STAMPS COMING

DALLAS, Apri' 6.—Did you ever see a 1½-cent stamp?
Postoffices in Texas will soon be

supplied with them, \$30,000 worth, 2,000,000 of them, have been received by the Dallas postoffice and will be distributed to postoffices in

Parcels post packages containing printed matter and weighing up to eight ounces, which were formerly carried for one cent, will now require 1½ cents, and it is for this purpose that the stamps are made.

They will not be sold, however, before April 15.

A new issue of 11/2-cent stamped envelopes, and newspaper wrappers stamped with the same denomination, also has been provided to meet the demand created by the frac-

The ½-cent stamps will make possible the use of one-cent postcards and stamped envelopes already on

Engraved in brown ink, the 11/2 cent stamps bear a portrait of President Harding. Stamped envelopes and wrappers of the same value are embossed in brown ink, but are similar to the regular two-cent design, with the Washington portrait. No description of the ½-cent stamp has been received here, but it is known they will bear a portrait of Nathan Hale, revolutionary war hero.


