Twenty Miles From Caddo to Ranger Takes Same Time as 36 to Graham.

In making the trip from Ranger to Caddo, a distance of twenty miles, it required two hours. From Caddo to Graham, thirty-six miles, the same amount of time is required. The distance was traveled by A. Davenport Sunday and the time and condition of the roads carefully noted. The wear and tear on a car, as well as on the disposition of the passenger, was something terriffic on this end of the route, Mr. Daven-pert said. From Graham he returned to Breckenridge and back into Ran-

NOTHING TOWARD RANGER. Breckenridge, he said, was doing some work on its roads north of that town, but towards Ranger nothing was being done.
