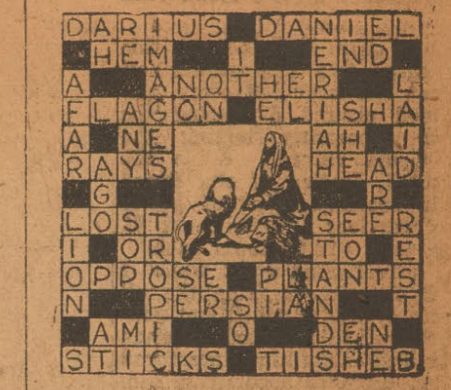
CROSSWORD PUZZLE

2 egg whites
3/4 pint cream
3 or 4 tablespoons powdered sugar
1 teaspoon vanilla
Chocolate icing.
Beat the egg yolks with five tablespoons of powdered sugar until creamy. Combine the cocoa and cornstarch, adding slowly to the mixture. Beat well. Fold in the stiffly beaten egg whites; spread this mix-

ture about one inch thick in a baking pan which has been buttered and lined with paper. Grease the paper also. Bake in a slow oven (325 to 350 degrees F.) for about one-half hour. Turn out on a wooden board over which has been laid a slightly dampened cheese-cloth. Cool, and spread with the cream, which has been whipped and sweetened.

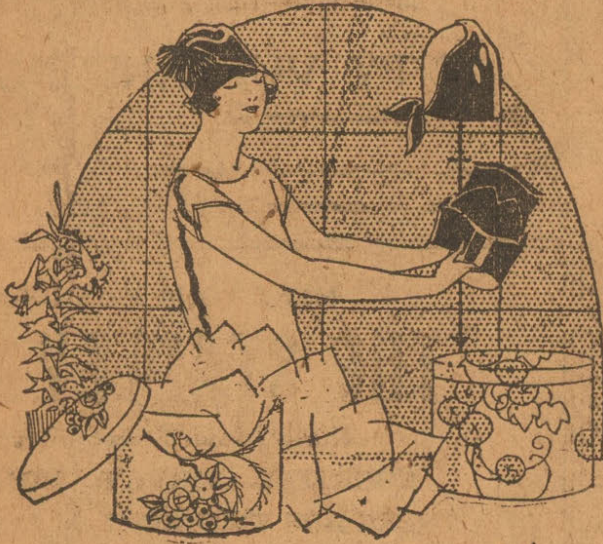
