery and cook over a low fire until softened. Add water and simmer 20 minutes. Combine flour, salt and pepper and rub to a smooth paste with cold water. Stir into soup and bring to the boiling point, stirring constantly. Cook five minutes. Rub through a strainer. Heat cream and add to soup. Add cheese and heat until cheese is melted. Sprinkle with parsley and serve.

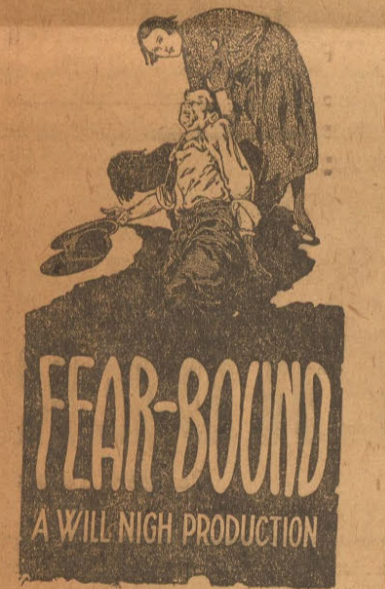

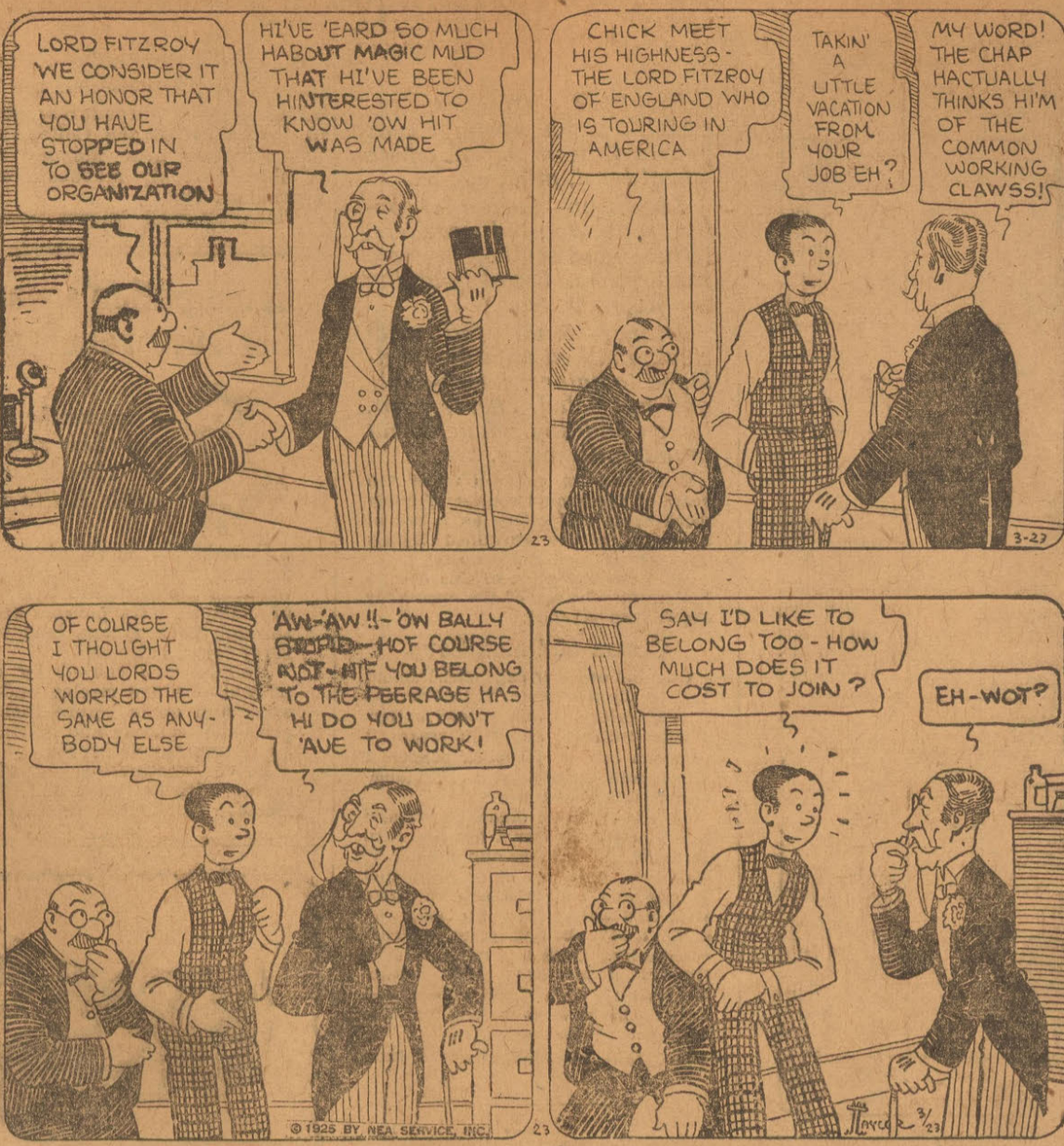

FOREST WEEK PROCLAMATION ISSUED BY PRESIDENT COOLIDGE

WASHINGTON, March 27.—President Coolidge has proclaimed the week of April 27 to May 3 to be American Forest Week and urges the country to observe the occasion by taking a renewed interest in forest rehabilitation.

The proclamation follows:

"In proclaiming American Forest Week, I desire to bring to the attention of all our people the danger that comes from the neglect of our forests.

The Forests Stripped.

"For several years the nation has observed Forest Protection Week. It is fitting that this observance be enlarged. We have too freely spent the rich and magnificent gifts that nature bestowed on us. In our eagerness to use that gift we have stripped our forests; we have permitted fires to lay waste and devour them; we have all too often destroyed the young growth and seed from which new forests might spring. And though we already feel the first grip of timber shortage, we have barely begun to save ourselves.

"We have passed the pioneer stage and are no longer excusable for continuing this unwise dissipation of a great resource. To the nation it means the lack of an elemental necessity and the waste of keeping idle or only partly productive nearly one-fourth of our soil. To our forest-using industries it means unstable investments, the depletion of forest capital, the disbanding of established enterprises, and the decline of one of our most important industrial groups.

"Our forests ought to be put to work and kept at work. I do not minimize the obstacles that have to be met, nor the difficulty of changing old ideas and practices. We must all put our hands to this common task. It is not enough that the federal, state and local governments take the lead. There must be a change in our national attitude. Our industries, our landowners, our farmers, all our citizens must learn to treat our forests as crops, to be used but also to be renewed. We must learn to tend our woodlands as carefully as we tend our farms.

"Let us apply to this creative task and boundless energy and skill we have so long spent in harvesting the free gifts of nature. The forests of the future must be started today. Our children are dependent on our course. We are bound by a solemn obligation from which no evasion and no subterfuge will relieve us.

URGE PARENTS' AID IN SCHOOL CENSUS

Ranger's school census, which like all other school census in Texas, is taken in March, is nearing completion. J. M. Dodson, the school board's fiscal agent, said today that some children might have been overlooked by the census takers, as parents were not always found at home, and he asks that parents or guardians who are not certain their children have been properly enumerated call at this office, room 214 Marston building, and give report of them to him.

"This is an important matter," said Mr. Dodson, "inasmuch as the state's apportionment for the support of the schools is based on the school census taken each year. When a child is not enrolled in the school census it means a loss to the school which it attends or in the community where it lives, and this imposes an additional burden on the taxpayers. Parents and guardians should see to it that their children within the school age are enumerated."

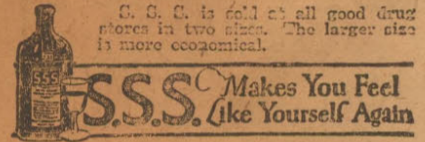

Wash Windows with Soap

If the eyes of the home are windows, there must be many homes with defective vision! Cleaning windows used to be a long, laborious process and even now many housewives not knowing of easier ways, keep putting off window-cleaning times as long as possible. Really, washing windows is no more difficult a job than washing dishes. Just mix two quarts of hot water with a liberal pinch of bluing dissolved in it, so as to make it a deep blue—two tablespoonsful of kerosene, and a small cake of Ivory soap. Into these hot suds, dip a cloth, wring slightly. With this wet cloth go over the windows, and then follow by wiping off with a soft dry cloth and polishing with tissue paper. This gives the windows a bright dazzling appearance, and is an excellent way to keep the flies from them in summer.

Ranger Merchant Sees Greater Possibilities For Eastland County

Barney Bronstein, Ranger merchant, believing experience is a valuable teacher, has bought a home in Ranger, improved it and says he intends to hold it for the come-back he believes Ranger is destined to have at a not far distant time, thus reversing his experience at Healdton, Okla. Mr. Bronstein went to Healdton when oil was first found there and bought a home for \$800. After a few months the oil reserves appeared to have become exhausted, Ranger was looming up as a promising field and Mr. Bronstein sold his property for \$200, coming to Ranger. Not very long afterwards the drills penetrated to a lower strata at Healdton, finding larger reserves of oil than at first and Healdton had a come-back. The man who bought from Bronstein sold the property for

\$5,000 and the present owner would not take \$10,000 for it, Bronstein said.

"Take all the oil towns, Tulsa, Corsicana and many others—they have had their rise and fall and come-back," said Bronstein. "The second discovery of oil, after the oil reserves were thought exhausted, has proved richer than the first," he said.

"What has happened elsewhere is likely to happen in Ranger. The lower stratas have not been tested in the Ranger field. When they are, oil in enormous quantities is likely to be found, and Ranger will have a come-back. I have bought a home here at Austin and Mesquite streets, have improved it and shall hold it. I have a nice business and expect the time will come when my business and my property here will be worth many times what they are today."

Central West States To Hold Agriculture Meet at Kansas City

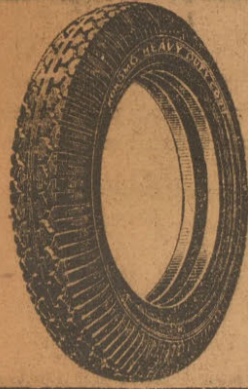
WASHINGTON.—Representatives of chamber of commerce in the states of Arkansas, Colorado, Iowa, Kansas, Nebraska, Oklahoma and Texas will gather at Kansas City on April 9 and 10 to discuss, under the auspices of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States, methods by which business organizations can best cooperate with the farmers in their trade areas for the betterment of agriculture.

The agricultural bureau of the national chamber which, upon the suggestion of George W. Catts, agricultural commissioner of the Kansas City Chamber of Commerce, and T. W. Thomas, director of development of the Denver chamber, made arrangements for the gathering, calls attention in its announcement to the statement of W. M. Jardine, secretary of agriculture, that "only ten per cent of the problems of the farmers

can be remedied by legislation; the other 90 per cent must be solved by the farmers themselves and their immediate associates, the business men of each agricultural community." The purpose of the conference is to ascertain the most effective methods of bringing about this cooperation which is accomplished largely through chambers of commerce and commercial organizations. It is confined to the region embraced in the states named because their outstanding agricultural problems are similar.

ACCUSED SLAYER OF HUSBAND ACQUITTED

FLOYDADA, March 27.—Mrs. Ruth Hobart and E. W. Miller were freed here late yesterday afternoon when the jury trying them on indictment charging the murder of E. W. Freshmen Stunts Go On Saturday Evening

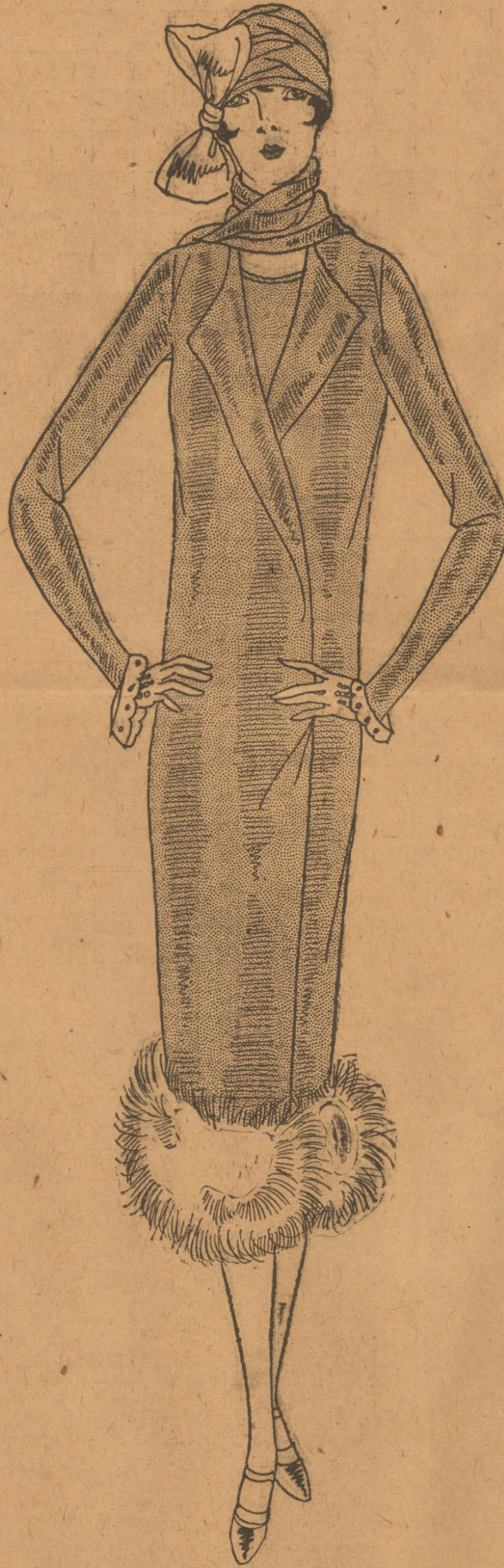
